THE PLACE MOST PEOPLE TRADE

S. H. L. SWAFFORD, PIO-NEER CITIZEN IS DEAD

The citizenship of this city and community was very much grieved and considerably shocked when the news went out in the early forenoon that Mr. S. Ň H. L. Swafford, one among the pioneer, substantial and wellknown citizens, had died very suddenly.

Deceased had been in failing health for many months, but his sudden death was entirely unexpected and only a short time before the sudden stroke he had eaten a hearty breakfast. More than a year ago Mr. Swafford fell and suffered a broken hip, and since that time he has been compelled to go about on crutches.

Mr. Swafford was born March 19, 1852, in Bledsoe county, Tennessee, and came with his good wife and children to the Abilene country in 1897, moving to Merkel in 1904. He was the father of twelve children, all living, three of whom live in this immediate country while three reside in the state of Oregon, 2 in Kansas City, one in Chicago and 3 in other parts of Texas. Early in life he professed religion and united with the Methodist church, continuing faithful and steadfast in that faith until his summons on last Friday morning to come up higher. He had always led an active and useful life in the community in which he lived, and by honesty and outspoken sentiment upon the side of righteousness, commanded a large circle of close and admiring friends. His un-

timely demise is indeed a distinct loss to the entire commun. ity.
