## Bailey County Planting Moisture Lags

### Light Rains 'Fall Short' For Farmers Ranchers

Bailey County groundwater levels declined an average of 1.03 feet in 1989 in 78 privately-owned wells measured by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in its 353,900 acre service area in the county. This decline indicates a reduction of 54,677 acre-feet of water from storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in the portion of Bailey County lying within the boundaries of the Water District.

Tryouts will be Friday, April 27, 7-9:30 p.m. in the high school auditorium.

Kerry Moore will again be director of the play.

A cast of about 15 will be chosen, and all ages will be used in the play. This is your chance to be a star -- so come on out and join the fun!!

The annual production will again include popular variety acts and will be expanded from last year.

In order to utilize more local talent, a different set of acts may be used each night of the two night production, with more comedy included.

Also, the very popular candy sale will be expanded this year, so make your plans now for the tryouts April 27, and for the production on Monday and Tuesday, July 2-3.

The change in groundwater levels within this portion of Bailey County during the 10-year period from 1980 to 1990 was a decline of 5.6 feet. Groundwater levels declined 0.6 of a foot during the five year period from 1985 to 1990.

Groundwater levels in the Ogallala Aquifer in the Water District's 5.5 million-acre service area had an average decline of one foot from January 1989 to January 1990, indicating a net reduction of 825,000 acre-feet of groundwater stored in the Ogallala Aquifer.

In 1985, groundwater levels in the Ogallala Aquifer in the Water District service area showed a zero net change for the first time in the Water District's history. In 1986, a one-half foot average rise in water levels was recorded, followed by an average rise of 0.9 of a foot in 1987. Below average precipitation resulted in heavier pumpage in 1988 and caused groundwater levels to decline one-half foot.

Drier than normal pre-plant soil moisture conditions and below average precipitation during the growing season caused irrigators to apply heavier and more frequent irrigations than normal in 1989.

A network of 1,018 privately-owned observation water wells is used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the District. Depth to water measurements are taken during January and February of each year after water levels have had time to stabilize from pumping during the previous growing season.

By comparing the current depth to water measurements with those taken early in the previous year, District staff members determine what

#### Now Organized

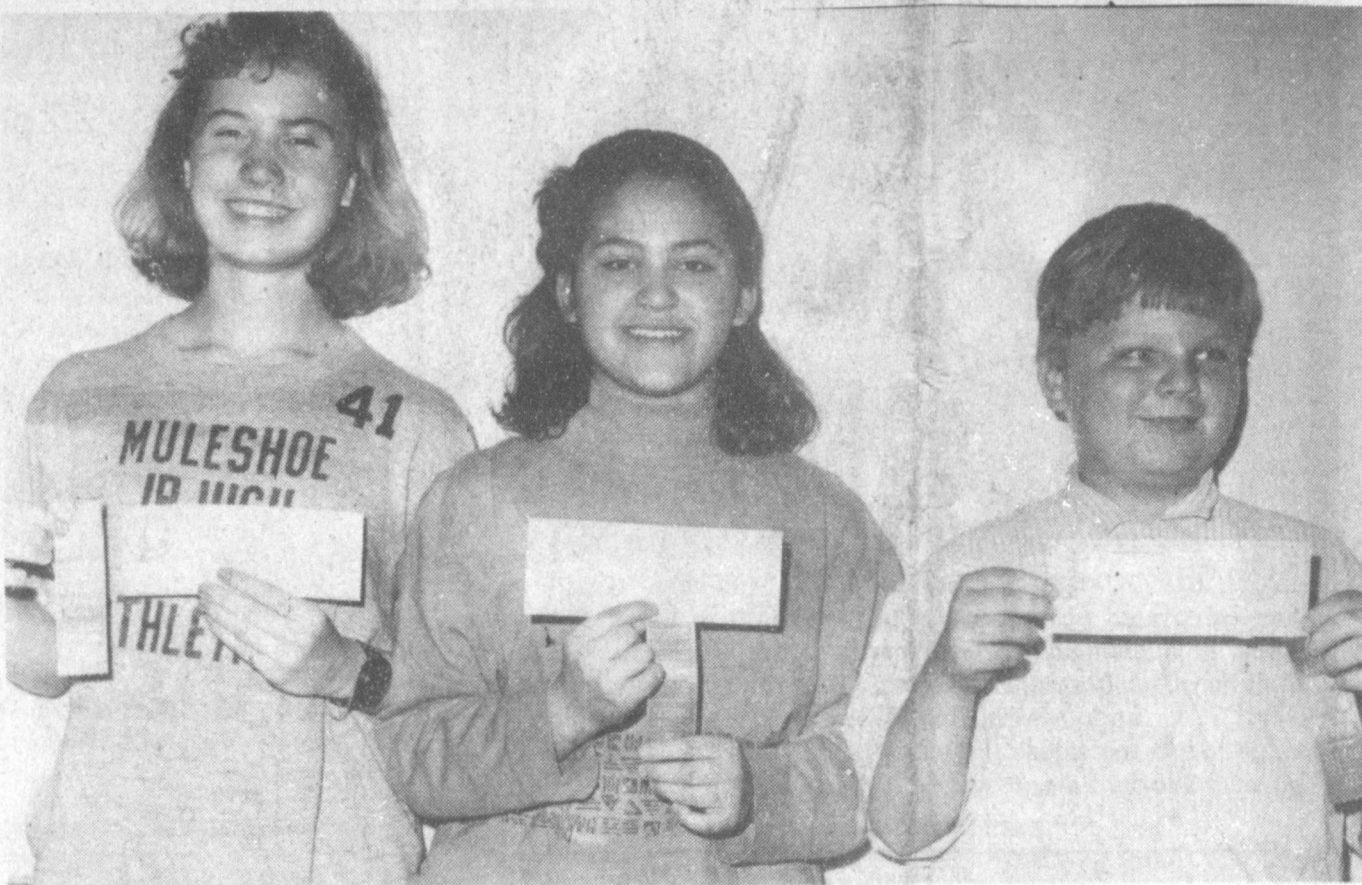

## Pesticide Applicators Must Take, Pass Test

Bailey County producers will have the opportunity to complete training to meet one of the requirements for obtaining a private applicator license at a program scheduled for March 28, 1990, beginning at 8 a.m. at the Bailey County Civic Center in Muleshoe, according to Spencer Tanksley, County Extension Agent.

To become a licensed private applicator, a producer must attend a Texas Agricultural Extension Service private applicator training program, make a passing score on a Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) private applicator examination and submit an application to TDA along with a required \$50 fee. The private applicator license is valid for five years.

Producers holding TDA private applicator certificates dated prior to January 10, 1989, may continue to buy and use restricted-use and state-limited-use pesticides.

Producers holding TDA private applicator certificates dated January 10, 1989, and after, but prior to January 1, 1990, may also continue to buy and use restricted-use and state-limited-use pesticides. However, persons holding private applicator certificates dated January 10, 1989, and after, but prior to January 1, 1990, will be required to become licensed private applicators within five years.

The private applicator training program is available to those persons not previously certified and to those previously certified who will be supervising the application of restricted-use and/or state-limited-use pesticides and who wish to obtain a TDA private applicator license.

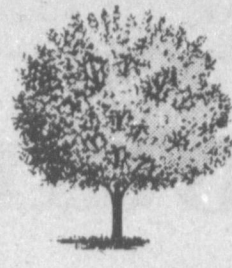

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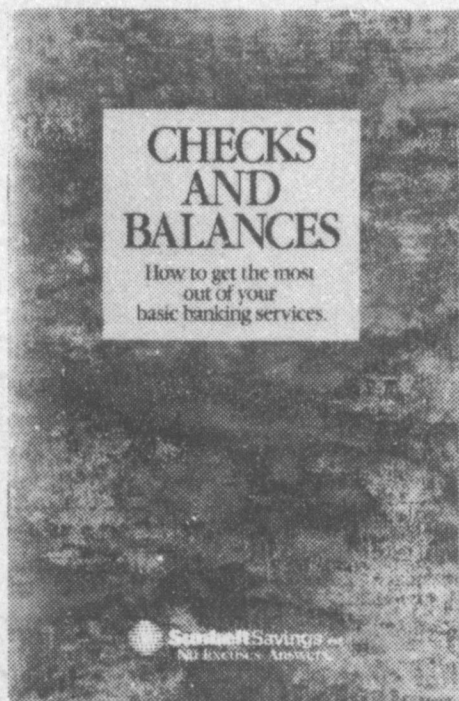
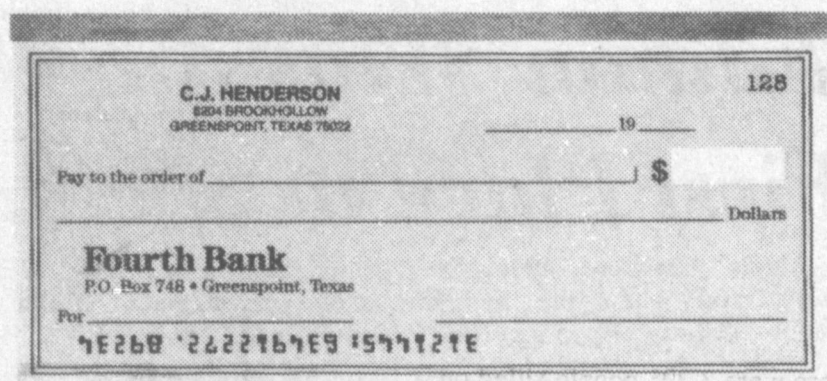
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## Former Muleshoe Woman Jail's Highest Ranking Woman

**Editors Note--**The following article was written by John Walls and was taken from Thursday's edition of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. Mrs. Clements is the daughter of Mae Provence, formerly of Muleshoe and the daughter-in-law of Dee and Ruth

Clements of Muleshoe.

The Lubbock County Jail is primarily a man's domain.

With approximately 600 male inmates and 100 male officers, women do not form a substantial number of the faces filing

through the jail.

But one woman stands out among the crowd of men, commanding respect as she walks through the lock-up's corridors.

Capt. Paula Clements, a 13-year department veteran, is the jail's highest-ranking woman. Only two jail administrators have more authority.

"She's all right," said Sheriff D.L. "Sonny" Keesee. "Paula is one of our more seasoned officers and is certainly a credit not only to this department but to this profession. She's a tireless worker and a good friend."

Although she works primarily with males, gender rarely has affected her duties.

"I haven't really had that much problem in handling male inmates," Mrs. Clements said.

She rarely has to go into a male tank to break up a fight because her job is to supervise, she said.

Occasionally, though, she has to take control of a situation.

"I'm not ever going to say I haven't had a scrap with a male," Mrs. Clements said.

Nor does she have much grief from her fellow officers. Some of the males might not like working for a female, she said. "But they don't let me know about it."

"I think I've been accepted as well as any," she said.

Mrs. Clements started in the law enforcement business when her late husband, then a deputy at the jail, came home one day and told her one of the female deputies was on vacation for two weeks.

He asked her, "Do you think you can handle it?"

"Basically, I knew what I was getting into," Mrs. Clements said.

She worked part time for more than three months before joining the force full time. That was 13 years ago.

Mrs. Clements said one of her first contributions to the department was removing the title "matron" from the female deputies.

"I don't like the word 'matron' she said. 'We're certified officers, just like the males.'"

She progressed quickly through the ranks, earning the rank of sergeant in 1981.

"I figured that was as high as they'd let a female go," Mrs. Clements said.

She was promoted to lieutenant in 1983, but she hesitated taking the position, knowing she would have to move to night shift with some children still at home.

"I finally made up my mind to take it," she said.

She was promoted to captain in 1984.

Even though the work sometimes is stressful, she enjoys the pace of her work, particularly in comparison to her former job as a secretary for an insurance company.

Mrs. Clements said she has suffered very few injuries, other than being hit in the eye with a can of cleanser thrown by an inmate.

"That is probably when I learned you don't turn your head on a prisoner when they have something in their hand," she said. "It probably hurt my pride more than anything."

But the Clements family tradition in law enforcement continues.

Three of Mrs. Clements children already are in law enforcement and two other sons are planning law enforcement careers.

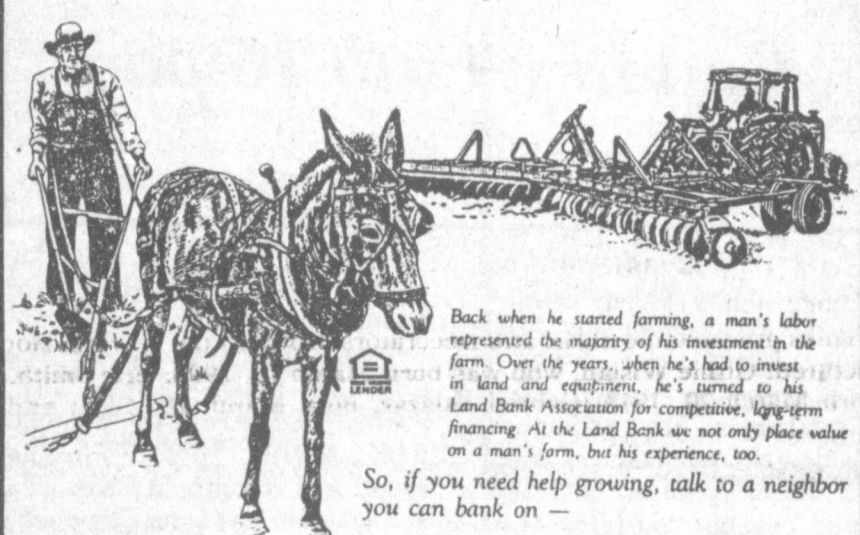

The Texas Department of Public Safety has reported that there were 3,395 people killed on Texas highways during 1988. This is four percent increase over 1987. That averages 9.3 people per day. There were however 13 days when 20 or more were killed and on Sunday, October 9, 1988, there were 30 traffic fatalities, 17 of which were caused by drunk drivers. It has been eleven years since no one was killed on Texas highways on any single day.

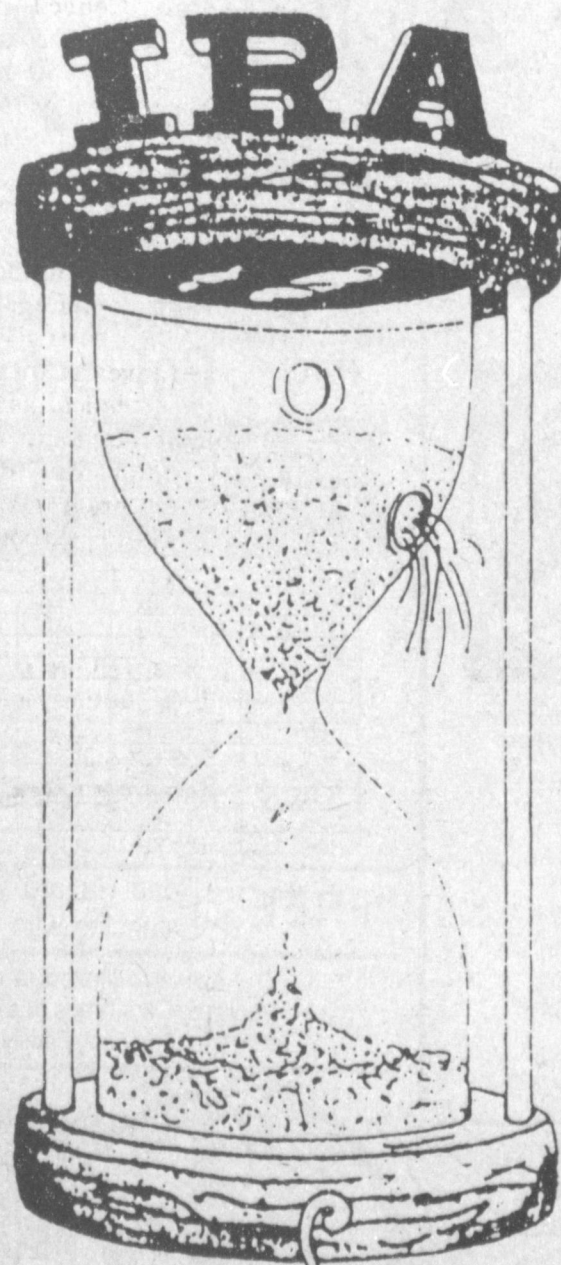

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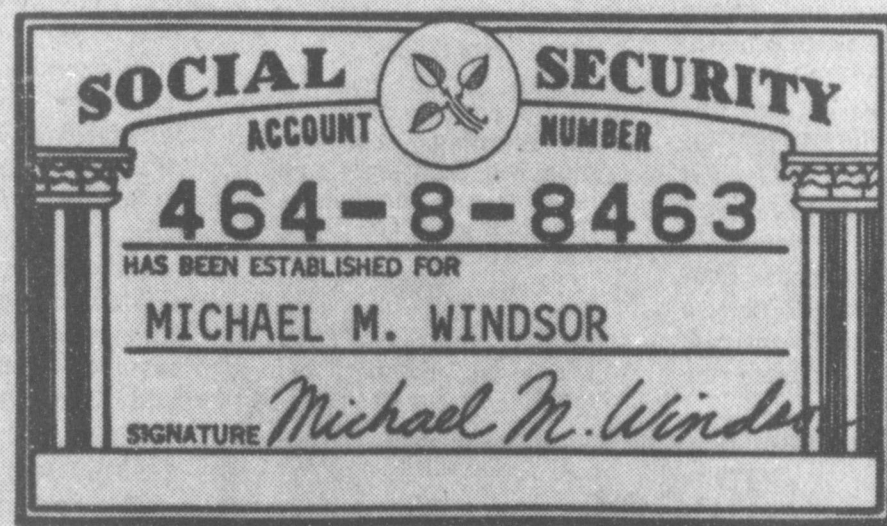

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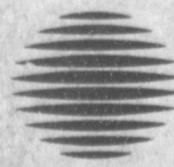

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## MAMC Gives Pay Raises To Employees

Wednesday night, three of the five board members of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District, along with interim administrator, Rita Mason; nursing home administrator Rachel Snider and incoming hospital district administrator, Richard Murphy, present for the meeting.

Mrs. Mason presented the hospital financial and statistical report.

For February, 56 patients were in the hospital for 181 patient days.

This made an average daily census of 6.5 patients for both private and Medicare.

Two babies were born at the hospital and 13 pediatric patients were admitted.

Fifteen Medicare patients and six Medicaid patients were admitted in February.

Percentage of occupancy for the 31-beds available was 21 percent, compared to 11.9 percent at the same time a year ago.

There were 123 emergency room visits, compared to 79 in February, 1989; other visits totaled 169, compared to 114 at the same time a year ago.

Other visits included 119 for radiology; 38 in physical therapy and 12 in respiratory.

The nursing home administrator reported the current census at 45, with two admissions and one death in February.

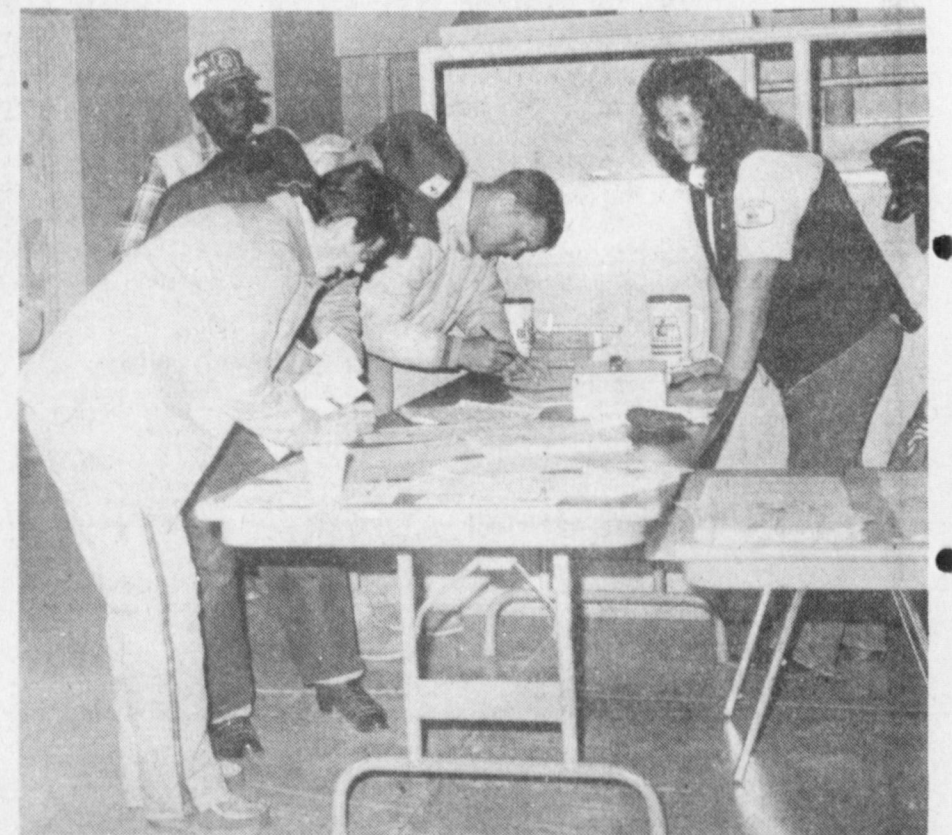

I try to stress constant teamwork in band. Students will function much better in society if they learn early how to work together."

Heidel graduated from Lamesa High School and attained both a Bachelor of Music Education and a Master of Music degree at Texas Tech University. His parents are John Heidel of Lamesa, Texas, and Ms. Bert Heidel, who resides in Lubbock. In his "spare" time, he enjoys hunting, fishing, tennis, chess, reading, and relaxing. Mark Heidel, with his love for music and his expertise in teaching, is an important factor at Muleshoe High School.

Aby assisting Heidel in the high school band program and directing the Watson Jr. High band, Martha Anthis is in her sixteenth year with MISD. After graduation from Texas Tech

University, Ms. Anthis began her teaching career in Muleshoe; she holds both a Bachelor and a Master's degree in Music Education. She stated, "My goal is for the MHS/WJHS band department to be the best it's ever been. Greatness alone isn't what counts—it's the trip to greatness that really counts." She revealed an insight into her own success by stating that nothing gives her greater joy than seeing students succeed, especially when they thought they couldn't do it. When she can find the time from her busy schedule, traveling and reading bring her much pleasure; in addition, she enjoys going to college and taking education courses. Ms. Anthis' parents reside in Lubbock and she has an older sister in San Antonio and an older brother who lives in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia.

Kerry Moore, speech and theatre director at MHS, is well known throughout the state of Texas. He graduated from WTSU with a B.A. degree. For thirty years he has diligently directed speech and theatre performances of Muleshoe students, and their level of excellence is noted from the district to the state level. The one-act play, a highlight of each year's student work, has advanced to state numerous times; several of these plays have been named the best in 3-A competition. Moore seeks "to provide the students with the opportunities to be their very best." This includes the opportunity to excel individually and in group performances. He also hopes to instill in his students an understanding of life's responsibilities. Patricia S. Moore, with her supportive attitude, is a positive influence for her husband and the students

with whom he works. When he can find time for hobbies, Moore enjoys softball and going to movies.

John Gulley, chairman of the foreign language department at MHS, has been teaching in Muleshoe for five years. After completing his B.A. degree at Texas Tech in 1972, he taught at Midland High School from 1972-1976. He again attended Tech in 1976, where he secured an M.P.A. degree in 1978. He returned to Muleshoe and worked for the Farmer's Home Administration for one year and served as manager of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce from 1980-1984. Perhaps his comment that "Teaching is never boring because each student is a unique individual" explains his desire to return to teaching. He has developed a strong foreign language department which serves the needs of many students. He now teaches Spanish II and French as well as one class of speech. Gulley stated that important goals this year include helping students to adjust to the new textbooks and to increase their oral skills in a

foreign language. His teaching duties, as well as working with Kerry Moore in the production of the one-act play, leave little time for his hobbies of tennis and movies. Students and their needs are important to Mr. Gulley and he views the privilege of watching students mature through high school into young adults as a very rewarding experience, especially when an individual is able to help those students in this growth process.

"In twenty-one years of teaching, I've never encountered student who couldn't learn. Young people are our future leaders and it is our responsibility as teachers to challenge them to be productive leaders." This statement sums up the philosophy of Lanelle Skaggs, who teaches four classes of Spanish I and one class of English at MHS. After attaining her B.A. degree at Wayland Baptist University, she began her teaching career at Texico, New Mexico, followed by a stint at Lazbuddie. She is currently in her thirteenth year with MISD. She received her special education certification at WTSU

and has earned nine hours of ESL certification at WBU. Her goal as a teacher of Spanish is to make sure the students learn enough Spanish through speaking, listening, and writing to function in Spanish II and to gain an awareness of the skills and culture of the Spanish language. Lanelle and Gary Skaggs have two children; their son Cary is a senior at MHS and Janna attends kindergarten at Dillman Elementary School. Mrs. Skaggs enjoys music and working with ceramics, but her family's activities garner the majority of her spare time and attention.

Many hours of hard work and planning create an atmosphere in which students can achieve in the fine arts and foreign language departments at Muleshoe High School. Dedicated teachers in these departments express concern for the academic and the personal development of the students and implement unique programs designed to meet the student's needs.

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## Lazbuddie Woman Named To Board

A Lazbuddie mother of five has been named to the State Parent Advisory Council for Migrant Children (PAC). Mrs. Fidela Everett is one of only fifteen members chosen from throughout the state to sit on a committee of parents in an advisory capacity to the state's migrant program.

Mrs. Everett explained, "As a member of the Parent Advisory Committee, I shall be one of fifteen responsible for advising the Texas Education Agency in planning, implementing, and evaluating the state program designed to meet the educational needs of our migrant children."

She added, "I am very honored to be chosen as a member of this great committee."

Mrs. Everett said that the

committee will meet three times during the school year in Austin. At this meeting, the committee members, which include a superintendent, a counselor, a teacher, and parents, will discuss a variety of subjects concerning the plans for the future of migrant children.

She listed the role of PAC as follows: 1. to establish and strengthen the cooperation of parents in the education of their children; 2. to provide volunteer help to the classroom teacher to better meet the individual needs of migrant children; 3. to develop an environment that encourages friendly two-way communication between home and school; 4. to allow parents to make significant contributions to their school and to their community.

Mrs. Everett said, "I will do my best to bring information from these conferences so that we can better serve migrant children."

She praised the Lazbuddie I.S.D. migrant program and said that she enjoys working with the school. She works closely with teachers who head up the migrant program. Miss Debra Hall, and para-professional, Mrs. Darla McBroom.

Two issues that are being addressed by the state migrant program that are of particular interest to Mrs. Everett are efforts to curb the drop-out rate among migrant students and the possibility of reaching out to

three-year-old migrant children at home. She said that, in the near future, a program may be developed to send people into the homes of three-year-old migrant children to help prepare them for school before they are ever placed in a school atmosphere.

Mrs. Everett stated that a migrant family is any family that moves from one school district to another for the purpose of farm related employment. She said that migrants can be any nationality or race, and the migrant program was established to help these students, who may move several times during the year, to adjust to a new school environment and to "catch up" with other students.

Frieda Everett is the only representative from Region XVI to the State Parent Advisory Council. She was selected by the Region XCI Service Center to a list of candidates from this region. She was appointed by PAC by the Commissioner of Education based on her qualifications.

Lazbuddie I.S.D. presented Mrs. Everett with an Appreciation Award "for outstanding service to the State PAC and TPCC." Mrs. Eva Alcalá of Lazbuddie also received an award for parent involvement. Lazbuddie School administrators stated that they are very proud to be represented at the state level by Mrs. Everett.

Mrs. Everett commented that everything that is being done statewide in the migrant program

is "for the kids." She emphasized this several times and encouraged parents of migrant students "to get involved in their schools for the kids' sakes."

### Schools fail to teach students how to learn more than just facts

COLLEGE STATION — Public schools often fail to teach students how to learn fully because they concentrate too much on minimal factual knowledge, says a Texas A&M University researcher after a two-year study of more than a thousand public school students.

The study also found that classes in which low-ability students are consistently grouped together may actually inhibit their learning and thinking capabilities, says Dr. Patricia Alexander, who is conducting the study for the National Academy of Education.

Schools falter in stressing immediate low-level basic knowledge and not rewarding strategic learning and problem-solving abilities, Alexander added. No single solution to the problem exists, she cautioned.

The public school education system — including teacher preparation programs at universities — misinterprets the teacher's role by focusing on facts rather than strategic learning, Alexander said.

The university's role is to better prepare teachers for instructing students in how to utilize information instead of just how to convey that knowledge, Alexander said. Teachers should have more teacher preparation courses focusing on how to impart and gauge strategic learning for students, she said.
