A total of 1817 Parmer County voters went to the polls Tuesday in the 1966 general election, endorsing Republican Bob Price of Pampa as U. S. Congressman from the 18th District and Republican incumbent John Tower as U.S. Senator from Texas.

Seven out of eight boxes in the county voted Republican in the two races, the only precinct favoring Democratic candidates Dee Miller for Congressman and Waggoner Carr for Senator being Oklahoma Lane, Precinct 6. Voting by
