' Fort Worth, Texas, Jan. 8 .- Al thought Wednesday's market was about steady, demand for fat cattle was not very broad, the stocker outlet being more satisfactory. Mixed shipments were in the majority, and really good killing cattle were so scarce as to hardly afford a test of the market. Receipts were estimated at 2,300 head of cattle and 700 calves.
