Bovina Weatherman Willie Williams confesses that he uses two rain gauges to measure moisture which falls here. One is an accurate instrument such as is used by government weathermen. The other one is called "my chamber of commerce rain gauge" by Williams. The "chamber of commerce" deal will record 25 to 30 per cent more moisture than will the government gauge, Willie says.

Estimates Indicate --

Schools' Enrollment Hits New Record

As classes got underway at Bovina Public Schools Tuesday morning, an estimated 651 students had enrolled, according to sixth, 45; special education, the school principals, L. F. Jacobs and Tom Templeton. Although an exact count could not be made by noon, the figure

shows an increase in enrollment of 19 students over the first day of school in 1965 when enrollment stood at 632.

However, more students are expected to enter the Bovina schools in the next few days, principals stated.

Of the above estimates, 374 students are enrolled from grades one through six; 117 in seventh and eighth grades; and 160 in high school, grades nine through 12.

Although 45 students preregistered in the first grade last week, 76 showed up for school Tuesday morning.



ADDING FLOATATION—Building a small boat for use on stock tanks? If so, glue styrofoam strips under the seats to make the boat unsinkable.

CORK FLOAT SOLVES PROBLEM—When that extra-live minnow on your hook keeps on diving deep into vegetation where fish can't find it, try this. Attach a small cork just above the shank of the hook. Cork should be small enough that the fish can carry it down. But it should be large enough to prevent the minnow from getting too deep.

EYEGLASS INSURANCE-If you wear eyeglasses while you ski, attach a fishing bobber to each arm of the glasses. Then if they fall off they'll float and can easily be recovered.

TRANSPORTING LIVE BAIT—Those cardboard or plastic milk cartons, especially the larger sizes, make handy one-trip bait carriers for minnows, worms, etc.

LOCATING LEAKS—Fishing boots leaking lately? To locate the trouble spot fir your bathtub about half full of water and put the leaky boot in with the top out. Then insert a vacuum cleaner hose in the boot and start the blower. A stream of bubbles will mark the hole, tiny though it may be.

DRYING MATCHES-Wet matches can be dried by turning them over and over in your hair. It seems that the combination of oil and static electricity often recharges flagging igniter chemicals. Of course you could end up with phosphorus in your hair.

HOOK SHARPENING-A quick way to sharpen small fishing hooks is to run them through a piece of fine sandpaper several times.

SANDING THE GUN STOCK—Getting a velvet finish on a gun stock depends primarily on the sanding. And it's the last 10 per cent of the sanding that really counts. Trick is to wet the wood and sand it with the finest sandpaper you can buy. Another trick is to use extremely fine wet sandpaper.

POT BOILETH OVER?—There is a tendency for the coffee pot to boil over while you're cooking over a campfire. Eliminate this by putting a small green stick on top of the pot. Keeps everything inside.



Know The Truth By Lavern Stewart

Jesus said, "My kingdom is not of this world", John 18:36. Perhaps many religious people do not understand this; however, it is no surprise because even the Apostles did not realize that Jesus came to establish a spiritual kingdom. In Matt. 20:20-22, James and John, with their mother, came to Jesus to ask that the two brothers sit on the left hand and on the right hand of Jesus in His kingdom-thinking that His kingdom was a kingdom of this world. In Acts 1:6, the Apostles asked Jesus if He was going to "restore" the kingdom of Israel. He came to establish a "new" kingdom, and not revamp the old Jewish one. There are many people in this day that think Jesus came to set up His kingdom on earth, but was rejected by the Jews and so had to postpone what He came to do. Jesus intended to establish the kingdom during the lifetime of the Apostles or else He would not have told Peter that he would receive the "keys" to the kingdom, Matt. 16:18-19.
