Tower, Price Carry Election Here

344 Total Votes Cast

A total of 1817 Parmer County voters went to the polls Tuesday in the 1966 general election, endorsing Republican Bob Price of Pampa as U. S. Congressman from the 18th District and Republican incumbent John Tower as U. S. Senator from Texas.

Seven out of eight boxes in the county voted Republican in the two races, the only precinct favoring Democratic candidates Dee Miller for Congressman and Waggoner Carr for Senator being Oklahoma Lane, Precinct 6. Voting by precincts appear in the above chart.

Parmer County cast 1161 votes for Price and 569 for Miller for Congressman. Tower received 1084 while Carr garnered 651.

Generally, Parmer County voted with the state of Texas, except for some amendments.

Heaviest turnout at the polls Tuesday, percentage-wise, was Lazbuddie, who reported 252 votes cast.

All state incumbents and county candidates appearing on the ballot were given the approval of Parmer voters, although write-ins were counted in two races.

Raymond Treider, Jr. was elected commissioner of Precinct 4, Lazbuddie with 138 votes. His name was the only one on the ballot but 76 write-in votes were cast for D. B. Ivy and 34 for Leon Smith, Jr.

In Bovina, Wilbur Charles received 265 votes and the nod for Justice of the Peace Precinct 3, although Lucille Kilgough received 39 write-in votes.

Others elected to office who had no opponents were C. H. Jefferson, commissioner Precinct 2, Bovina; J. R. Thornton, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, Farwell; and Jim Roberts, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2, Friona.

In state races, this is the way the Parmer votes were cast.

Committee Optimistic --

Medical Survey Continues Here

Several forms remain to be filled out and turned in for the Bovina medical survey being conducted here with the possibility of securing a clinic and doctor through the Sears-Roebuck Foundation, Mrs. Jesse Walling, chairman of the Community Improvement Committee said.

The survey was begun two weeks ago and it is hoped that forms can be completed shortly since processing by the Foundation in Chicago will probably take a long time, members of Bovina Woman's Study Club stated.

Mrs. Walling was "very pleased" with those which have been turned in and was optimistic about the possibility of Bovina receiving the Sears-Roebuck assistance, which will supply a doctor of good standing and equip a clinic.

In order to receive this assistance, Bovina must prove that the need exists and the survey is being conducted for that purpose.

Helping with the survey have been members of BWSC and representatives of the churches and civic organizations of the community.

Although the survey has not been completed as soon as desired, members say that workers were slowed down because several families whose names were drawn could not be located.

Cowboy, Railroad Man --

Bovina Pioneer Dies Wednesday

Funeral services for Bud Queen, 79-year-old early day cowboy and railroad man, were held at 2 p.m. Saturday in Pentecostal Holiness Church in Bovina.

Mr. Queen died at 4:45 p.m. Wednesday in Parmer County

Community Hospital in Friona following an illness of about a year.

Conducting the funeral services was Rev. Sam Isabel of Clinton, Okla., former pastor of the Bovina church. Burial was in Bovina Cemetery under direction of Claborn Funeral Home in Friona.

Bud Queen was born in San Angelo in 1887 and was raised on a ranch. He came to Bovina in 1906 and worked as a cowboy.

He and Miss Iva Williams were married in 1908 at Farwell. Mr. Queen continued working as a cowboy for several years and about 1915 began working for the railroad here. He became a section foreman before leaving the railroad. In later years he had worked in feed lots, but was retired at the time of his death.

Survivors include his wife of Bovina; two daughters, Mrs. Edith Turner of Albuquerque, N.M. and Mrs. Emily Kelly of Bovina; two sons, Warren Queen of Bovina and Jed S. Queen of San Antonio; 11 grandchildren and 25 great grandchildren.

He was only three points off on the tie-breaker score, and as winner receives the \$5 first prize.

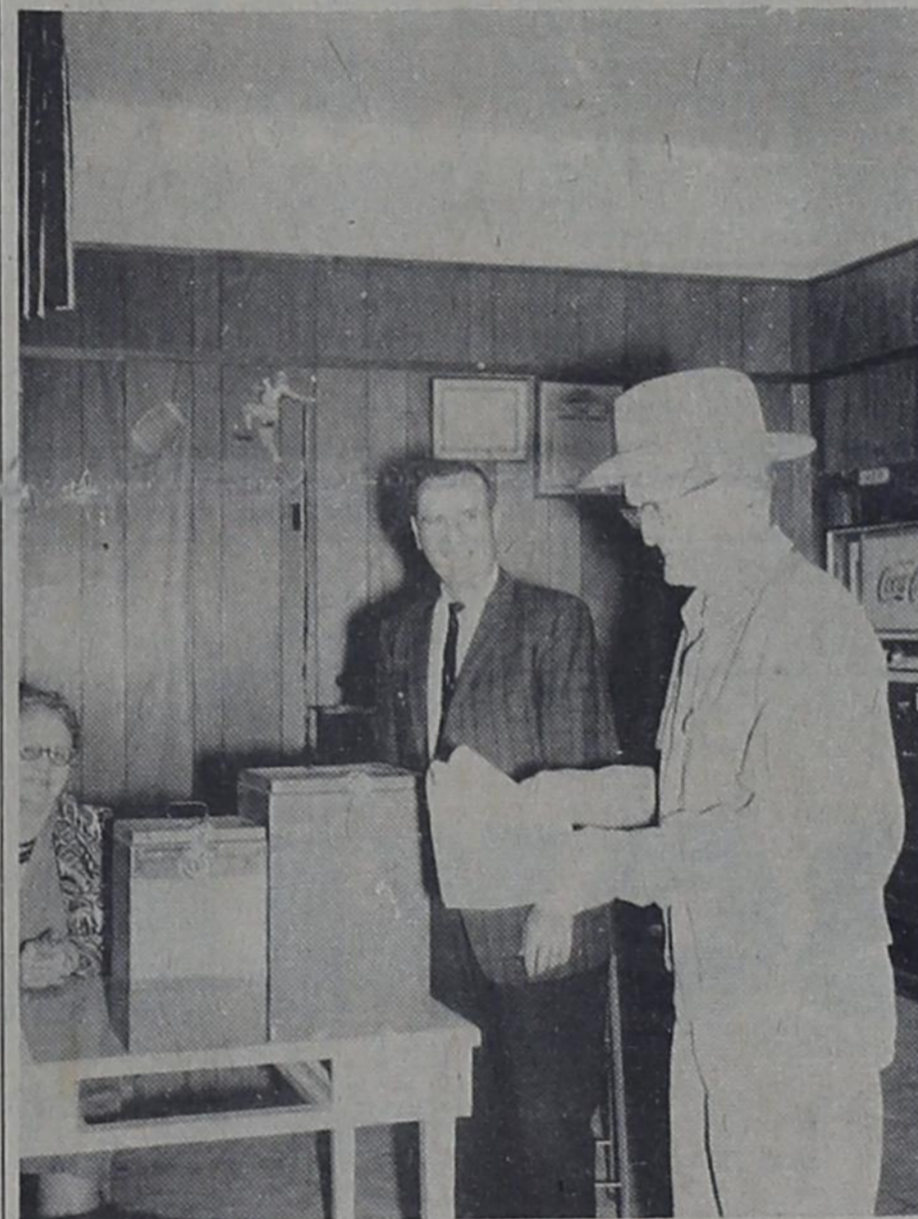

Eradication Program --

500 Students Receive TB Tests Tuesday

About 500 Bovina school students received tuberculin skin tests here Tuesday afternoon given by Mrs. Katherine Lockhart, school nurse, and an assistant from Lubbock.

Only first and seventh grade students were required by law to receive the tests and some of these had previously received them from their family physicians.

The remainder of the students' participation was voluntary, although written permission from their parents was required.

The students receiving the skin tests represented about 70 per cent of the school system. In addition, teachers were also given the opportunity to participate in the program,

made available by the Texas Health Department.

Mrs. Lockhart pointed out that last year the seventh grade received the tests, and this year a lower percentage than normal over-all in that class, now eighth grade, received the check for tuberculosis.

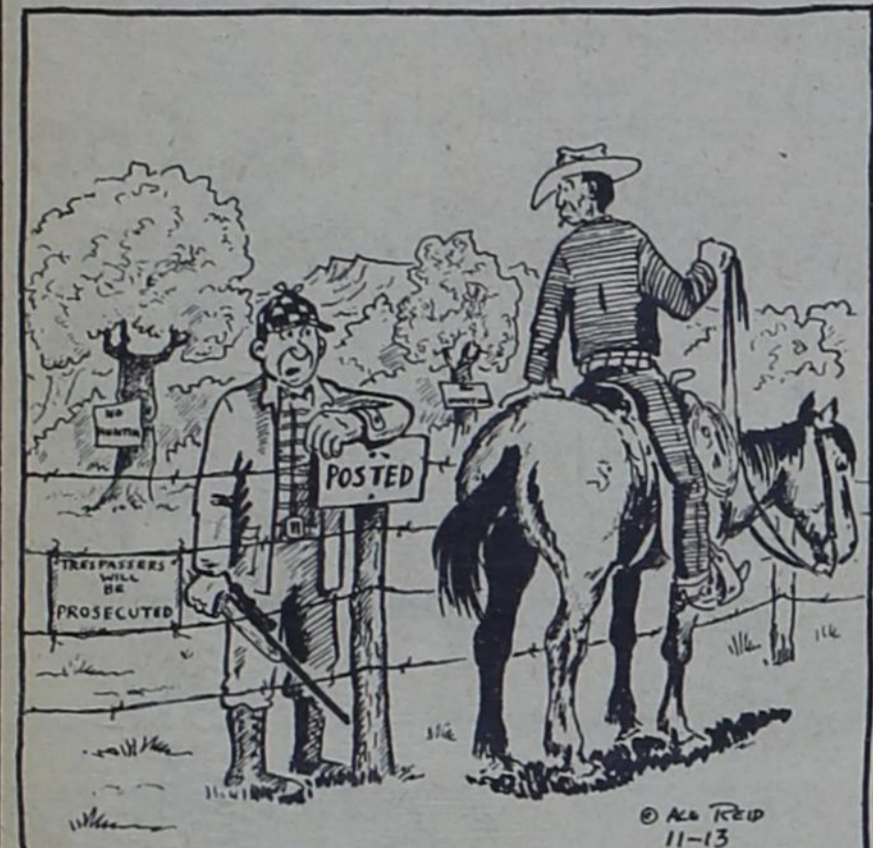

October City Collections Up

About 40 per cent of the city tax roll was paid by Oct. 31, according to Mrs. Mary Ruth Martin, city secretary, with most property owners taking advantage of the three per cent discount.

A total of \$10,380.75 was collected by Oct. 31, as compared to \$8,142.67 collected at the same time in 1965.

The total tax roll in Bovina this year is \$25,425.08.

Mrs. Martin pointed out that

nearly all loan companies take advantage of the three per cent discount, and these payments account for much of the taxes paid in October this year.

Payments so far have not included a great amount of personal taxes due.

Taxpayers may receive a two per cent discount during November, a one per cent discount in December. Taxes become delinquent after Jan. 31, 1967.

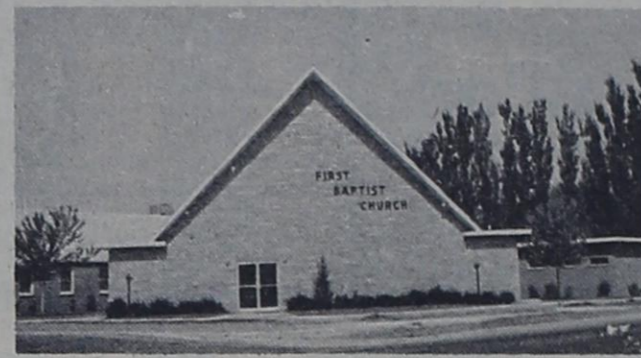
The life of Jesus is an example of humble service. He said He came not to be ministered unto but to minister and to give His life as a ransom for all.

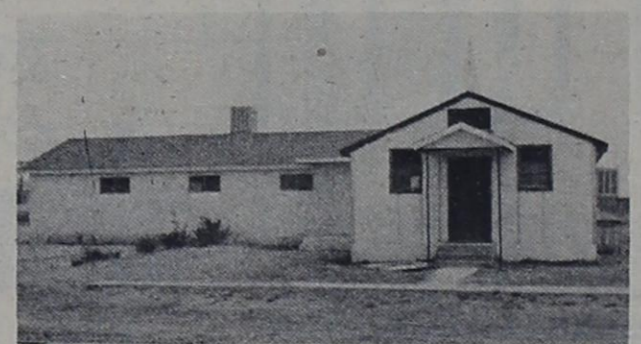

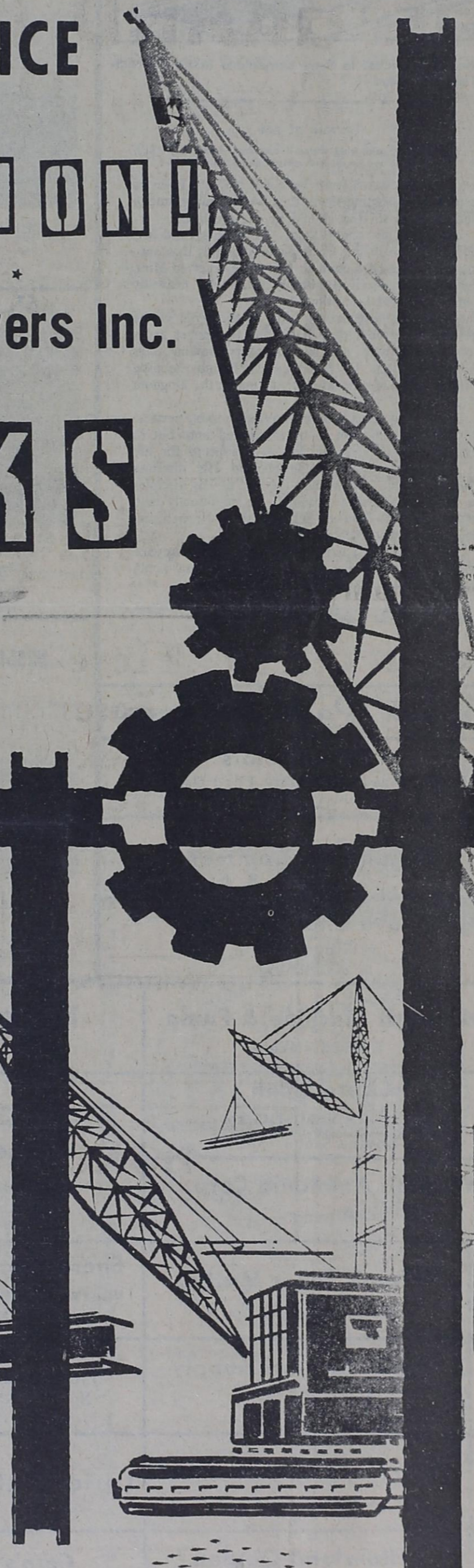

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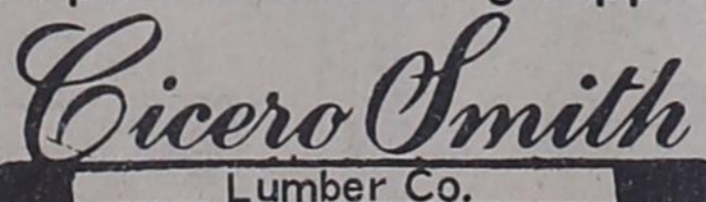

Steers Gore Ponies; Drought Not Broken

The drought is still on. The Farwell Steers defeated the Bovina Mustangs for the 12th consecutive year there Friday night, 28-12.

The Mustangs put up a good fight, but were unable to contain the passing attack piloted by Farwell's outstanding quarterback, Bobby Field. This was the first district game for the two clubs in several years. Farwell is now 1-2 in District 3-A play and the Mustangs are 0-4. This was the final district game for Bovina.

The Farwell boys got one touchdown and an extra point in each of the four quarters. The first score came the first time the Steers had the ball at the game's beginning.

Bovina spotted the favored Farwell team two TD's and a total of 14 points before they got on the scoreboard late in the second period.

The Mustangs cut the margin to 21-12 late in the contest, but the Steers roared back for their fourth touchdown following an outside kick by the Mustangs which wasn't successful.

The game was played in colder - than - comfortable weather in Steer Stadium before a crowd estimated at 600, far less than usual at a Bovina-Farwell football game.

The crowd was possibly held down by the cold weather plus the fact that both teams have had losing records this season. Farwell was 1-7 going into the game while the Mustangs were 2-6.

Bovina's Eddi Corn kicked off to the Steers to get the game underway. Halfback Al Phillips returned from his 28 to the 38. The touchdown came 10 plays later. The big gainer in the drive was a 25 yard pass from Field to Lewey Bradshaw which moved the ball to the Bovina 36. Fullback Larry Suttle got the score on a two yard plunge. Phillips added the extra point to give Farwell the lead which was never relinquished.

The Ponies were able to contain the Steers through the remainder of the first period and got their offense in gear in the fading minutes of the quarter. Linebacker Rex Cumpton gathered in a stray Field pass on his team's 15 yard line. From there, the maroon and white marched 81 yards in 12 plays only to lose the ball on downs at the Farwell four yard line. The big play of the drive was a 36 yard scamper by Dean Stanberry, hard running halfback, who was injured in the last minute of the game and will be unable to see action in the final game of the season this week.

Farwell's second score came with 5:10 remaining in the first half. A had Mustang punt gave the winners possession on the Bovina 24. The score came in four plays. An 11 yard pass from Field to Phillips put the ball on the 13. Phillips got those yards in two carries. Phillips then kicked the extra for good measure and it was 0-14.

The Mustangs evidently decided at that point that was enough lead for the Steers. They roared back following the kickoff for a tally of their own. Lane Gober returned the kickoff from his 10 to the 32. Stanberry and Fullback Carl Harris took turns in carrying the ball for short yardage out to the Farwell 46. From there, Halfback Lynn Murphy passed long to Stanberry who was tackled on the Farwell one. Stanberry bolted across the double stripe on the next play to erase Bovina's goose egg off the scoreboard and make the count 6-14.

That's the way it stood at halftime, but the Steers missed a scoring opportunity in the closing seconds of the half. Field passes moved the Steers down to the Mustang three before a lost fumble gave Bovina possession. Field completed

three passes for a total of 79 yards in the drive.

Bovina received the second half kickoff, but lost the ball on downs at the Farwell 43. Field then piloted another Steer touchdown with the score being made on a 46 yard toss to Bradshaw. Phillips, who had a perfect night at the kicking tee, booted the extra and it was 6-21.

Late in the game, the Ponies cracked the scoring column again. They took advantage of a Farwell fumble to get possession on the Steer 21 with 2:10 remaining on the scoreboard clock. Stanberry blasted for three to the 18. Harris was stopped for no gain. Then Quarterback Randy Jones fired to End Gober, who made a sensational catch at the goal line for the six points. Stanberry was stopped in his running attempt for the extra points.

Harris carried 18 times for 54 yards, Murphy made 29 yards in eight tries.

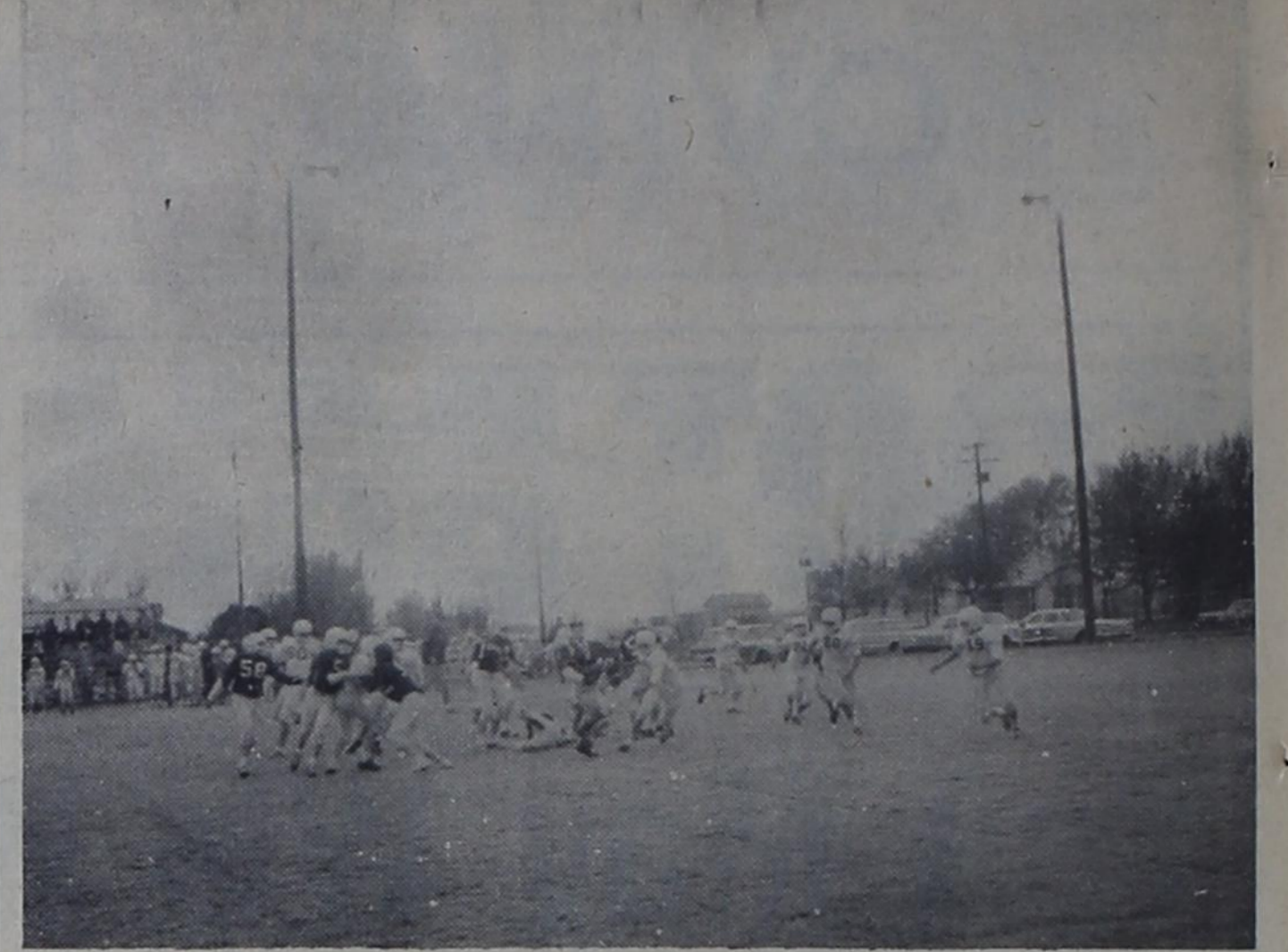

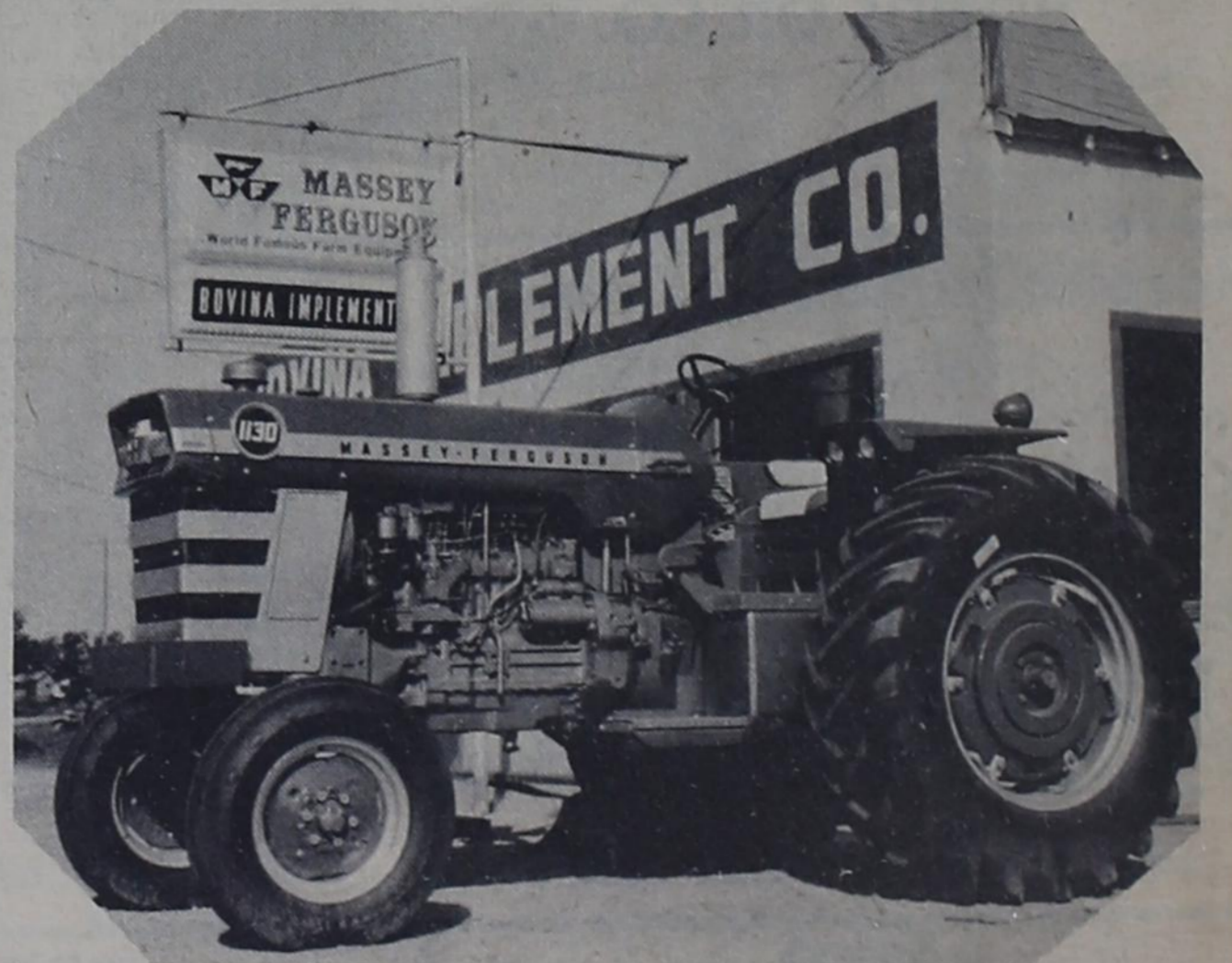
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
