WHITTLIN'

It is nice to have representatives of two utility companies living in Bovina.

We're especially pleased that Dan Koelzer of Pioneer Natural Gas Co. and Kenneth Howard of General Telephone Co. are now Bovinians. Their companies will greatly benefit because these two men are residents of this community, we figure.

Southwestern Public Service Co. will join them in having a Bovina representative, who lives here, probably by next summer.

Having men stationed here is something the companies have needed in years past and we're glad they have made these additions to their staffs.

State politics is off and running for next year's elections.

We noticed that Preston Smith, present lieutenant governor who is seeking promotion to the state's top elective office, was campaigning in the Panhandle area this week.

Smith, who is from Lubbock, will, no doubt, have some strong support from Parmer County because he calls this area his home, if for no other reason. We don't mean to imply that there aren't other reasons why he should have support here.

Smith's candidacy received a boost when John Connally, the present governor decided not to seek a fourth term. Smith, however, had entered the governor's race before Connally decided against running again.

We weren't disappointed that Connally decided to step aside. He's had two terms and a portion of the third to get his ideas to working for the good of the state. That should be long enough, we'd guess, and we're ready for new blood and fresh ideas in the governor's chair.

Connally could have probably been re-elected had he chosen to run. However, he has made some political enemies during his tenure in office.

He proposed liquor by the drink in Texas, for instance. This didn't go over, of course, but it probably didn't win the governor any friends in certain circles.

School teachers, too, possibly remember that Connally wasn't for as much pay raise for them as their own organization proposed. That was bound to have lost him some votes.

So, with all due respect to Connally and his service to the great State of Texas, his usefulness has possibly been used up.

His decision to stay out of the race will make for a much more exciting campaign, we'd guess.

As far as we know, Connally gets the credit for undertaking the chore of having the state constitution rewritten. His critics have opposed the people he's appointed to do the work and they possibly have a legitimate complaint.

However, we agree that the constitution needs to be rewritten and we admire Connally for getting started on the chore during his term in office. It would have been easier for him, no doubt, to ignore the problem and hope it would go away.

Using the payments which have been made on Bovina's recently-completed paving project as a barometer, the economy here is in pretty good shape.

Monday was the deadline for property owners to pay for their paving or to make a 25 per cent down payment on it. Approximately half the total amount was collected through Monday or will be by the end of the week.

That is, we think, good when you consider that only 25 per cent of the total was actually due as such.

Our thinking might be all wrong, but we thought this was a good indication of a strong local economy.

Mention has been made here previously about the area developments which indicate that cattle will once again come into prominence as a part of our economy. We can't substantiate the latest report we've heard

Ridgelea Name Of New School

Ridgelea Elementary is the name of Bovina's new grade school classroom building located across Highway 86 from Ridgelea Addition.

Name of the new building which will house first and second grade classrooms was decided on at a regular monthly meeting of the board of trustees Monday night.

The building is expected to be ready for occupancy sometime after January 15.

Arnold Maeker of Lubbock, architect for the building, met with the board to discuss details.

The board agreed to move the school district tax office to the new building. Mrs. Zoe Clary, school district tax assessor-collector, will be part-time secretary for the new school.

Board members agreed to hold an open-house at the new building after it is occupied.

The first and second grades are now composed of five classrooms.

The cafeteria staff at Ridgelea will be composed of three workers. Two will be transferred from the present cafeteria and a present part-time worker will be hired full-time.

Representatives of the three insurance agencies in town met with the board to discuss details.

Approved also was a committee of teachers who will be responsible for adopting new textbooks.

School Student Wins Tail Feather Contest

A sixth grade student in Bovina Elementary School, David Vargas, was the winner of the 1967 Bovina pheasant tail-feather contest held during pheasant season here last week under direction of Parmer County Game Management Association.

David is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Pancho Vargas. His feather was the first entry received at Parmer County Farm Supply, Contest headquarters, according to A.E. (Bud) Crump.

The winning tail feather in the Bovina contest measured 25 and seven-eighths inches long. Second longest feather, 24 inches, was entered by Jack Nelson, who farms north of Bovina. Third place went to Don Lloyd of Canyon with a tail feather measuring 23 and seven-eighths inches.

In the Parmer County contest, Jack Patterson was the winner of the trophy for having the longest tail feather, which measured 26 inches. Vargas was second while Bee Westbrook of Friona came in third with a feather 24 and three-fourths inches long.

Financing Arranged --

Provides Paving Project Payment

City of Bovina paid the contractor for the recently-completed paving program Monday. Total cost of the program which was paid to Contractor Jake Diel of Muleshoe was approximately \$72,000.

Monday was also the deadline for property owners to pay for their portion of the paving, curbs and gutters or to make a down payment of 25 per cent of their total bill.

Approximately \$29,000 had been paid by Monday afternoon, Mayor Bedford Caldwell announced, and the total is expected to go over the \$30,000 mark by the end of this week.

Total amount owed by property owners was \$68,211.55. The city has made arrangements with First State Bank of Bovina to finance the difference between the amount collected and the total paid to the contractor. Warrants for \$30,000 were issued to the bank to take care of this difference.

Caldwell indicated that city

officials were pleased with the total amount collected through Monday and pointed out the city was in a good position financially on the paving project.

Property owners who paid 25 per cent of the cost down may make the remaining payments in three annual installments.

Included in the property own-

ers' portion of the project was 15,661 feet of paving, curbs and gutters at \$4.30 per foot and 295 feet of paving where curbs were already installed at \$2.85 per foot.

The city's cost of the project was \$11,956.33. This included paying for paving intersections and other city-owned property and for legal and advertising fees. A paving bond election was approved by city voters several months ago.

In a regular monthly meeting Thursday night, members of the council took care of formalities of financing the unpaid portion of the paving contract.

The council agreed to erect several "stop" and "yield" signs at various intersections in town. The installations will be made by a city crew.

The city already has the traffic signs in stock.

Also considered by the governing board was the possibility of passing a law against "glue sniffing."

Judge Brewer Dies Tuesday

County Judge Loyde Arthur Brewer, 53, died at 1 a.m. Tuesday at his home in Friona. He had been in ill health for some time.

Judge Brewer had served as county judge of Parmer County since January, 1959, having first been elected to that position in 1958. He was re-elected for a four year term in 1966.

Born Nov. 21, 1914, in Vici, Okla., Judge Brewer was a longtime resident of Friona and had been in business there. He was a member of the First Methodist Church of Friona and the Friona American Legion Post No. 203, having served in World

War II with American Forces in Italy.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p.m. today (Wednesday) in the First Methodist Church of Friona with Rev. James Price, pastor, and Rev. L. L. Hill, chaplain of Veterans Hospital, Amarillo, officiating.

Burial will be in Friona Cemetery under direction of Claborn Funeral Home.

Survivors include his wife, Wana; two sons, Byron, a student at Texas Tech, and Galen of the home; two brothers, Glen E. Brewer of Alamogordo, N.M. and Clarence Brewer of Pueblo, Colo.; and one sister, Mrs. Opal Spear of Oklahoma City, Okla.

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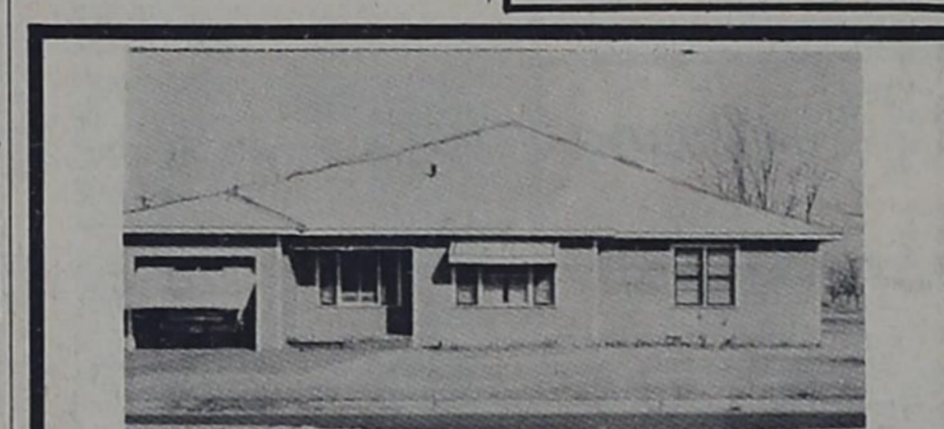
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On The Farm In Parmer County

Listed below is information which was presented at the Fertilizer Short course at Dimmitt in November.
Large amounts of nitrogen are removed from the soil when crops are produced, and this deficit must be replenished. For example 6,000 pounds of grain sorghum produced on an acre of land will take with it 100 pounds of nitrogen. Furthermore, it takes 200 pounds of the nutrient to produce the 6,000 pound yield. Thus, large

amounts of nitrogen are required to keep a soil in high state of fertility.
The process of nitrification which involves the changes that occur to nitrogen compounds when they are applied to the soil so as to become available for plant use is very interesting. Nitrates are the available forms of nitrogen compounds and their formation is affected by soil temperature, aeration, Ph level and moisture. Nitrification best occurs when the soil temperature is above 50 degrees F. Also, the soil should be fairly loose for good aeration and contain adequate moisture. The Ph range should be between 6.5 and 8. As far as the application of nitrogen, on sandy soils, the element should be applied just prior to planting or by sidedressing according to research. On clay or tight soils, however, times of application is not significant.
Phosphorus deficiencies do not always show up as visual symptoms (discolorations) in plants. Significant responses can be obtained from crops by the application of phosphorus, under certain circumstances. According to researchers, applying phosphorus preplant by either banding or broadcasting is best for top results.
The species of plant as well as its root activity plays an important role in the amount of phosphorus used. Also, the solubility of the phosphorus compound is an important factor and the element's renewal rate in a particular type of soil must also be taken into consideration.
Fertility tests conducted by the Lubbock Experiment Station indicated on some loose, sandy soils in which the addition of phosphorus was made zinc deficiency resulted. This occurred through a chemical change in the soil in which the available zinc joined with the phosphorus to form insoluble zinc phosphate.
The first Farm to Market Road built by the Texas Highway Department -- 50 years old this year -- was built in 1936. It extended 5.8 miles from Mount Enterprise to Shiloh in Rusk County.
The first highway hard surfaced by the Texas Highway Department -- now in its Golden Jubilee year -- was a 25-mile section across Hays County, built in 1918-19.

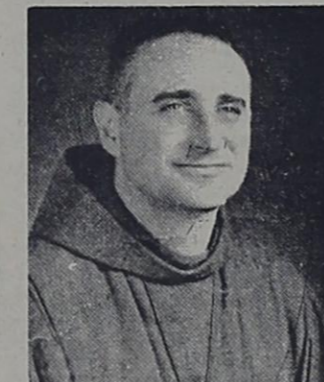

Mike Grissom scored eight points, Manuel Quintana six, Bill Caldwell five, Galen Hromas three, Tony Foster and

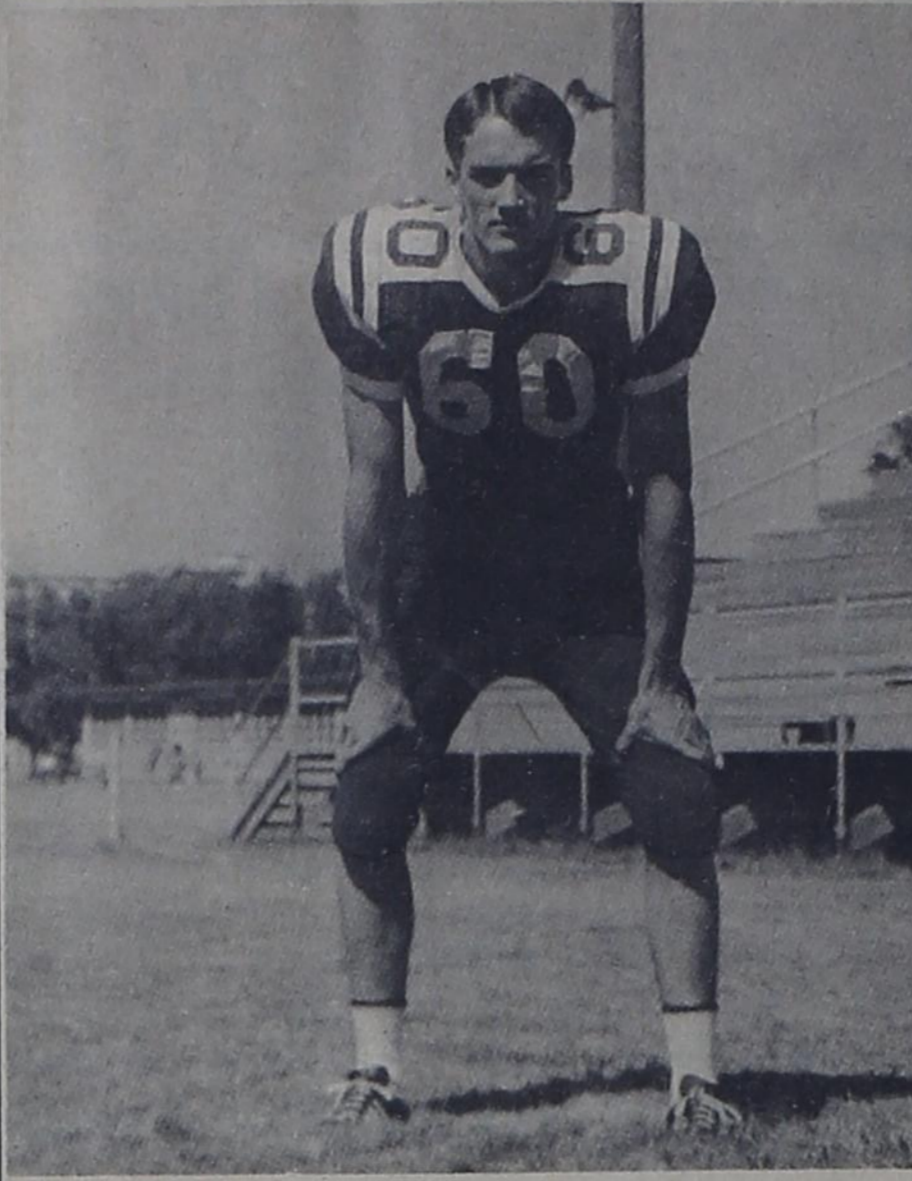
Daryl Kirkpatrick, one each. Pacing Friona were two boys with 12 points each, Perea and Brookfield.

They include Joe B. Johnson of Friona, Richard G. Slaughter of Hereford and Numand, Loafman of Friona.

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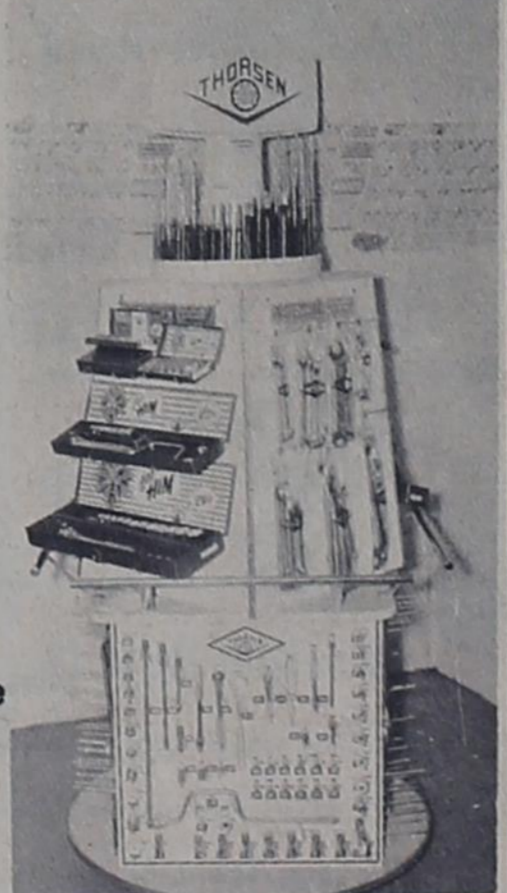
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
