DRAMA OF GOLD RUSH REVEALED

President's Pardon of Vuco Perovich Bares Story of Strange Life.

Kansas City, Mo,—When President Coolidge granted absolute freedom to Vuco Perovich the other day he ended a drama of the gold rush which reads almost like fiction.

Behind bars 21 years and in the shadow of the gallows, Perovich's spectacular battle for liberty was ended by the Executive pardon. He has not been bitter over the misfortune Fate has heaped upon him. And now, at forty years of age, owner of two barber shops in Rochester, he sees a happy future. Some day he will visit his fatherland. Montenegro, where his father was a nobleman.

He was released from the federal prison November 6, 1926, by Judge John C. Pullock, of the Kansas Federal court, on a writ of habeas corpus, His plea was unusual; he asked freedom or death. If his plea had been allowed he would have been taken back to Alaska and hanged according to a court decree there.

His argument was based on his declared innocence of a murder for which he was convicted. The murder was in 1904. At that time he could not speak English. It was his contention that death would be preferable to an innocent man than a cruel imprisonment.

Judge Pollock held with him, ruling the President of the United States in 1909, William Howard Taft, had no right to commute the death sentence imposed on Perovich by the Alaskan court without the consent of the accused. In his decision, however, Judge Pollock declared justice would not be served by sending Perovich to the gallows after he had served twenty-one years in jail and prison. That point was not decided.

President Taft was asked to commute seatence after Perovich had been in jail four years. He did this by Executive order. Perovich was taken to the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kan., to pass the rest of his life. There the young nobleman studied American laws and customs, mastering both language and law. He came across the legal point which proved to be the sesame for his recent release.

He applied to the court and George McDermott, a Kansas lawyer, was appointed to represent him. Then came the presentation of facts in the case. Strangely, time had shifted characters in this drama so that former President Fair was now chief justice of the United States and was called upon to pass upon the legality of his own Executive order that saved Perovich from the gallows. Last May the court held against Judge Pollock, and McDermott and Perovich shaped their application for a pardon from President

Early Life Was One of Ease.

Few of the romantic novels ever written about imaginary principalities in Europe are dotted with stranger and more unusual circumstances than have entered into Perovich's life. His father was chief justice in Montenegro and a friend of King Nicholas. His mother was of the royal family.

As a child Perovich played with the royal children and no expense was spared in his education. At fifteen he could speak eight Slavic dialects and Spanish, French and Italian. A few years later Russia and Turkey became involved in one of the Balkan wars and he enlisted in the Russian army. The youngest officer in the army, he was decorated for bravery and commissioned a lieutenant. When war was over he desired to join a brother who had come to America. Reports of gold in Alaska also attracted him and finally he obtained permission to come.

In Alaska he met an American prospector named Sam. Perovich could only speak a few words of English. They found a claim from which they took \$14,000 worth of gold. Then went

he day while Perovich was standin the door of a saloon in Fairbanks his partner came staggering to him, wounded and bleeding.

"Our claim has been jumped," Sam muttered.

Perovich said recently he hurried back to their cabin and found three men there. He asked for his clothes and other belongings. Answering, the men drew knives and started to attack him. He was six feet tall, weighed 205 pounds and was toughened by months of hard labor. Seizing a huge board, he fought them off and finally obtained his clothes.

A few days later he was arrested on a charge of assault. He was given to understand an assault charge meant little in Alaska.

SOVIETS HIT AT HEAD OF MOSLEM

Russians Attack Islam in Samarkand, Quaint City of Central Asia.

Washington. — Samarkand, venerable city of central Asia, has been the scene of a series of recent clashes between the Soviet apostles of modernism and the conservative religious leaders of Islam.

The quaint city with the melodious name lies about 250 miles southwest of Tashkent, Turkestan, on the Transcaspian railroad.

Perhaps nowhere in the Moslem world, except Mecca, could the Russians have invaded a more hostile territory to attack Mohammedanism, says a bulletin of the National Geographic society. According to ancient legend. Samarkand was the head of Mohammedanism and Mecca the heart. Two Arab missionaries visited this region. Hungry, they cut up a sheep and put it on the fire to roast. While the meat was cooking they planned their work. They agreed that the one drawing the sheep's heart from the pot should go to Mecca, and that the one drawing the head should remain at Samarkand.

Samarkand is more than 6,000 years old and once had a population of more than a million. Today it has fewer than 60,000 inhabitants. The Persians once called it the hub of the universe. When Alexander the Great destroyed it, in 329 B. C., it was a prosperous city surrounded by a ninemile wall, pierced by nineteen gates.

Famous Public Square.

After the Russians took the city in 1868, they built a new city outside its western limits. A long, wide boulevard, shaded by tall poplars, now separates the two settlements.

The native city is a labyrinth of narrow, crooked, dusty streets, bordered with dirty mud walls of courtyards and one-story houses. In the business blocks cluster dilapidated booths, cluttered with edibles and garments. Bearded men and veiled women crowd the streets, dodging camels, donkeys, droshkies and highwheeled carts, all mud-brown from the dust, while peasants, laden with produce from their farms and gardens, plod along to the public square.

Samarkand's registan, or public square, is one of the most famous in the world. It is the market place, parade ground and meeting place for the inhabitants for demonstrations of rejoicing and protest. Paved with cobblestones, it is inclosed on three sides by mosques where young Moslems are educated. The huge polychrome tile facades and melonshaped towers, flanked with minarets 175 feet high, are splendid examples of Arabian architecture. Surrounding the courtyard inside each mosque are schools in whose cloisters, 10 by 12 feet, the students live with their in-

The fourth side of the square is occupied by ramshackle booths of odd pieces of lumber or tin, or strips of canvas on tall poles. They are filled with vegetables, fruits and other commodities. Near by are other booths where squatting natives sip coffee, smoke cigarettes, and gossip. As a public information bureau the oriental cafe serves the purpose of newspapers. Fortune tellers, professional letter writers and peddlers ply their professions where they find a shady place to sit. The registan also is the Samarkand employment agency.

Brilliant Garb of the Men.

From an elevated position above the surging mass of humanity the riot of color suggests that the natives vie with the rainbow and each other. A man will go hungry for a single garment of brilliantly colored material. Green, red, purple and yellow in all their hues will be seen on the same garment.

Is the tomb of the mighty Tamerlane, conqueror of Asia. It is an architectural gem, its graceful peacock blue dome rising above the dusty treetops.

Russian quarter is the hub of the new city, from which wide, well-shaded streets radiate in all directions. They are all paved to the city limits. Then they become mere trails in the desert. Some pass through masses of ruins of Samarkand when it was at the height of its prosperity. One of these roads leads to the citadel, situated on a hill between the two cities. Its wall incloses a subterranean prison, an immense dark chamber about 30 feet deep. Prisoners were let down by ropes and it is said no one ever came out of it. Grooves worn by the ropes can still be seen. The Russians abelished the old-fashloped method of punishing the offenders and have built clean, wholesome and well-ventilated

Pine Dresser Finally

Got Back to America There is no telling how much an antique piece may travel before it comes to rest in the hands of an appreciative collector or a museum. Recently a pine dresser was imported from England with some English furniture. The dresser stuck out like a sore thumb among the English pieces, and the dealer quickly spotted it. The wood, the hardware, the workmanship, the style, all proclaimed it American. A weathy collector purchased it and then set out to find how the dresser bad ever strayed from the shores of America. He discovered, after lengthy correspondence, that an American family had gone to England about 1875, taking considerable furniture with them, among which were several pieces which had been handed down from generation to generation, and the pine dresser was one of those pieces. Now it has an honored place in the collection, and may finally be returned to the descendants of the original owners, who are residing in a Middle Western city.-From the Antiquarian.

Dogs Lived Eight Days

Without Food or Water The tenacity of animal life is an interesting subject if it is tested by accident and not by design; and it has had a test by accident in Wales.

Two dogs, a sheep-dog and a spaniel, which had succumbed to the

temptation of rabbit hunting, were missed for nearly nine days.

Then a little girl, hearing curious sounds underground in a lonely place, brought a party of rescuers to the spot, and the dogs were dug out of a rabbit hole from which they had been unable to extricate themselves. They must have been without food and water for eight and a half days,

yet they seemed little the worse. Evidently the dog has lost, if it ever had, the instinct of burrowing toward the open air, which the underground animal possesses.

Many Tomato Varieties

The ground cherry, musk tomato, strawberry tomato or winter cherry grows wild in the Mississippi valley and in other parts of the world and is a member of the tomato family. It is known as the blue tomato by truck gardeners. It grows in a small husk which if left on will preserve the tomato through the winter. Although this tiny vegetable, which is only a little larger than a small cherry, may be eaten raw, it is at its best when preserved. This is only one of the fifty-odd varieties of tomatoes. There are red tomatoes, white tomatoes, blue tomatoes and yellow tomatoes of every imaginable size and shape. Because of their shapes, there are totomato, the peach tomato, the cherry tomato, the plum tomato, the grape tomato and the current tomate.

Water Power Long in Use

The oldest water power site in America, more than 100 years old, is on the Piscatauqua river at South Berwick, Maine. It was established on the site of the present Burleigh blanket mills in 1620 by Ferdinando Gorges, who obtained a grant from the English crown giving him the right to settle and develop the territory from sea to sea lying between fortieth and forty-eighth parallels north latitude. The grant, however, required him to develop water power, and accordingly he constructed a log dam, erected a grist mill and sent the meal to England as proof that the terms of the charter were being lived up to. The water power site has been in continuous use ever since.

Previously the hottest known spot was at Greenland ranch on the edge of Death valley, Calif. The bighest temperature re corded there was 134 degrees.

DIVINING BY BOOKS

A RATHER common practice with those who "seek for a sign" is to open the Bible at random and find their answer in the passage upon which their thumb rests as they part the leaves. In pagan times this divination was accomplished by placing the finger at random on a passage of Homer, Virgil or some other great author. Virgil was an especial favorite in this connection and the practice of consulting him continued down to modern times, though the Bible is the book generally used.

During the Middle ages the historic Virgil became so enveloped in a mist of tradition and superstition that he was alluded to by the uneducated as "Virgil the Wizard"; and in the unpopular estimation the chief value of the Aeneid was as an oracle. As late as the time of Charles I the Bible had not entirely supplanted the Aeneld for purposes of divination, as is evidenced by the well-known story of how that monarch learned his fates by the "Sortes Virgilianae," as it was called.

This practice of divination by books is said to have "originated in the respect and veneration of certain books arising from their wisdom and reputation"; and it is easy to comprehend the psychology which induced the people of the Middle ages to consult "Virgil the Wizard" and leads men of a superstitious trend of mind today to turn the Bible into an oracle. But the incipiency of the idea dates back to the first introduction of letters when, to the common mind, there was something supernatural in the power of a few marks made in a certain way to convey from one person to another not merely ideas but whole speeches, word for word; a feeling which is displayed today by remote tribes of savages when they see, for the first time, the use of the printed or written word in communications.





EVANGELINE'S EDEN ENGULFED BY FLOOD

Acadians Again Driven From Their Homes.

Washington.-The United States' sixth Great Lake, the Lake of the Mississippi, larger than Ontario or Erie, has engulfed the Evangeline country.

When it broke the Atchafalaya river's west dikes, the flood lake roiled its shores over and beyond St. Martin and St. Landry parishes.

"Again the Acadians have been driven from their homes," says a bulletin of the National Geographic society from its Washington headquarters. "And the disaster is greater, by number of sufferers, than that visited upon Evangeline's people in her time.

"Only 8,000 Acadians were expelled from Nova Scotia in 1765 by Massachusetts and British bayonets to be scattered over the earth from Detroit to Corsica and Cayenne. Fifteeen hundred of them found their way to New Orleans; many pushed on to Bayou Teche, 150 miles west. There they increased to some 150,000, occupying 15 parishes, or counties, when the flood spread over their homes, towns, and lands.

Beautiful is the land, with its prairies and forests of fruit trees; Under the feet a garden of flowers, and the bluest of heavens

Bending above, and resting its dome on the walls of the forest. They who dwell there name it the
Eden of Louisiana.

All year 'round the orange groves are in blossom; and grass grows More in a single night than a whole Canadan summer.

Turn to Stock Raising.

"For a poet, Longfellow's geography is fairly good. Basil, the Acadian blacksmith, has become a herdsman in 'Evangeline.' Most of the refugees in 1765 did turn to stock raising with a few cattle given to them by charitable French merchants of New Orleans. Descendants of the Acadians gave up stock raising for sugar cane when Etienne de Bore, a Louisianian, discovered how to crystallize sugar from cane syrup. They have helped to make Atchafalaya valley the

Sugar Bowl of Louisiana. "The route over which Longfellow takes Evangeline serves very well for a visitor today. Fifteen miles below Baton Rouge, where,

Sweeps with majestic curve the river away to the eastward, They, too swerved from their course;

and entering the Bayou of Plaquemine, Soon were lost in a maze of sluggish

and devious waters. "This bayou admits to the 'lakes of the Atchafalaya,' where 'water Iffies in myriads rocked on the slight undulations,' and rocked for years until the Mississippi broke through, threatening to make the Atchafalaya river its real mouth instead of an abandoned one

"How Evangeline got to Bayou late. Many swamp lanes communicate. The Bayou Teche parallels the Atchafalaya, but it is a true river out of the reach of swamps and bordered by Druid oaks. The two early centers of Acadian settlement were Opelousas the Teche. Now the flood has reached St. Martinsville for the first time in history and swirls at the foot of the 'Evangeline' oak where her boatmen landed. An Acadian descendant gave the Evangeline oak, with 150 acres of

land, for a state park. "While to readers of 'Evangeline' the inhabitants of southwest Louisiana are still Acadians, to Louisianians they are 'Cajans or 'Cajuns, a corruption of Acadian; Four kinds of Frenchmen inhabit the state: the Creoles, natives of French and Spanish descent; Frenchmen, who were born in France; the San Domingan Creoles. and finally the Nova Scotian Acadi-

ans, the 'Cajans. "The typical Creole frequents the city; the 'Cajan remains a country-

Raise Perlque Tobacco.

"The savor of the 'Cajan coast comes to us even though we never travel there. It rises steaming from chicken gumbo soup-real gumbo soup-a 'Cajan creation. It rides on the blue smoke wreaths from many pipes, for perique tobacco is also a 'Cajan product.

"Under the sad banners of Spanish moss waving on Evangeline's oak at St. Martinsville, one hears a different ending to the story Longfellow has

given us in verse. "Evangeline's real name was Emmerline Labiche, 'Cajans say, and Gabriel was Louis Arconeaux. They were deported on separate ships, but Emmerline landed in Maryland. Emmerline heard that Louis was in Louisiana, so she set out to reach him, and after many hardships came to St. Martinsville.

"Gabriel had gone, according to Longfellow, but Louis was there. In fact, local legend holds Emmerline rushed to Louis, the first person she saw at the landing. Louis told her, gently, that he had despaired of seeing her again. He had married. When she heard this her arms slipped from his neck. Her mind became blank. Emmerline day by day grew more frail. She drooped and died. This is

the 'Cajan story. "They buried her in the little churchyard near the tree where she found, Louis; the little churchyard where water now laps at the ancient graves. She has slept there undisturbed beside the bright bayon where bloom acres of sky-blue water-hyacinths in years when there is no tions

Leaf Hopper Found to Spread Yellows Disease.

In a report to the Engineering Foundation Dr. L. O. Kunkel, plant pathologist at the Boyce Thompson Institute for Plant Research, Yonkers, tells how a little gray insect, the aster leaf hopper, spreads the yellows disease of asters by first biting sick plants and then, after the virus has had ten days to incubate in its interior, biting healthy ones and planting the infection in their tissues.

Carries It to Fifty Others.

The same leaf hopper that transmits yellows to the China aster also carries it to more than fifty other species of wild and cultivated plants. hosts of aster yellows. On this plant it has long been known in the Southwest as the Rio Grande disease and in New York and other eastern states as the white heart disease. In the winter yellows lives on perennial weed hosts. During the summer, when the carrier leaf hopper is very active, it spreads rapidly to susceptible annual plants, such as the China aster

Spread of aster yellows and its host range depend largely on the likes and dislikes of the aster leaf hopper. The African marigold is quite susceptible but seldom takes the disease even when grown adjacent to yellowed aster plants. The leaf hopper does not like the marigold and seldom feeds upon it when other plants are available. If confined in a cage containing only marigold plants hunger drives it to feed upon them and they readily take the disease. It is fortunate that although wheat and other cereal crops are favorite hosts of this leaf hopper they are immune to the

Disease Known Only Here. The aster leaf hopper is thought to have been accidentally introduced into the United States from Europe is prevalent in Europe and the Orient, where the China aster is extensively grown, the aster yellows disease is known only in America. Thus a disease which is apparently endemic in America has been rendered much more serious through the importation of a European leaf hopper, and of an oriental plant, the China aster.

No satisfactory means is known of controlling the aster leaf hopper, but the yellows which it spreads can be held in check by digging out all infected perennial weed hosts in the vicinity of the field to be protected and by destroying all diseased annuals as soon as observed. A yellowed plant is a menace to nearby healthy plants just as a malaria patient is a menace to a healthy community in a region infested with the Anopheles mosquito.

Discover Anesthetic When Flowers Die

Chicago.-Because Wisconsin carnations went to sleep when brought to Chicago, science was able to discover ethylene, a new anesthetic as powerful as ether and less poisonous, doctors say.

Discovery followed an investigation by William Crocker and L. I. Knight, University of Chicago botanists, according to Dr. Arnold Luckhardt of the university's physiology department.

The botanists were called in to explain why carnations wilted when exposed to illuminating

Laboratory work then disclosed the gas possessed the principle of ethylene. Doctor Luckhardt conducted tests, even trying the new anesthetic on himself, before he introduced it to the medical profession.
