This area is, optimistic farmers tell us, on the brink of one of the largest grain sorghum harvests in history. And that's going some as some big ones have-been produced heretofore.

Harvest is, of course, already underway on a limited basis, and will be going full blast in a few days if the weather stays clear and dry.

This abundant crop was made in spite of adverse weather at planting time.

Yields of 7000-plus pounds per acre, or talk thereof, is common. Some farmers may even make as much as 10,000 pounds per acre on small patches, we understand. And almost all say they have the best crop ever.

A few years ago, yields of 7000 would have been more unbelievable than common.

Farmers are continuously doing a better job of producing the crop. Seed is being improved. Land is being better prepared. Fertilizers are being used to greater advantage. Good moisture which fell during the growing season was no doubt helpful this year.

All those things are aiding in increasing grain sorghum production.

Parmer County's first bale of 1963 cotton was ginned at Lawlis Gin Co. in Bovina Thursday of last week, Septtember 19.

The bale was produced by Bill Roberts, who farms five miles north of Farwell.

Variety of the early cotton was Paymaster 101A. It was planted April 27 and watered two times.

Roberts says that the crop received no hail and got off to a good start after it came up.

The 435-pound bale was ginned from 1670 pounds of seed cotton.

The ginning was free and the bale was purchased by Ovid Lawlis, gin manager, for 50 cents per pound.

In addition, Roberts will receive a \$25 premium from Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture for bringing the first bale to Bovina.

The Bovina Mustangs picked up their first win of the threeweek-old 1963 season here Friday night as they walloped the Whitharral Panthers, of District 2-B, 25-6.

The win was a sweet one for Coach Hallie Gee's charges as they had dropped their first two contests to Class A clubs, pringlake and Farwell.

Scoring one touchdown in each quarter, the Ponies had only minimum of trouble with the Panthers.

The local's offense was paced by the running of Fullback-Halfheck Dennis Johnston, who filled in capably for the injured Tally Kelso, regular fullback, and the npressive passing of David nderson.
