





### Texas Declaration Of Independence To Be Put on Exhibit

Austin, Dec. 5.—Texas' most precious document, the Declaration of Independence of the Republic of Texas, soon will be removed from an obscure vault in the Secretary of State's office and placed in the rotunda of the State capitol where all who visit Austin may see it.

The six pages of paper, nearly 100 years old, will find a niche left unoccupied as a result of the abandonment of a water fountain on the first floor near the Governor's office.

For some time workmen have been getting the niche ready for the document. Mrs. Jane Y. McCallum, Secretary of State, who will voluntarily relinquish possession, made a trip to Washington to find out how the National Government preserved its Declaration of Independence and Constitution. She has used the ideas she gleaned there in preparing for the preservation of the Texas declaration.

The bits of paper were orepelined to prevent their falling apart. The same gelatin film which protests the national declaration will keep the writing from being dimmed. A sheet of the heaviest plate glass partly screened by an iron grill will protect the half dozen sheets of paper.

Notwithstanding these precautionary measures the lighting is so arranged that both sides of the pages may be easily read when turned by a knob from the outside.

The legislative resolution authorizing removal of the document was introduced at Mrs. McCallum's request. The resolution set out that the declaration was rapidly deteriorating in

### he Co. Makes nother Reduction Long Distance Rates

The fourth reduction in long dis-Ance telephone rates in a little more than three years will be made January 1, according to word received by rN. H. Moore, district manager of the g. Touthwestern Bell Telephone company. complhe cut will mean a saving of approxi-S. (mately five million dollars to telephone sel' users in the United States.

It will apply principally to day "station-to-station" rates to points 60 to 300 miles distance. "Station-to-station" rates are those which apply to calls placed to a distant number rather than to a particular person. In most instances these will be reduced ten cents, although in a few cases the decrease will amount to five cents.

Rates on "person-to-person" calls (calls for a specific person) and evening and night "station-to-station" calls will remain largely as they are at present, although some minor reductions will be made.

Report charges, made on "person-toperson" calls when the called telephone is reached but the person wanted is amounts ranging from five to forty cents on calls to points from 140 to 2,200 miles distant.

"The present reduction brings the through these various rate decreases Bayless by the Bell System to nearly fifteen 'million dollars," Mr. Moore said. "The first of the four big reductions which have accomplished this saving was Huston Clark, Sunday. made October 1, 1926. Rates were reduced three million dollars yearly then.'

"A further reduction of a million and a half dollars went into effect December 1, 1927. Then, on February 1. 1929 a five million cut was made.

"These reductions, as well as the present one, have been made voluntarily by the Telephone Company. They are the result of increased long distance usage which has permitted the development of a steadily growing system of fast, storm-proof long distance cable, increased overhead facilities and faster methods of handling calls. As an example we are now building in the southwest a fifty million dollar system of underground cables which will link all principal cities. "Texas telephone users will be saved total of approximately \$332,000 by e decrease," Mr. Moore estimated.
