THEY ARE IN THE process of building a nursing home at Friona that should be the answer to everyone's prayers along this line.

The facility will be owned by the public. In that respect, it will be similar to Parmer County Community Hospital, which has enjoyed tremendous success, mainly because it is not privately owned.

For too many years, residents of Parmer County having aged relatives have been forced to take their loved ones to surrounding towns, in some cases large cities, for nursing home care.

In most cases, there is a long waiting list.

It is the thought by those planning the new Parmer County facility that better care will be available in a home with the "small town" atmosphere—where your loved ones are among friends and neighbors they have known for years.

With the staff of Parmer County Community Hospital "just down the street," medical care will not be a problem. It will be guaranteed.

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TO GET THE nursing home off the ground, residents of Friona passed a \$350,000 bond issue—the largest in the history of the city, at a time when most folks were thinking about cutting back.

Just to prove that the residents of Friona really thought the area needed this rest home, the vote was an unbelievable 97 per cent in favor of the bond issue, or almost 23-1. Most followers of bond issues will tell you that a 2-1 or 3-1 margin is usually considered a landslide.

In agreeing to call the bond issue, the City of Friona also obligated themselves to finance the nursing home until such time as it is able to support itself.

Actually, the \$350,000 in bonds amount to only 70 per cent of the proposed cost of the nursing home. Supporters of the project are in the midst of a \$150,000 fund drive to supplement the bond issue.

Ideally, the fund drive was designed to give residents of the surrounding area—those who will not be paying for the bond issue with their taxes—an opportunity to contribute to the establishment of the nursing home.

Going into this week, drive officials indicated that almost \$120,000 of the goal had been raised. They would be more than happy to have contributions from businesses or individuals in this area.

The nursing home's steering committee has as its goal having the construction underway by August 1, and they have been conducting a whirlwind campaign on the fund drive.

Undoubtedly, residents of the Bovina area will use the nursing home, just as they use Parmer County Community Hospital. Those who would like to be a part of the drive may contact Hollis Horton or Charles Allen in Friona, or send their contribution to "Project Nursing Home" in care of Friona State Bank. All donations are tax deductible.

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Butch McCain, a junior, and April Wilson, a senior, participated in the University Interscholastic League Class A Literary Meet at Austin this past weekend. Both students competed in poetry interpretation.

McCain placed second and Miss Wilson third at the regional meet recently in Lubbock.

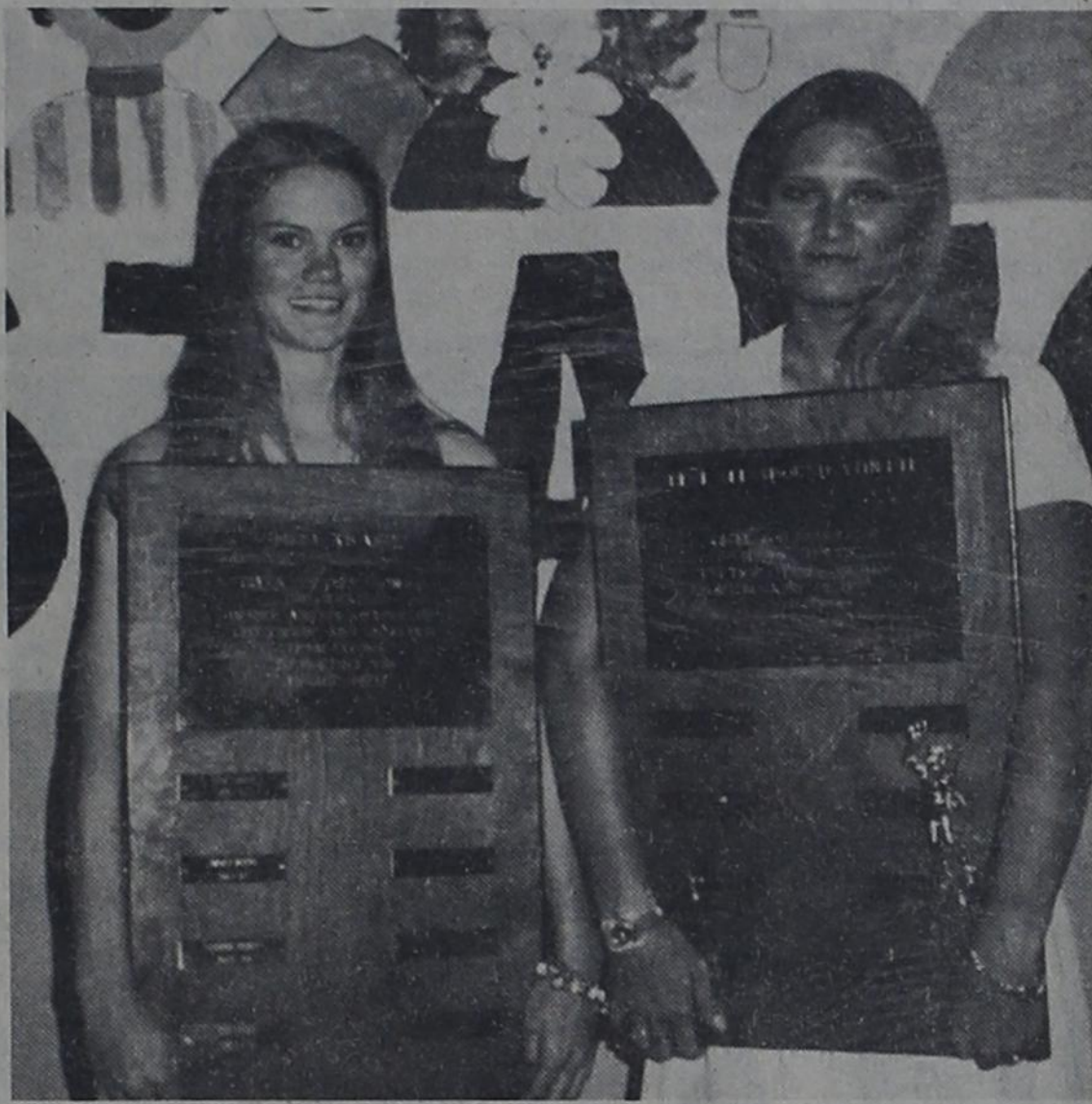
The two were eliminated in the semi-finals of the state competition.

Names of the five senior students were inscribed on the respective permanent plaques which are displayed near the trophy case in the main hall of Bovina Schools.

The awards, which were instituted five years ago, are the highlight of the annual banquet with honorees selected from members of the senior class.

Roger Ezell, a native Bovinian and athletic director at Bovina High School the past three years, has resigned that position.

The athletic director, along with Corky Criswell, assistant coach and head line coach the past five years, submitted his resignation this past week to the board of trustees of Bovina Independent School District.

Ezell said he has accepted a position as athletic director and head football coach at Bowman Junior High School at Plano, which is a Class AAAA school north of Dallas.

"Judy and I really hate to leave our home town and the fine kids we've worked with here, but this was an opportunity we felt we just couldn't afford to pass up," Ezell told a member of the Blade staff Monday.

Mrs. Ezell, also a native of Bovina and a government and history teacher in Bovina High School, will be teaching world history at Williams Middle School in Plano.

Criswell said this week that he would be entering business with his father and brother at Hereford. The firm, which will be known as the Hereford Tire and Rubber Co., will retail, recap and manufacture tires. He and Mrs. Criswell, who teaches

in Bovina Elementary School, are the parents of one daughter, Courtney, 17 months.

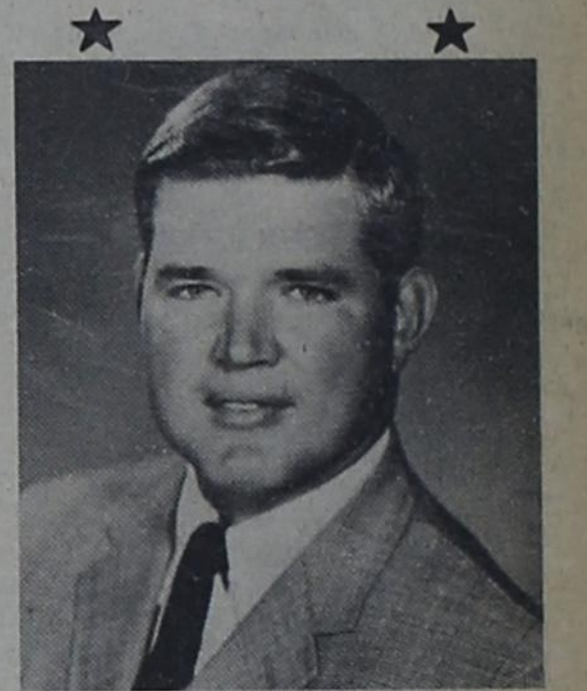
Ezell, who was assistant coach here seven years prior to 1972, succeeded Gib Hough as athletic director and head football coach.

Compiling a record of 15-15 during the past three years, the highlight of Ezell's career as head coach was in 1972 when his Mustangs copped a share of the District 3-A football championship with Hart. The '72 Mustangs finished the year with a 7-3 record, losing only to Friona, Plains and Hart. In 1973, the Mustangs finished the year with a 4-6 record once again tying the Hart Longhorns, this time for second place in district standings. In 1975, his injury-riddled young Mustangs wound up the year with an identical 4-6 slate.

Ezell also served as head girls' basketball coach and track and tennis coach.

A 1961 BHS graduate and a '65 graduate of Texas Tech at Lubbock, Ezell returned to his home town as

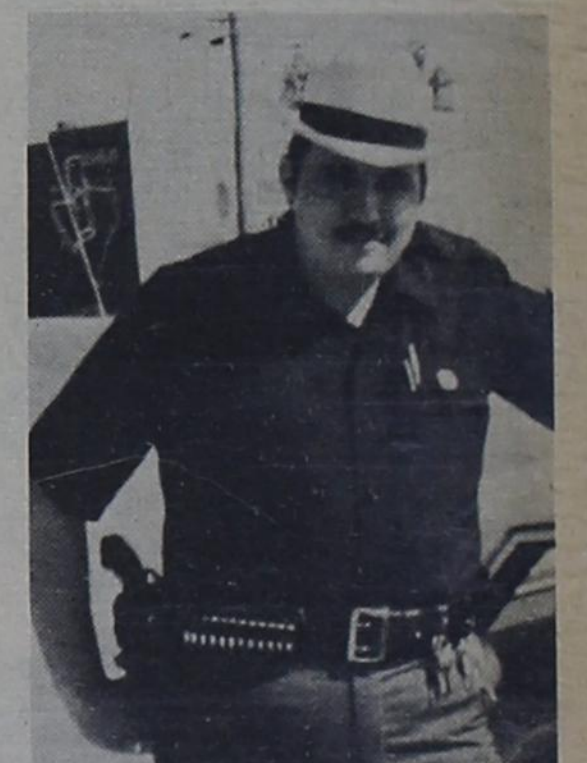
Mike Reilly New Marshal

Pre-School Registration Set May 15

Pre-registration will get underway at 9 a.m. Thursday, May 15, at Ridgelea Elementary School for 1975-'76 kindergarten and first grade students.

Children who will be five or six years of age on or before Sept. 1 of this year and who will attend kindergarten or first grade next year should be registered that day, announces Wilson DiCuffa, elementary principal.

DiCuffa requests that parents bring health and birth records when they register their child.

Required immunizations include DPT, oral polio, measles and rubella. TB vaccinations are no longer required by Bovina Schools. State requirements on the other immunizations include three doses of both the DPT and oral polio vaccine, one since the child's fourth birthday, DiCuffa said.

The principal urges parents who have children in those age categories to register them on that day. He will be at his office in Ridgelea School from 9 a.m. until noon that day.

Construction began Wednesday on a project that will almost triple storage capacity of Bovina Wheat Growers. Capacity will be increased from 290,000 bushels to 740,000 when the new structure is completed.

New scales, a new office and an additional dump will be added in addition to the 450,000 bushel-capacity flat building that will house the grain.

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FIVE YEARS AGO—MAY 6, 1970

A total of 234 voters in Bovina went to the Democratic Primary polls Saturday, among 1512 in the county, and re-elected Archie Tarter county judge in the only countywide contested race on the ballot.

Although Parmer County gave the nod to Lloyd

Bentsen for U.S. Senator, Bovina voted for Ralph Yarborough 126-101. County vote was 932 for Bentsen, 559 for Yarborough.

Police Seeking Hit-Run Driver

Texas Department of Public Safety officers and the Parmer County Sheriff's Department are seeking the driver of a car which struck and seriously injured a highway dept. worker Friday afternoon then sped away from the scene.

DPS Sgt. W.E. Wells issued an appeal through the Bovina Blade for assistance in finding the driver of the car that struck 23-year-old Cecil Baugher of Amarillo at 2:30 p.m. Friday. Baugher was working with a highway construction crew on U.S. Highway 84 about five and one-half miles east of Farwell when he was hit.

Baugher, along with a flagman, was working in the middle of the highway when a westbound car, believed to be light green or light brown in color and possibly a Ford Galaxy, struck him. The car skidded some distance before hitting Baugher and continued to skid after impact, sliding off the pavement into the median. The car came to a stop facing east, toward the spot where the injured man lay.

The driver started the car, drove back toward the victim, passed him and a parked pickup, then made a U-turn and headed back toward Clovis, "just fogging it," Sgt. Wells said.

The driver of the car, which was believed to have New Mexico tags, was described as a young Spanish male, of medium size with medium length hair and a mustache. He seemed to be alone in the car.

Baugher was first taken to Memorial Hospital in Clovis and then transferred to Northwest Hospital in Amarillo where he was treated for a fractured right leg, head lacerations and lacerations of the left arm. He was described as in good condition Friday night.

"We are looking for anyone who might know a man and a car fitting those descriptions," Wells said, "or anyone who was traveling the road at that time of day who might have noticed. Or anyone around Farwell who might have seen him coming through there at a pretty good rate of speed."

Wells requested that anyone—farmer or contractor or other employer—who might have such an individual in their employ to check on the possibility.

"We'd keep any information from an informant confidential if they desire," he said. "We think the public will want to help us locate a man that will commit this kind of act—run a man down and drive back by him twice and leave him laying in the road."

Anyone with information is urged to contact the Department of Public Safety or the sheriff's office in Farwell.

donors. Disqualifying conditions include a history of hepatitis or jaundice at any age, pregnancy or major surgery within the past six months, weight less than 110 pounds, or a history of unarrested clinical tuberculosis.

"When one becomes a community donor, we will take responsibility for blood center charges which you or members of your immediate family may incur within a six-month period following your donations," said a member of the Lubbock organization. "Unfortunately, we cannot extend this privilege to transfusions related to the treatment of hemophilia."

Initially sponsored by the Lubbock-Crosby-Garza County Medical Society in 1952, the Lubbock Center

serves 38 hospitals in a 10,000 square mile area in West Texas and Eastern New Mexico. Since 1952, more than 175,000 transfusion units have been provided for patients in this area.


Other Blood Service facilities in Texas are located in El Paso, Harlingen, Houston, Victoria, McAllen, San Angelo, San Antonio and Texarkana. The advantage of close coordination with these and other community blood centers in the network has been vividly demonstrated on several occasions when patients have needed unusually large quantities of blood or blood components, or a natural disaster has disrupted normal service in a community.

Planning for the 12th annual Bull Town Days, Bovina's three-day community celebration in August, began recently with a meeting of the 1975 BTD committee, composed of members of each civic organization, under the leadership of Ken Horn, '75 BTD chairman. George Powell was appointed assistant chairman for this year's event.

Kicking off work on the initial planning of the gigantic project, the committee voted to charge \$1 per plate for the annual barbecue dinner on Friday night and also voted to request half of any profits received from booths or money-making projects sponsored by clubs and individuals during the event.

Horn noted that the BTD operating fund was "broke" after last year's celebration and in view of rising costs involved, the committee agreed that it would be necessary to begin charging for the barbecue.

Funds derived from the dinner and the money-making projects on Main Street during the celebration will be placed in the BTD General Fund to defray all costs involved during the event.

The committee also voted to cancel the square dance, which has traditionally been held on Main Street following the barbecue Friday night. A lack of interest has been noted the past few years and because Bovina has no active square dance organization, the group decided to drop the dance from the slate of activities.

Mrs. Bob Turner, representing the Bovina Jaycee-Ettes, requested that Thursday night be reserved for the Little Miss Pageant, a new entry to BTDs last year.

Any organization wishing to sponsor an event this year is asked to contact Horn for a schedule of events.

The two resignations brought the number of vacancies on the coaching staff to three with Kevin McClellan, completing his first year here, resigning earlier this year.

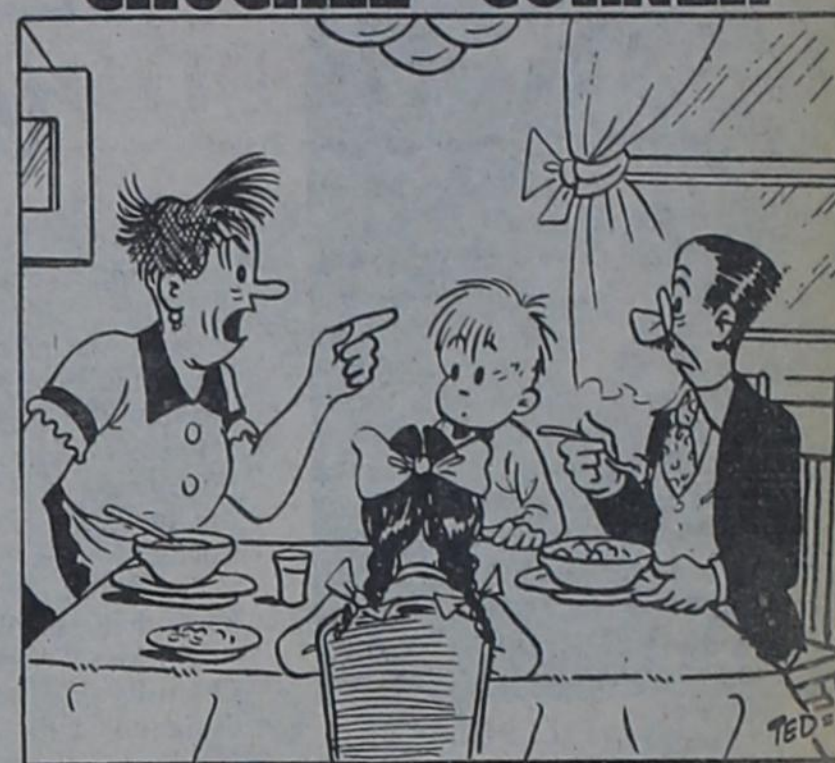

SCS Report

A progress report on the Running Water Draw Watershed project was made to the Parmer County SWCD at their regular meeting Tuesday.

The report was made by Herb Evans, District Conservationist, Friona. The report showed Site No. 1 is fifty-eight percent complete. The concrete work on the principal spillway has progressed satisfactorily and is past the danger point. The earth fill is progressing well and is above the principal spillway pipe so any rain now should not slow operations much.

Site No. 2, Bovina, has been mulched with cotton burs earlier in the year. Five different kinds of grass seeds have now been seeded in the mulch. A rain is all that is needed to bring the grass up.

Site No. 3 at Lazbuddie is ready and awaiting construction funds. Construction has tentatively been set to start in October of this year.

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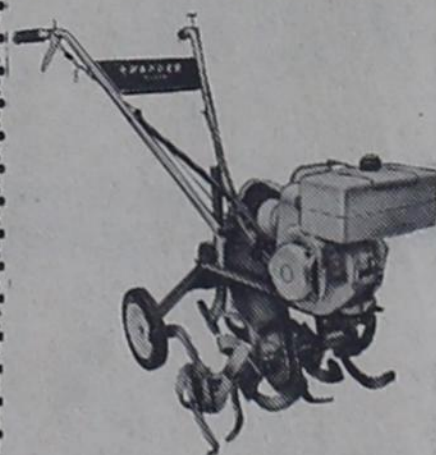
