My little tailor came to the office to measure me for a new suit of

He looked tired. It had not been such a good winter. The American people are either away up or away down in their thinking and their spending. While the stock market was boiling they bought lots of clothes. But they stopped very suddenly, so the little tailor said.

I wondered what a tailor thinks about. It must be monotonous life. going around and measuring men, sewing up the suits and trying them on, fixing them over, and listening to a good deal of grumbling.

"Do you find life worth living?" I asked him. His face brightened. "It keeps me interested."

"But what are your pleasures?" I persisted. "What gives you a thrill?" "Well, for one thing I get quite a lot of excitement in overcoming my difficulties."

He went on to tell me about his difficulties, and as he talked I felt a reverence for that little tailor and a certain amount of shame for myself. How much less he has than I have. But no complaining, no self-pity, no temptation to surrender. He is playing a game in which difficulties are his opponents, and everyday, in his modest fashion, he wins some vic-

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


