Disraeli Past Master of Diplomatic "Bluff" There is an entertaining story of Disraell in Maj. Gen. Sir Leopold Swaine's volume of reminiscences. There was a moment during the Berlin congress of 1878 when it seemed as if the British and Russian contentions could not be brought into harmony. On the morning of the fourth day Bismarck called on Disraeli. They spoke on every other subject except the congress. Finally Bismarck got up to go, and said: "I don't know if you and Gortschakoff, the Russian delegate, have come to an amicable agreement, but I trust whatever may happen this afternoon, that when you return to England you will take with you a pleasant recollection of your stay in Berlin." "I shall certainly do that," said Dizzy, "for I have met with nothing but kindness and consideration from everyone. Only this morning I had another proof of it. I sent to the station master to inquire how much notice I must give for a special train to be got ready to take me back to England. The reply, most civilly worded, was to the effect that two hours would suffice." Bismarck went straight to Gortschakoff to tell him that Dizzy meant fighting if he did not give in. "He gave in," adds Sir Leopold Swaine.

Junius Brutus Booth, the actor, was extremely eccentric. At times he seemed to forget all responsibility and would follow fanciful whims wherever they led him. One night he had been announced for a performance of "King Lear" at the Boston theater. The house was crammed. The hour for the curtain had gone by, but Booth had not arrived. 

Statesman a Stickler for Legible Writing

Philip Guedalla tells us, in connection with a letter addressed by Palmorston to Lord Lansdowne, which is reproduced in his blography, that the viscount was a great stickler for good handwriting, an article in the Kansas City Times recalls.

He early cautioned the young men of the foreign office against the twin iniquities of ill-formed letters and pale ink. But letters still continued to slope backward "like the raking masts of an American schooner." or stood in horrid rows, "which can only be compared to iron railings leaning out of the perpendicular."

His own flowed exquisitely in that faultless hand, which lived on in Mr. Gladstone's memory as one of the two perfect things that he had known, entitling Palmerston to be a trifle captious on points of caligraphy, to return a dispatch to a distant consul for transcription in blacker ink, and even to issue acidly precise instructions that some reluctant pupil "should form his letters by connecting his slanting down strokes by visible lines at top or bottom according to the letters which he intends his parallel lines to represent." .
