Chrysler-Dodge **Combination Third** Largest in World

NEW YORK, May 30 .- Merger of ed Tuesday by directors of both concerns, meeting separately, will make this combination the third largest in the automobile industry, with a total capitalization of nearly half a billion dollars at the current market value of Chrysler stock.

It is exceeded only by General Motors, the securities of which have a current market value of approximately \$3,500,000,000, and the Ford company, which has only a nominal amount of capital stock outstanding but which is valued at between \$1,500-000,000 and \$2,000,000,000.

Wall Street understands that plans are in contemplation for the acquisition by Chrysler of other automobile units, particularly in the higher priced fields, to round out an organization comparable to General Motors.
