

First Freeze **Deadline** Near

Next Wednesday, Oct. 15, is the deadline for entering the First Freeze Contest.

Kence has this suggestion transfer frequently called numbers to the back page of the new directory, and destroy the old directory. This will eliminate calling disconnected or changed numbers."



The difference in Bovina Feeders, Inc. and other feedlots is the moisture content of the grain and corn used and the way the grain is prepared. The company is taking feed from 33 moisture, down, Priest savs.

The grain is ground by portable grinders, pulled by trucks or tractors, in the pits and stored with moisture content of from 30 to 32. If the grain or corn has a lower moisture content, water is added.

This method allows farmers to cut grain early, before it is dry enough for ordinary storage, and to have a market for the crops. The advantage to farmers is elimination of about a two-weeks' hazard period from insect damage, hail, falling down, etc.

After the grain and corn is ground, the feed looks like wet sand. It is then covered with sheets of plastic and weighted down with used tires.



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

Sgt. Barraza Earns Medal

The Bronze Star Medal was bleeding profusely and in great presented to Sgt. Paul A. Barraza on Aug. 25 for "heroism in ground combat in the Republic of Vietnam on 2 March 1969."

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Antonio Barraza of Bovina, Paul has since returned home with his discharge from the U.S. Army after 14 months service in Vietnam.

The citation accompanying the medal presented the Farwell High School ex-student read "for heroism not involving participation in an aerial flight, in connection with military tions of the military service operations against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietand reflects great credit upon

pain, he disregarded his personal safety as he braved the hail of hostile rounds and continued to put forth suppressive machinegun barrages until his companions encompassed and eliminated the aggressors. His courageous initiative and determined professionalism significantly contributed to the successful accomplishment of his unit's mission. Sergeant Barraza's outstanding display of aggressiveness, devotion to duty, and personal bravery is in keeping with the finest tradi-



Barraza, then specialist four, sion, and the United States Arwas serving as a machinegunner with his unit at an ambush site 10 miles west of Ben Cat. At approximately 1630 hours, he observed six enemy soldiers enter his element's killing zone and he placed devastating fire on the insurgents when they were within 40 meters of his position. During the ensuing firefight, the aggressors employed automatic weapons and rocket - propelled grenades which wounded Sergeant Barraza in the head. Although

David, another son, received one bed and furniture, one cow and calf and two sheep.

There were other children not mentioned here. William Howard stated he wished the land and remainder of property be sold after death of his wife and equally divided among his children: Mary Wells, Mildred Dorsey, John Howard, William Howard, Frances Howard, Richard Howard, Eli Howard and David Howard. The will was executed Feb. 5, 1844.
