**WE HAD BEEN HEARING** for some time about the critical water shortage in California, and during our recent visit to the West Coast, we had the opportunity to find out that the shortage is a fact and not just a rumor, and also to see firsthand some of the measures which have been put into practice in order to attempt to save water.

The first thing that we noticed was that the restaurants are not serving water to their customers, a custom that is taken for granted in most sections of the country. They will bring you water if you request it, and most of the places have signs to this effect, and ask the indulgence of the customers.

One particular restaurant we visited even had an insert printed and placed next to the menus on each table. The sheet pointed out that by not serving drinking water the restaurant could in effect save as much as 24 ounces of water per customer. It went on to explain that the saving amounted to eight ounces for the water, another eight ounces required to make the ice, and another eight which would be necessary to wash the glass.

Every motel we visited had a reminder of the shortage, and some of them gave suggestions along with their request that their guests help them in their efforts to save the scarce water.

One particular poster pointed out that a man could save up to 19 gallons of water while shaving, by filling the basin rather than allowing the tap to run. A similar saving, this estimated at nine gallons, could be effected by not allowing the tap to run while brushing teeth.

A saving of around 21 gallons of water could be realized by changing your shower routine, it was pointed out. Instead of letting the water run during your entire shower, the leaflet suggested "wetting down, soaping up and rinsing off," which would use only about four gallons of water. Similar savings were recommended for tub baths, by not filling the tub completely.

Other places we observed were giving evidence of their attempts to conserve water. One in particular was a car wash, which had a big sign proclaiming "We recycle our water."

Virtually everywhere you went, there were reminders of the critical nature of the water shortage, as state and local officials have done a great job of getting the message across. Attractions which used a large amount of water, such as a special effect at a tour of Universal Studios in Hollywood, had the tour guide make a point of mentioning that the water was recycled.

We were a little bit surprised that the motels which have swimming pools all had the pools filled—at least all that we saw. With the extreme measures being employed in other areas, we sort of expected the pools to be empty. But apparently, since tourism is one of the state's leading (if not the leading) industries, officials must have decided to leave the pools filled for the sake of the tourists.

Some cities have been obliged to go to strict rules on the watering of lawns and gardens. Friends we visited in Northern California explained that early in the spring the city had set aside dates to give their trees a good deep watering.

Even with the shortage and its inconveniences, some of the residents of that state have managed to keep a sense of humor evident. For instance, we saw a sign in a parched but otherwise neat-looking yard in Sonoma that read "This lawn gave its life for water conservation."

**THE BOVINA AREA** experienced several days in a row this week with temperatures reaching the 100-degree mark or more, and some of the farmers can probably tell you about a water shortage of their own. We're sure that the irrigation facilities have been tested to the fullest during the past week.

There is always a ray of hope, however, in any situation. Cotton farmers, for instance, praised the weather of the past week as "Great cotton growing weather."

# "Country Musical" Slated Here July 5

Among those stars recognized by the touring performers is Mac Davis and the late Buddy Holly, both of Lubbock, along with Jimmy Dean of Plainview, Waylon Jennings of

Littlefield, and the late Bob Wills of Turkey.

Also featured will be songs and biographies of stars such as George Jones, Roger Miller, Tex Ritter, Ray Price, Gene Autry, Jeannie C. Riley and many others who made country-western music famous.

More than 90 songs from 45 Texas performers will be presented, along with a Mexican fiesta dance and other attractions. "Texas—Cradle of Giants" not only depicts and commemorates the songs and performers, but portrays the era, or decade, of the music and performer.

## Coin-Op Car Wash Opens In Bovina

Joel Nelson announced this week the opening of Bovina Car Wash, a self-service automobile washing facility, at Avenue A and Boyce Streets, two blocks west of First State Bank.

The new facility features all of the usual conveniences of a self-service

car wash, including the wash, rinse or wax cycle that the operator selects according to his preference.

There is a vacuum for cleaning the inside of vehicles, a towel dispenser, whitewall cleaner and grease and tar remover available from a dispenser.

The car wash features three bays, including one which is 16 feet tall, to accommodate trucks, combines, or other large vehicles.

The facility will be open daily until midnight. The cost is 50 cents for five minutes of washing, rinsing or waxing.

## Area Gets Showers

Monday night's rain resulted in Bovina receiving one quarter of an inch of moisture. The rain was accompanied by high winds and extremely hard gusts.

During one particularly heavy blast, the 35-foot antenna at Billy Harbison's home was torn off at the ground.

Other moisture reports Tuesday morning included 1.2 inches at Lariat, an inch in the Rhea Community, and just .2 inch in neighboring Friona.

This is the first measurable moisture in the Bovina area since May 27, and was welcomed by farmers and city dwellers alike.

If nothing else, the shower helped curb the steady diet of high temperatures. The area sweltered under 100-degree plus temperatures from Thursday through Sunday, with unofficial highs reported near 110 on Friday.

## Housing Survey Is Finalized

Results of six weeks of door-to-door canvassing of the City of Bovina by volunteers have been completed and the results await study by the City Council to determine what action to take, if any.

## Century Plant Adds To Yard

Dan and Martha Koelzer have a rare addition to their "cactus collection" in the corner of their yard at 408 Avenue B in Bovina.

The Koelzers have a blooming century plant in their yard, with beautiful yellow blossoms. The plant has been blooming for approximately six weeks.

According to tradition, after the plant has finished blooming it will die. The stalk of the plant, which holds the blossoms, is about four inches in diameter at the base, and must be around 12 feet tall. The entire height has been grown this spring, when the Koelzers said you "could almost see the plant grow."

The Koelzers have at least 18 varieties of cactus in their

yard, of which around six are native to Parmer County. The others are from adjacent areas in the southwest.

"All of our cactus plants bloomed beautifully early this spring following our nice rains," Mrs. Koelzer said. She said their yard had blooms of yellow, orange, and one with a deep purple blossom.

Century plants are a mystery to many people, due to their strange growing pattern. Their name comes from an original belief that the plant blossomed only once every hundred years. The Koelzers had their plant six years before it "did its thing." Whether or not there is an "average" age for plants to blossom isn't readily known.

Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb, a job opportunity program for rural residents, 55 years of age or older, will begin operating soon in Parmer County.

The purpose of the program, sponsored by Texas Farmers Union and funded through the Department of Labor, is to employ rural elderly to work in community betterment and conservation projects for non-profit organizations.

Currently Green Thumb projects operate in 36 counties throughout Texas. Green Thumbs are placed as individual workers who serve as homeaides, van drivers for Senior Citizen transportation programs, telephone reassurance callers, assistants in Title 7 nutrition programs, Senior Citizen Center hostesses, librarians, museum attendants, and in numerous other social service activities. Most counties also have a Green Thumb crew which works throughout the county in improvement projects such as repairs for public schools, weatherization of homes belonging to rural elderly, public park improvements, and other useful community projects working for both county and city governments.

Green Thumb workers are paid minimum wage for a 20 to 24 hour work week. Eligible applicants receive a medical examination which is paid for by the Texas Green Thumb program and also receive annual examinations while in the program. Training sessions are held periodically covering subjects of interest to the older worker such as information on nutrition and food preparation, home and work safety,

consumer affairs, social activities and other areas of importance.

Green Thumb has served Texas for seven years and has workers in 36 counties. The program serves the rural elderly of Texas whose incomes are too low to meet the normal needs and whose job opportunities are limited.

Residents of Parmer County are eligible and must be 55 years of age or older, farm or rural background, pass a general physical examination and meet limited income guidelines designated by the Department of Labor. Green Thumb is an Equal Opportunity Employer.

Green Thumb provides the labor without charge while the local non-profit organizations who sponsor a project must provide materials and necessary supervision. Green Thumb strives to coordinate and cooperate with local organizations and governments to strengthen existing community services and provide additional supportive services for the aged and handicapped.

## County Gets Pay For Registration

Comptroller Bob Bullock mailed checks totaling \$826,667 to 251 Texas counties last week as payments for issuing and processing voter registration certificates from February 1, 1976 through January 31, 1977.

Parmer County's check was for \$572.00. Amounts for neighboring counties included Castro, \$322; Deaf Smith, \$1,120; Lamb, \$1,184; Swisher, \$493; and Hale, \$2,002.

The payments ranged from a low of \$6.80 which went to Donley County to \$117,141 to Dallas County, Bullock said.

The counties are paid 40 cents by the state for each voter registration certificate issued or cancelled, he explained.

**At Home In Parmer County**

With the new smooth top cooking surfaces so popular I thought some of you could use this information.

Cooking on smooth-top ranges works best in pans that have a wide, flat bottom—and are made of materials with a high heat-conducting ability.

A variety of cookware fits that description—from stainless steel with an aluminum clad bottom to certain glass ceramic pieces.

In recent research by the Ohio State University College of Home

Economics, two different glass ceramic pans performed comparably to a stainless steel utensil with an aluminum-clad bottom. However, the stainless steel, aluminum-clad utensil performed most effectively when all types of ranges were considered.

During the studies, researchers used five different types of pans—to test heat distribution patterns, the interior bottom surfaces—and the time necessary to heat water and to heat oil.

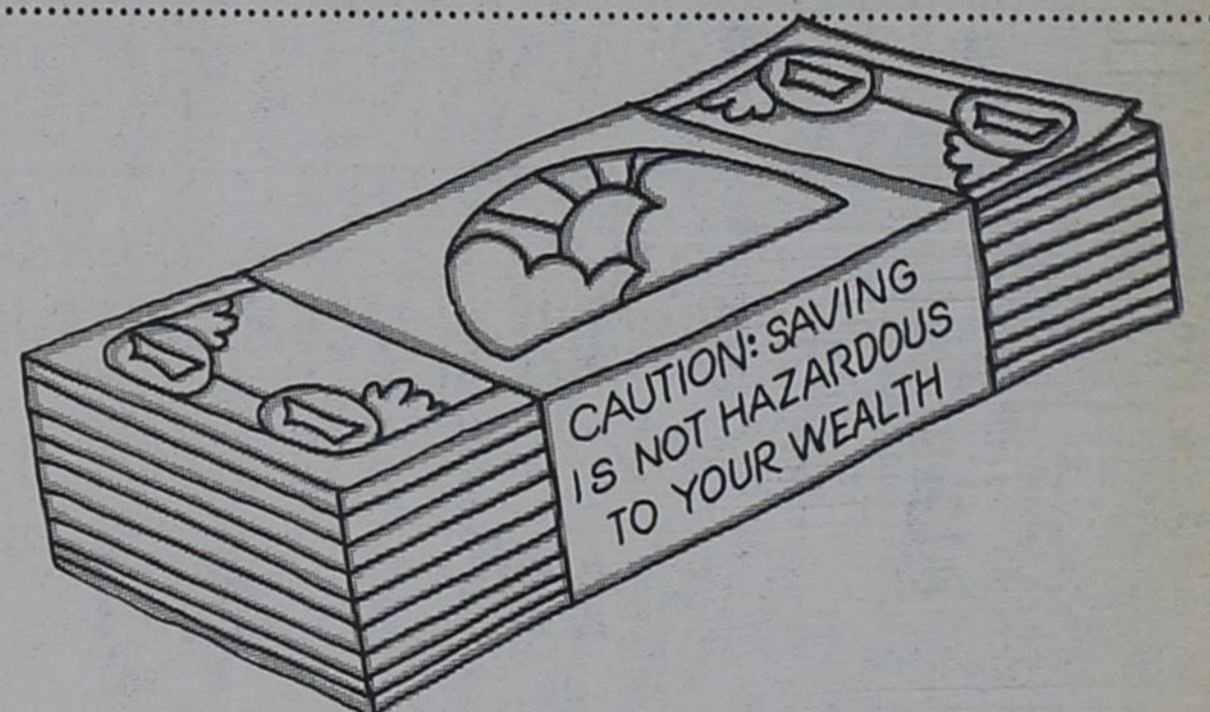
