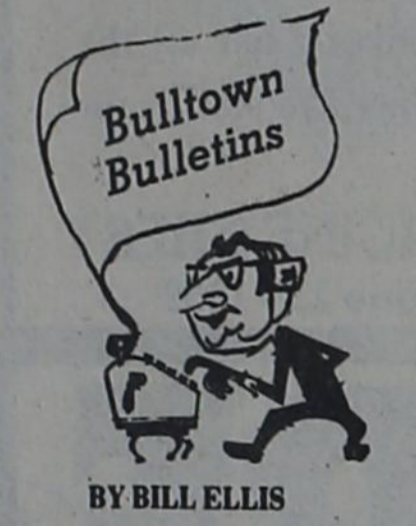

OUR NEW PRESIDENT had named inflation as the country's No. 1 enemy and has taken the first step to start the war against it.

Unfortunately, to our way of thinking he has started out by shuffling his feet and has held back on his real knockout punch.

On August 24, he signed the bill he asked for, to set up a Council on Wage and Price Stability. The new council will monitor the various facets of inflation. However, it will adopt a "Look but don't touch" attitude, thereby escaping the mess the former Cost of Living Council created with its wage and price controls.

President Ford himself sees little immediate results coming from his new council. In signing the legislation creating it he said: "It would be unrealistic to expect the council to bring any immediate relief from inflation. Industry and labor will have their work cut out for them in exercising every possible restraint in price and wage increases. We face an uphill road, and we will make it through only if we all pull together."

The Council cannot have any effect on inflation except to point out where it is hitting the hardest and then attempt to persuade those involved to back up.

However, the President did make a statement that we believe should have been his first consideration in the battle against inflation, instead of setting up a Council simply to tell us we are suffering from higher prices. That first consideration should have been reducing the Federal budget.

The President declared, "We are going to hold the line on spending. The target, of course, is a figure in this fiscal year of under \$300 billion. We can do it. We are going to do it. And that ought to be reassuring, I think, to the American people."

Mr. President, we agree that that is reassuring. We need a substantial cutback in government spending to beat inflation a lot more than we need a Council to tell us how high prices and wages have increased.

WHEN WASHINGTON POLITICIANS talk of cutting the Federal budget, they invariably aim the scalpel at the Defense Department. However, that is like operating on a benign wart while ignoring a raging cancer in another part of the patient.

The cancer is the nation's social programs which have grown wildly in recent years and failed to give America much of a return on its investment. The Federal budget for the current fiscal year, which tops \$300 billion for the first time, includes \$100 billion for income security programs. That's more than double the amount spent on these programs in 1969.

Consider further: In 1968, President Johnson's last budget year, the government obligated \$75.6 billion for defense and military assistance programs. The total requested by former President Nixon for this year is \$92.6 billion, which, because

## Little Buckaroo Rodeo Entries Due Sept. 13

Entries have begun coming in for the Bovina CowBelle-sponsored Little Buckaroo Rodeo set here Saturday, Sept. 14.

Deadline for turning in entries in the rodeo is 5 p.m. Friday, the day before the event. The entry blank and fees

may be deposited at Bovina Supermarket, according to a member of the club.

"We want to urge all our local buckaroos to get their entry blanks in early in order to assure themselves of getting a place in the event they desire," Mrs. C.C. Naegle, CowBelle president, said this week. Each event will be limited to the first 25 contestants to turn in entry blanks and fees.

The rodeo will begin at 4 p.m. at the Roping Arena east of town with the CowBelles operating a concession stand on the grounds which will feature homemade items such as barbecue beef sandwiches, tamales, tacos and hot sauce. Also available will be candy, soft drinks and tea.

Arrangements are being made this week for television coverage of the first such event to be held in Bovina. An Amarillo station has indicated they would be willing to send a cameraman to cover the event.

Nine horseback and 11 foot events are on tap for youngsters 12 and under with ribbons awarded contestants through sixth place in all events with the exception of the calf and greased pig scrambles.

Some of the events on the schedule, which will be divided into two age categories, include goat ribbon races, stick horse races, egg and spoon races, waterbucket obstacle, father and son relay and mother and daughter relay races and the scrambles.

A special rodeo clown will be on hand to furnish entertainment during the afternoon.

Entry blanks may be picked up at The Bovina Blade, Don's Medicine Chest, First State Bank and Bovina Supermarket.

The CowBelles will meet at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the home of Mrs. A.M. Wilson to complete plans for the rodeo.

## Enrollment Totals 603

Enrollment in Bovina Schools increased by 24 last week and this after the opening day total was announced, according to Superintendent L.F. Jacobs.

Total number of students as of Tuesday morning was 603 as compared with the total of 579 Tuesday noon of last week.

The enrollment this year is off 15 from the same time a year ago when the count was 618 and down 31 from the enrollment of 634 at the same time in 1972.

Jacobs says he expects the number of students enrolling

here to increase for the next several weeks.

Broken down into grades, the enrollment is as follows-kindergarten, 21; first grade, 53; second, 51; third, 51; fourth, 48; fifth, 64; sixth, 37; seventh, 55; eighth, 56; ninth, 42; 10th, 42; 11th, 48; and 12th, 34.

Most schools throughout the Plains area are reporting slight decreases in the number of students over the past several years. It marked the third consecutive year for enrollment in the Bovina Schools to take a slight dip.

Telephone rates of customers of the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc., were reviewed at a meeting Wednesday of last week of the directors of the organization, according to Vernon Inmon, general manager of the cooperative, which is based in Hereford.

Inmon said the review was undertaken due to the continuing rise in costs of both labor, material and operations experienced locally and nationwide.

"In an effort to fight inflation, the board voted unanimously not to increase base rates at this time," said Inmon. "The directors feel strongly that it is necessary for everyone to attempt to stem the tide of inflation, although they agreed that another review would be necessary in approximately six months," he commented.

The telephone cooperative serves customers in Parmer, Deaf Smith, Castro and Bailey counties.

An experiment, which could turn out to be of major importance to this area, was begun on two farms here last week. Crawler tractor rigs are putting a layer of asphalt 22 inches under the top soil. The asphalt layer stops fertilizer and water from going past that point, resulting in the need for half the normal amount of fertilizer and one-third the normal amount of irrigation water. 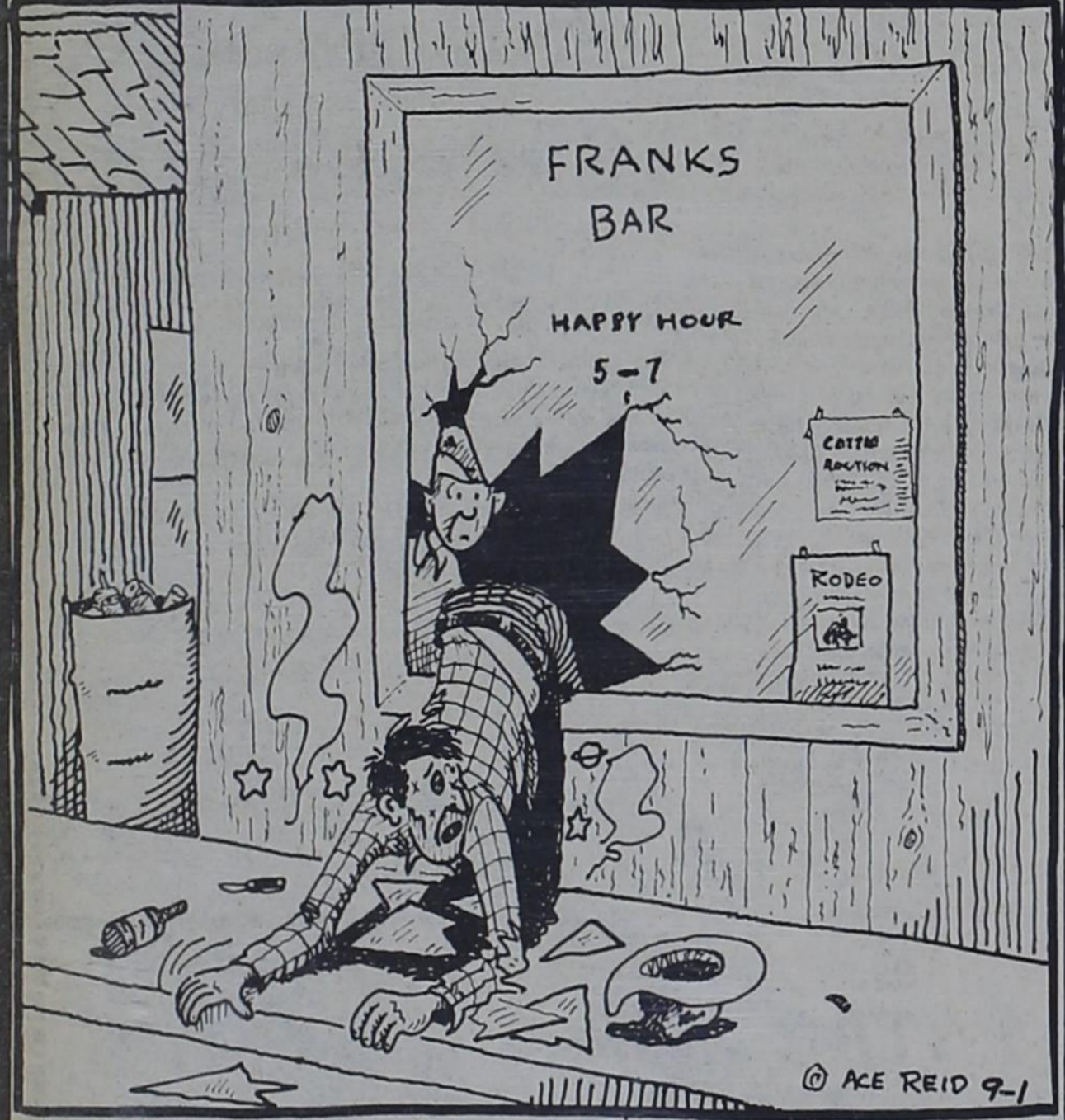

The couple will be at home at 2217 S. Polk in Amarillo.



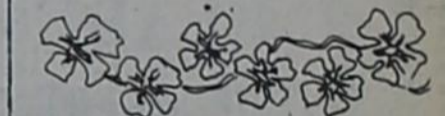

**Benefits Received By 185 Children In Parmer County**

"Is Social Security for children? The answer is obviously yes, since 185 children here in Parmer County are now receiving monthly social security benefits," says William Ent, social security field representative.

Benefits can be paid to children when one of their parents retires, becomes disabled, or dies. Of course, the parent must have worked a sufficient period of time in employment covered by social security.

An unmarried child under 18 can be paid monthly benefits. If the child continues in school as a full-time student, he may be paid until age 22.

Ent notes that one type of children's benefits that is paid is for children who were disabled before age 22. This means, of course, that there is no age limit on this benefit if the disability occurred before age 22.

A child may be disabled as a result of a physical impairment, a mental impairment, or a combination of both.

The Social Security Administration normally pays benefit checks for a child to a parent or other relative with whom the child is living. Other times, checks are paid to someone else who has a strong interest in the child's welfare. In other instances, a legal guardian or representative of a institution


or non-profit agency is named to handle the funds.



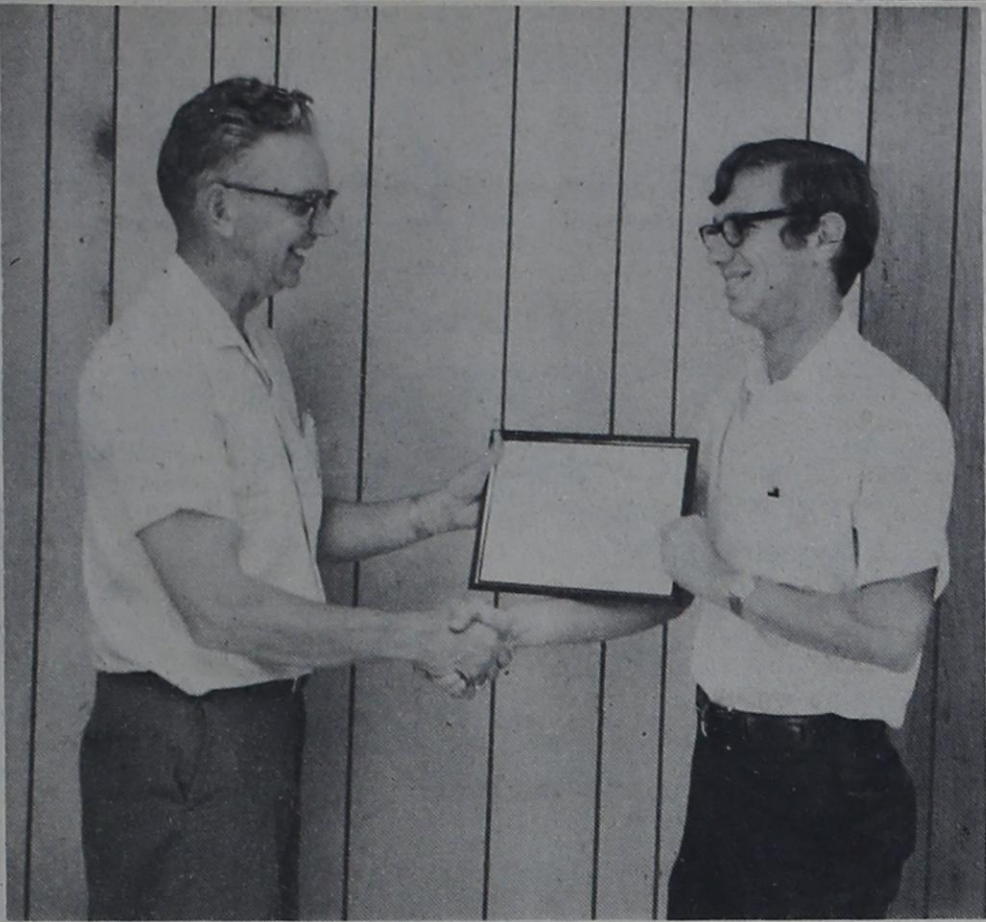

of inflation, is actually a decrease from 1968.

In comparison, the amount spent by Federal, State and local governments for domestic social and economic programs in 1966 was \$123 billion. The comparable amount in 1976 will be just over \$400 billion. In other words, these programs during the last 10 years have been increasing at an average annual rate of 12.6 percent—more than twice as fast as the growth of the GNP, which provides the tax base to pay for them.

Can there be any doubt where the real impetus to inflationary government spending is originating?

What is even more disturbing about this ruinous trend is the uneasy feeling that too many of those hard-earned tax dollars are going to those who don't deserve them. The Secretary of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare earlier this year reported that four out of every ten families receiving funds from the nation's largest welfare program were found to be either ineligible or paid incorrectly. Secretary Caspar Weinberger said that "national scandal" alone is costing taxpayers more than \$1 billion annually. How many similar scandals are buried in government files?

We are by nature a generous people. None of us would deny to the truly needy our helping hand if it were at all possible to extend it. But none of us wants to feed a welfare cheater.

Next time someone talks about where those tax dollars are being wasted, do us all a favor and set him straight.

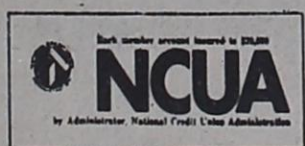

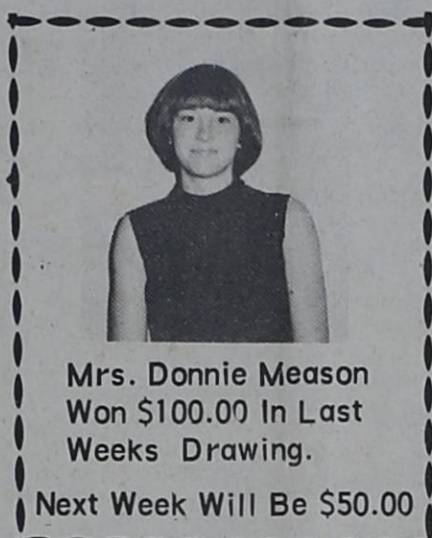

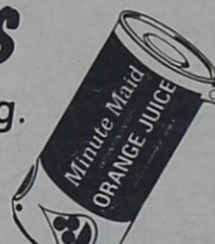

# Ponies, Roughriders Battle In Gridiron Opener

The 1974 football season will be officially launched Friday night for Bovina's Mustangs when they travel to Boys Ranch to do battle with the Roughriders.

The game will begin at 8 p.m. In the Mustang camp, enthusiasm, tempered with a bit of concern over several portions of the lineup along with a couple of injured Ponies, is running high for the kickoff of the '74 season.

The Ponies will be attempting to regain their supremacy over the Roughriders, losing last year in an upset-type game for the first loss in four years to the Class AA outfit.

In 1970, Bovina outscored Boys Ranch, 32-7; in '71, topped their opponents, 27-18; shutout

the cowboys in '72, 16-0; and slipped last year to a 14-0 defeat on Mustang Field.

Although Bovina has been given the nod over the AA Roughriders the past several years, Boys Ranch will probably be given the edge in this year's contest based on the results of last years game.

Head Coach Roger Ezell watched Boys Ranch in their only scrimmage of the year-against Friona-and came away impressed by the Mustangs' first opponents.

"They have good size this year with a front line probably averaging about 190," he said this week. "They have 13 seniors on the roster and are reputed to have their strongest team in the past four years."

Boys Ranch will run out of a full I offense with a quarterback that can throw the ball well, according to reports.

Ezell was both encouraged and apprehensive about his teams' effort in a scrimmage session Friday night against Clovis junior varsity at Mustang Field.

"We moved the ball well most of the time, but seem to need to develop the big play," he commented.

Although keeping score isn't the main objective in scrimmage games, Clovis scored two times-once on a 60-yard run and the second time on an 80-yard pass play-while Bovina pushed across one counter, using about 16 plays to move the ball across the goal line.

"We were consistant and didn't fumble, which pleased us. We picked up a steady three or four yards every play, but just didn't come up with the big plays we needed," he reported.

He said that defensively, most of the team performed well with the exception of several breakdowns in the secondary. "Our line and linebackers did a good job, we thought."

Although no injuries were sustained by the Bovina Squad in the Clovis scrimmage, two Ponies will probably be out of action for the first game of the season with injuries suffered in practice. Alton McCormick, senior halfback, is out with a knee injury and Tommy Serna, a sophomore halfback, is out with an ankle injury. Ezell said neither player has worked out this week.

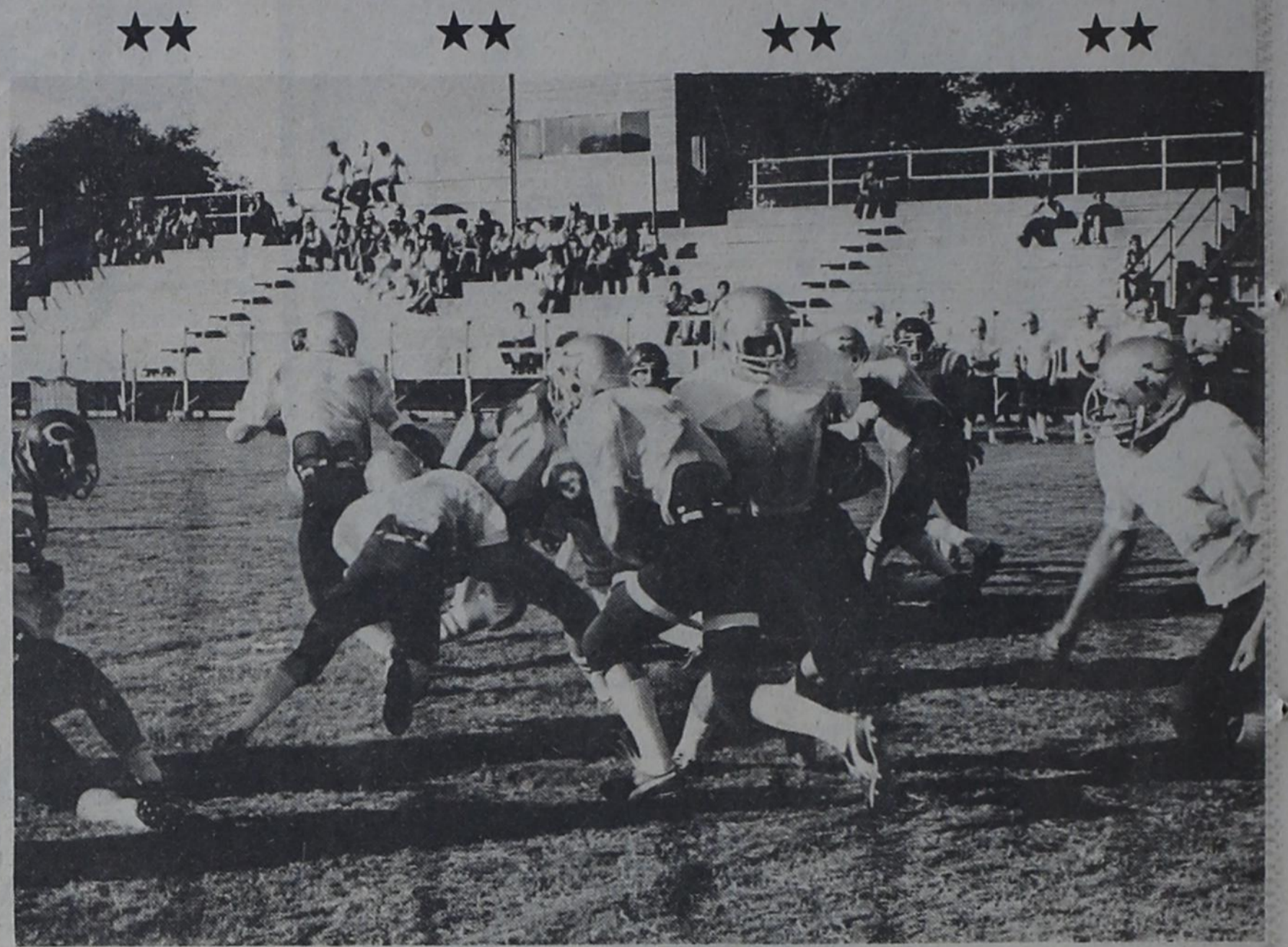
