R. N. Grisham of **Eastland Candi**date for Congress

Judge R. N. Grisham of Eastland, one of the most widely known members of the bar of West Texas, is in the race for Congress.

His candidacy is meeting with assurances of support throughout the district. He recently opened his campaign in Abilene, the largest city in the district, and the Hon. R. W. Haynie occupied a seat on the platform, Judge James Stinson delivered the speech of introduction, and among those who shook Judge Grisham's hand at the close of his speech were W. J. Cunningham, who made a brilliant race for Congress four years ago, ex-Mayor Scarborough, ex-mayor E. N. Kirby, J. M. Wagstaff and Rush Baby To Dallas Harry Tom King.

OLD VIOLIN SHOP BOASTS FAR FAME

Great Musicians Pick Way to Dingy Quarters.

Atlanta, Ga.-All the world's a stage for Mays Badgett. In it he humbly plays the part of a violin

His shop, two stories above Atlania's busiest corner, is dingy. About his bench is a confused ensemble of musical instruments. The clatter of traffic pounds in through dusty windows. But Badgett, as he works away with the knowledge that the proof of the fiddle is in the playing, would not trade his shop for a palace.

Famous personages of the musical world have made a beaten path to his place. Once a year he has a big party attended by members of the Metropolitan Opera company. Once Badgett gave a bear supper to 600 guests, including the opera stars, Sousa's band and southern artists.

Artists who sing and play for the public for thousands of dollars perform for Badgett between courses. Occasionally the party is broadcast and opera goers rush away from the auditorium to reach their radios for two more hours of music by the stars,





Control of Dirigible Simple but Effective

When I say Lincoln Beachey was running the dirigibles I mean it literally. The dirigibles of those days (1911) were about 40 feet long and their envelopes contained 20,000 cubic feet of hydrogen gas. They looked like cigars-and lasted about as long.

There was a lift of only 80 pounds to every 1,000 feet of hydrogen and this compelled us to construct the under carriage of bamboo.

This bamboo work was in the form of a steamer gangplank with a railing on either side. The motive power was furnished by an ordinary motorcycle engine situated in the center of the gangplank.

Beachey was the sole occupant of the dirigible, being engineer, crew, navigator and captain. He could not help being at least a captain, because that title was conferred on any man the minute he put a foot in a balloon basket.

Beachey controlled the antics of his dirigible by his activities on the 30foot gangplank. When he wanted to fly on the level he stayed in the center, hugging the engine. When he wanted to go up he ran backward on the gangplank, and when he desired to come down to earth he scooted forward until his weight caused the nose of the dirigible to droop. He weighed only 135 pounds, but couldn't shake a toe without causing his oiled-silk hippo to respond with a wiggle and a shiver.-William Hickman Pickens in the Saturday Evening Post.
