He severely criticised the high way commission for the letting last Tuesday of more than one million dollars worth of asphalt resurfacing contracts.

"Conditions in this state have reached a point where the Attorney General's department must spend the major portion of its time and energy undoing the acts of the highway department and with the executive department at the same time spending the people's money to restrain the attorney general, it is time that the legislature of the state stepped in and gives the necessary relief," he declared.

As a member of the 39th legislature Petech was an active supporter of the amnesty bill, restoring to James E. Ferguson, impeached governor, the right to hold state office.

Referring to the ruling of the United States supreme court holding invalid an Archer counech said "at this time there is already hundreds of thousands of dollars tied up in litigation in this state by virtue of the district road bond ruling, and it is nothing less than a fair assumption to say that within 30 days the litigation will run into . millions of dollars.

"The credit of Texas, the repation of paying its honest utation of paying its honest debts-worth more to us, as far as concerns the development of our natural and undeveloped resources, than everything else-is at stake."

Petech charged the letting of resurfacing contracts was "a political measure, having as its purpose the vindication of the former commission."
