## Landreth Company **Buys Large Acreage** In Jones and Fisher

#### Corporation Which Recently Sold Low Grade Output Enters Fields Near Here.

The Landreth Production company, which recently sold Winkler county production to the Texas Company for \$6,500,000 has just invested heavily in choice acreage in the Fisher and Jones county high gravity areas, according to reports reaching here last night.

In addition to buying half interest intwo tracts near Hucony's No. 1 Tiner, north of the Noodle Creek field in southwestern Jones, Landreth has purchased half interest in 1729 acres near the three Fisher county producers. In both counties the interest was purchased from Roeser & Pendleton, Inc., of Fort Worth. Landreth already owned 450 acres in Fisher and put that acreage with 1275 acres of Roeser & Pendleton, each firm taking half interest. /

Two factors have caused major concerns and large independent operators to become interested in these fields. One is the fact that production of both the Tiner in Jones and the No. Many Fast Drivers of both the Tiner in Jones and the No. 1 Steele of the Sinclair near the discovery well in Fisher County are producing consistently above 600 barrels daily of high grade crude.

The other reason for instant activity near the wells is that the Humble Oil & Refining company has already entered Jones and will presently enter Fisher with pipe lines from its trunk line passing through eastern Jones county. This frees the producers from a 10 to 12 cent penalty on each barrel, representing the cost of running the oil from the well to the loading racks and shipping it to refineries. A saving of approximately 8 cents per barrel is thus effected.

The Tiner well produced 620 barrels for the 24 hours ending yesterday morning. The Steele well swabbed 602 barrels.

## Noodle Creek Field Adds 24th Producer

The Phillips Petroleum Company's oe Winter No. 3, which was drilled into the pay last Tuesday afternoon, swabbed 175 barrels initially. The total depth is 2509, seven feet in the pay sand, it is said.

The rig for this well was erected more than a year ago, back in the first boom days, and is an east offset to the original Joe Winter discovery well, and it now seems that it will be one of the best producers in the field.

The Tiner, the latest big sensation of the field, which brought an extension of more than two miles to the

northeast, is holding up its production of more than six hundred barrels daily. Around this well there has been erected nine new derricks, with five of them already spudded in and drilling now.

New people are coming in every day; in fact the hotels are all filled every night, and it's getting hard to find private rooms, with practically no houses for rent. Merkel needs a number of nice, new, up-to-date houses for renting purposes. A good investment for some one with the means to erect them.



State Wins In **Oil Land Suit** 

AUSTIN, Texas, June 26 .- A verdict carrying a judgment worth unestimated millions was returned Tuesday for the State in its suit for more than five hundred acres of Hutchinson County oil land by a jury in District Court. The action was brought on the theory that the tract is vacant of valid title and therefore should revert to the State. The exact extent of recovery will be determined later.

Some sixty oil companies and individuals, present holders of the area, were defendants. Motions for a new trial probably will be prepared after those for compilation of judgment have been submitted.

Nearly all witnesses were technicians, testifying as to surveys made in the county.

The action is similar to another thus far won, asking possession of many acres in Harris county. In that case the judgment for the State was estimated unofficially at the sum of \$8,000,000.

**Ruled** Legal

Annual saving of approximately \$4,000,000 to Texans who have been making community income tax returns will be effected if the decision of Judge William H. Atwell, handed down in federal court at Dallas yesterday in the test case of C. W. Bacon, Abilene, vs George C. Hopkins, collector of internal revenue at Dallas, is upheld in the higher federal courts.

Texas property owners scored a far-reaching victory with Judge Atwell's decision, which declared the Texas law providing that property of the husband and wife be divided equally and so rendered for income tax purposes, is legal.

Upholding the Texas statute, Judge Atwell ruled that Mr. and Mrs. Bacon each should pay income tax on onehalf the property. The government maintained that Mr. Bacon should have filed a single return for all the property, thus paying additional tax of \$1,975.57.

Defeated in the federal court, the government will appeal the sixth district court of appeals in New Orleans. If defeated there its only recourse will be in the United States supreme court.

The first unit will cost \$15,000 and

seat 5,000 people, making the total seating capacity of Parramore Field 10,000 for the coming football season. Several high school games will probably also be played on the Simmons grid. The Stadium as planned when com-

pleted will seat nearly 20,000 people and give Simmons the largest stands in West Texas.

The new playing field is to run north and south and the first unit will be erected on the West side of the field.

### Many Uses for Flaxseed

Flaxseed is grown primarily for the production of linseed oil, each short ton of seed producing from 70 to 80 gallons of oil, which is used in the manufacture of paints and varnish. linoleum, oilcloth, printers' ink, patent leather, imitation leather and sundry other products. The cake that is left after the oil is pressed out is valued as a feed for dairy and beef cattle and finds a ready market. A large part of the cake produced in this country is exported, principally to the Netherlands, Belgium and the United Kingdom. The United States is the second largest producer of flaxseed in the world, but, in spite of this fact. this country is also the world's largest importer of this product. Our production ordinarily takes care of about 55 per cent of our domestic requirements. This year the United States produced approximately 24,270,000 bushels.

## Find Old Roman Town

on Farm in Britain London .- Recent discoveries in and around the town of Stockbridge, Hampshire, have led archeologists to believe that the site of a former Roman town has been discovered.

In 1924 Ernest Barnard discovered on his 850-acre farm the foundations of two Roman baths and three villas. He has since unearthed the positions of over a dozen other Roman buildings.

Among the more recent discoveries are several hundred copper coins. parts of a tortolse-shell necklace, an oyster opener, a razor, a quantity of broken pottery and two grinding stones.

Barnard has also discovered what he believes to have been a Roman vineyard, with terraces cut in the rising upland. Further finds were two huge stones, probably forming the bases of pillars of the entrance gates of an imposing Roman building. Roman bricks have been found built into the walls of an Elizabethan cot-

tage in the town, while in the neighboring village of Kings Somborne several people have collected quite a show of Roman and early British relics. Such importance is attached to the discoveries that a British museum ex-

pert is making a personal investiga-

AWARDS TO START THIS FALL Students in Agricultural Economics to Be Helped in Farm States-Will Also Facilitate Entry Into Business Life. One hundred and sixty-seven colleiate loan scholarships will be providd by the American Bankers Association, 98 of which are now being proffered to 71 selected colleges and universities in 34 states, it has been announced by John H. The general plan allots scholarships to higher institutions of learning in states where the banks have completed the subscription quotas assigned them in the foundation fund. Institutions are selected on the basis of type of school, educational standards, geographical distribution and desire to co-operate in the plan. A scholarship committee is to be created in each selected institution, to consist of members of the faculty and a prominent banker. All scholarship applications must be made formally through the college committees and not direct to the foundation. Three home-town references are required of each applicant, at least one of whom must be a hanker. Only students of funior or higher grade in banking and economic courses are eligible and those who have also attended American Institute of Banking courses will be given preference.

#### Easy Terms

Scholarship payments will be given only to those whose means of education are dependent in whole or part upon their own efforts and will continue only during satisfactory scholastic standing or conduct. The loans are at five per cent beginning the first day of the second January after the date the scholar leaves school, with no interest on repayment made prior to that time. Loans may be paid off in monthly installments of \$10 or more. After three installments have been promptly met payments may be placed on a quarterly basis until the loan is wiped out which must occur within three years. In cases of delinquencies, consideration will be given to special circumstances, such as ill health or unavoidable unemployment.
