## Thousands Attend Community Celebration

"At least as good as ever and maybe better," was the consensus of area residents following last weekend's eighth annual Bull Town Days celebration.

A couple of noticeably helpful additions ---- and we hesitate to mention some for fear of omitting others ---- were the carnival-type booths downtown and the convenient location of the new roping arena.

Though there's no relationship between the two, both made for a better Bull Town Days, in our opinion.

There's always room for improvement, but Bull Town Days 1971 can be marked down as another successful community celebration.

One drawback of this year's BTD was the cancellation of the Quarter Horse show, which was scheduled for Saturday.

The VEE scare and quarantine of a few weeks ago indirectly caused the show to be called off by the Quarter Horse Association headquarters.

We, along with a big bunch of Quarter Horse enthusiasts, didn't understand this.

Horses which have been vaccinated and their owners can so prove have been permitted to travel anywhere for several days now and we don't understand why a horse show on August 21 shouldn't have been permitted to go on as scheduled. We weren't in direct contact with the association people as were the leaders of the show here. However, it seemed from the second hand information we were getting that the association people didn't try to give any logical reasons. They just said the first post-quarantine horse show would be no earlier than August 28 and that Bovina could arrange for a new date for its show after that time . . . if that's what it wanted to do.

Yeah, we can understand that, but we don't understand why. This direct information came about after a couple of weeks of "nothing definite or official, but maybe" information from the association office. Thus, there was no time to notify the Quarter Horse exhibitors the show had been cancelled, which it was some 48 hours or so before the show.

That's easier to explain in print than it is to a stranger in Bovina who has a couple of horses in his trailer and is a couple of hundred miles from home. We tried that. It puts you in the position of needing to refer to the tact and diplomacy manual.

Nonetheless, the horse show, which will be the 11th annual here, has been rescheduled for October 9. This is also a Saturday. We guess it's better to have a late horse show, than no show at all.

Hundreds and hundreds of man (and woman) hours went into the celebration this year as usual.

The man who had one of the most dangerous jobs, as we saw it, was Lewis McDaniel, who installed the BTD sign high above Third Street. He was taking care of this chore a couple of days before the celebration began when we made his picture for last week's Bull Town Days edition of The Blade.

Perched a' top his ladder on his SWPS pickup, his condition looked none too safe to us through our viewfinder and we guess Lewis had the same feeling only more so. Before we pulled the camera trigger, he said, "If you'll wait just a minute until I fall, you can get an action shot."

We took time out to laugh in appreciation of the joke and it would have been still funnier if it hadn't looked like such a likely possibility.

The Third Street traffic that afternoon was especially heavy, it seemed, and Lewis said several cars were "dragging" Third while he was working. His pickup was unprotected in mid-street and that didn't make him feel any more like he was about to win any safety awards. Many of the cars passing by evidently had friendly drivers, too, he said, because they would honk as they passed by and he looked down and hoped they wouldn't hit him.

## Youths Escape Serious Injury

Four youths escaped serious injury Monday afternoon when the station wagon they were riding in struck a concrete culvert on Highway 60 just west of Bovina and overturned two and a half times.

## Record 632 Enroll In Bovina Schools

The 1971-'72 school year got underway here Monday with an opening day enrollment total of 632, according to L. F. Jacobs, school superintendent.

The 632 figure surpasses by 42 last year's enrollment on opening day, which was 590. In 1969, opening day enrollment was 551 and in 1968, the total was 610 on the first day of school.

This year's total, broken down, shows 17 in kindergarten, two in special education, 309 in grades one through five, 155 in grades six, seven and eight, and 166 in grades nine through 12.

As of Monday, there were 42 students enrolled in first grade, down from last year's total of 65, however, all other categories show an increase in enrollment over last year.

Elementary enrollment of 309 is up 23 from last year's total of 286 on opening day with 155 enrolled in junior high as opposed to 142 last year. High school enrollment shows an increase of 15 over last year with 166 enrolled this year and 151 last year.

A total of 17 enrolled in kindergarten this year. Seven enrolled last year, the first year

## Eighth Annual Event Success

Bovina's eighth annual community-wide celebration, Bull Town Days, was staged here Thursday, Friday and Saturday as thousands of people turned out for the three-day celebration which featured activities for all age groups. The celebration was considered another great success by promoters as well as by those attending.

New events were added to this year's celebration --- with all of them being termed "successful," including carnival booths, the Grand Ole Opry show, and the cutting horse contest.

A crowd, estimated at over 3,000, packed Main Street Friday night for the free barbecue which traditionally attracts more people than any other single function. The meal, which featured barbecued boneless chuck beef, also included pinto beans, pickle and onion slices and Bovina-grown cantaloupe. The cantaloupe and onion slices were provided by Gateway Produce Company of Bovina. Remainder of the meal was paid for by donations from businesses and individuals and from income from other BTD activities.

The only disappointment in the 1971 celebration was the cancellation of the 11th annual Bovina Roping Club-sponsored Quarter Horse Show.

Show officials were not notified of the cancellation until late Thursday evening by officials of the American Quarter Horse Association in Amarillo. The VEE quarantine was lifted, but according to AQHA officials, there wasn't enough time to get press releases out for the show to be held Saturday as planned.

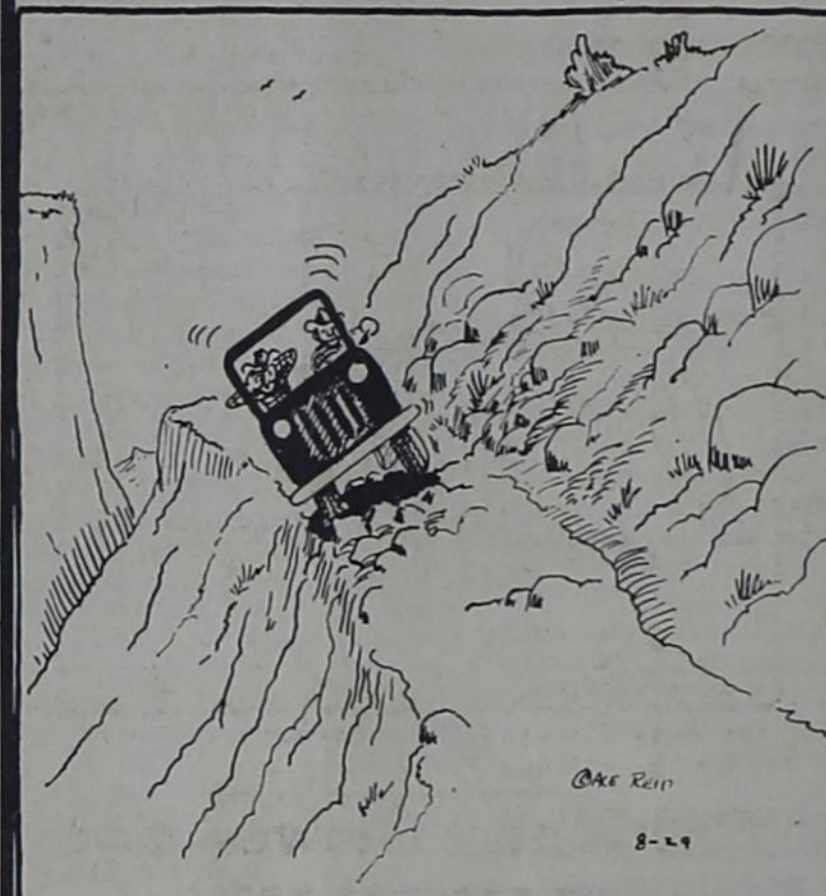

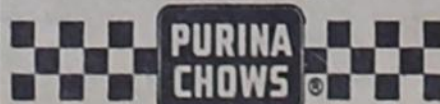

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**On The Farm  
In Palmer  
County**

The cool, wet weather has improved yield prospects in grain sorghum and soybeans, but cotton production has been slowed considerably due to reduced fruiting and stimulated vegetative growth.

Some maturity time has been lost since August 1 that can never be completely recovered. The prolonged cool, rainy spell will have some important effects on cotton the remainder of the season. First, vegetative or top growth will take place at the expense of fruit development. The thick canopy of leaves that prevents sunlight get-

ting to the lower parts of the plant will cause many young bolls to shed and slow down the development of bolls which have set near the bottom of the plant. Excessive shedding squares and young bolls can also be expected after a prolonged, cloudy period. Shedding of small bolls usually occurs 3 to 10 days after white bloom, but the completion of the shedding process is slowed by low temperature and may not be too evident until the temperature rises again. Bolls that are 10 days or older will seldom shed. Rapid vegetative growth usually follows excessive fruit shed.

Producers can expect to see an increase in the wilt diseases since weather conditions have been ideal for infection to develop during the last two weeks. Symptoms will become more evident as warmer weather returns and plants are subject to greater moisture stress.

A boll set from a white bloom in late August will require 60 to 70 days to open depending on temperature. Thus, bolls being set now will not reach maturity before November 1. Lower than normal temperatures would lengthen the boll period and bolls set after this date would be more subject to severe damage by first freeze.

The micronaire of fiber from late set bolls will be low and recent cool weather has likely reduced the micronaire of fiber in the earlier set crop. No doubt, the overall micronaire of the crop can be expected to be lower than usual. Very little effect on staple length is expected. Wet, cloudy weather would tend to increase fiber length slightly while lower temperatures would likely reduce length. Thus, two opposite effects on fiber length have been in operation. It is unlikely that fiber strength has been changed.

With a normal or higher temperature and normal freeze date, much of our cotton has an opportunity to make good yields of acceptable quality fiber.

Producers should consider herbicides for layby weed control rather than mechanical cultivation. Frequently, root pruning from tillage increases fruit shed and wilt disease. So in view of our present situation, this year's crop will demand our best management during the short time remaining before frost.

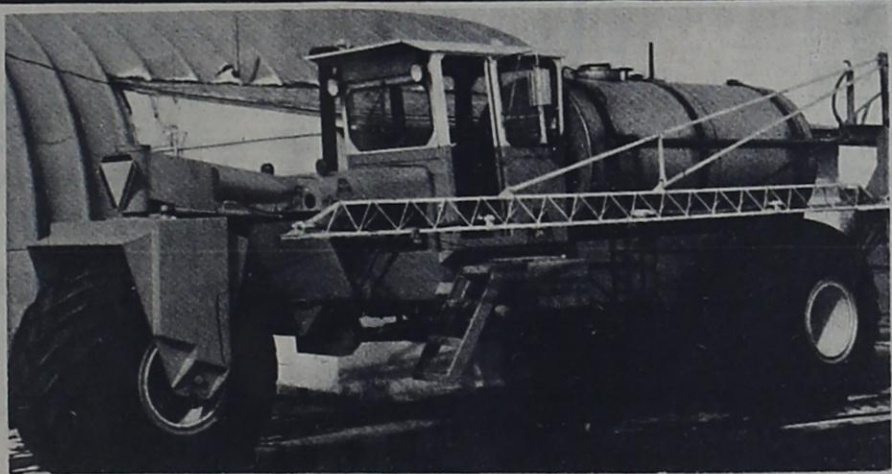

### At Home In Parmer County

By Jana Pronger, County HD Agent

As your students started back to school this week, you may have worried about studying causing eyestrain.

A well-chosen lamp can combat glare, extreme contrast, shadows and inadequate lighting. Glare can be eliminated by having a shade with white lining that covers the light bulb from any viewing angle.

Placing the light source about 15 inches above the desk can soften shadows. Put the lamp on the left side for a right-handed person and the other way around for left-handers.



In the 15th Century, Queen Isabella of Spain declared that she only had two baths in her life—including one on the day she was married!

The Better Light Better Sight Bureau says increased wattage merely multiplies the problems of glare, shadows and contrasts; so the most efficient lamp isn't necessarily one with high wattage.

A reflecting cone or a prismatic bowl inside the lamp shade helps to gather light wasted around the base of the lamp and redirect it to the work surface.

Suggestions for better lighting on the study desk and more comfortable studying time include:

- 1. Have a flat work surface about 24 inches deep and 36 inches wide.
2. Put the desk against a light wall -- never face a window.
3. Use a straight-back armless chair.
4. Choose a light-hue, non-glossy desk top -- it reduces glare and contrast.

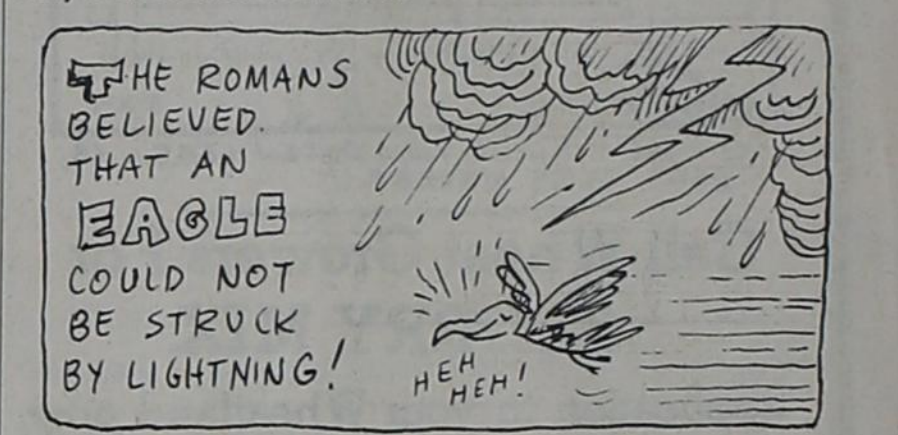
Be sure to leave on the room light. This balances the lighting in the room and reduces contrasts.

Bonds indicated that a detailed financial report of the celebration will be published when all the information can be compiled.

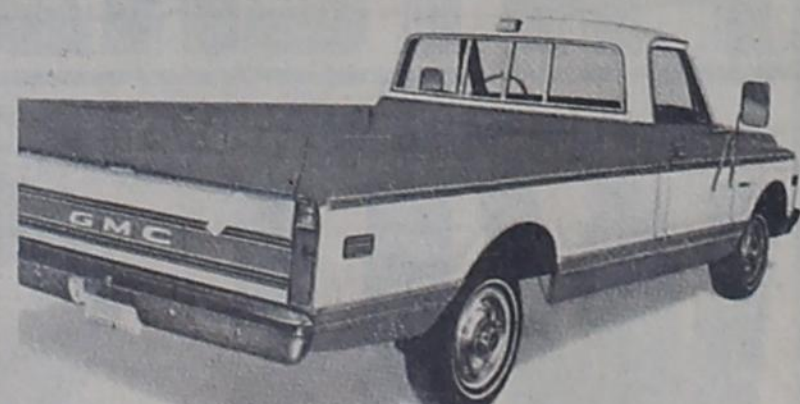

### LEGAL NOTICES

**--LEGAL NOTICE--**  
All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be re-recorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971. Producers will be given a six-month period (August 30, 1971 through February 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first-come" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be re-recorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations indicate.

The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the long-

est shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number of brands and/or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or re-recorded as provided by the new law.

The County Clerk of each county shall have this act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of 30 days. The act shall be published on the effective date, August 30, 1971, and thereafter for 30 days.

It is the obligation of the County Clerk to assure that no more than one brand of a kind be recorded on the same location on the animal in each county. Therefore, no two people in a county may record the same brand in the same location. It is also the responsibility of the County Clerk to make certain that in recording any brand for a person, that the part of the animal on which the brand is to be placed be designated. Failure to do so is punishable by a fineable offense of not less than \$10 or more than \$50 (Article 1486 P.C.).

The law applies to all counties in the state of Texas and shall take precedence over any special statutes heretofore applying to individual counties pertaining to recording and re-recording of brands.

# Twenty Attend Reunion Friday

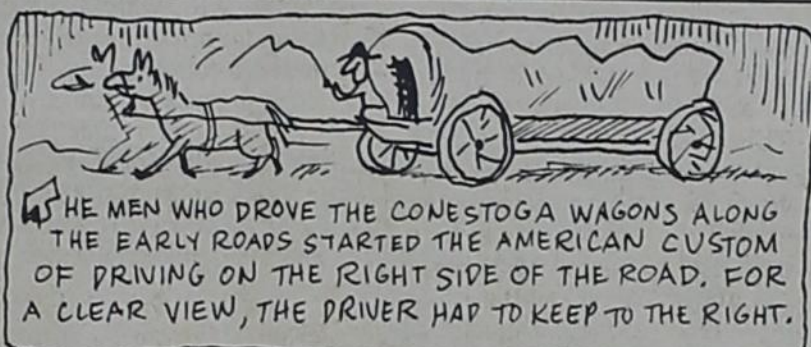

Refreshments of punch and cookies were served and movies of the senior trip were shown by Mrs. James Lawlis.

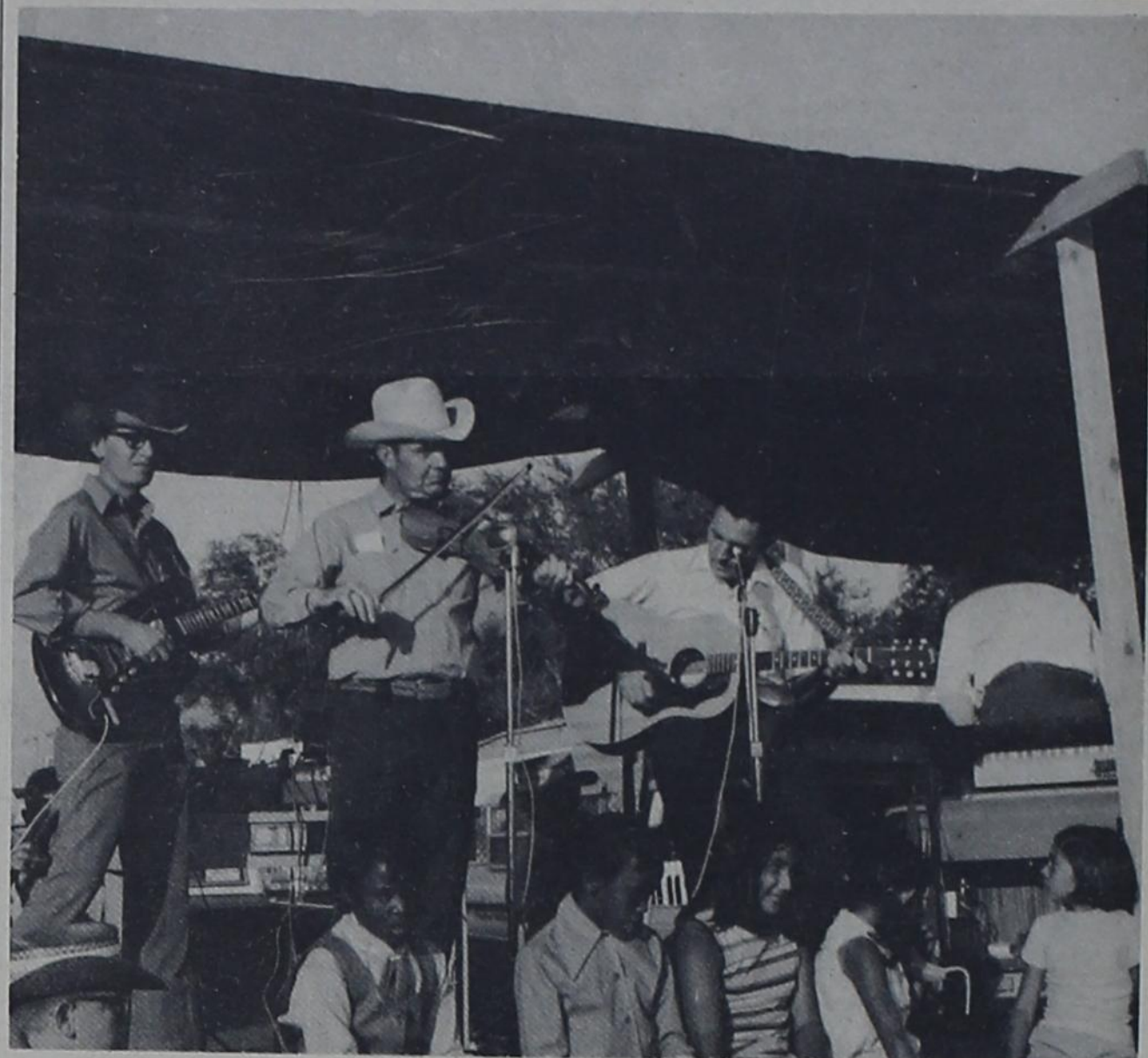

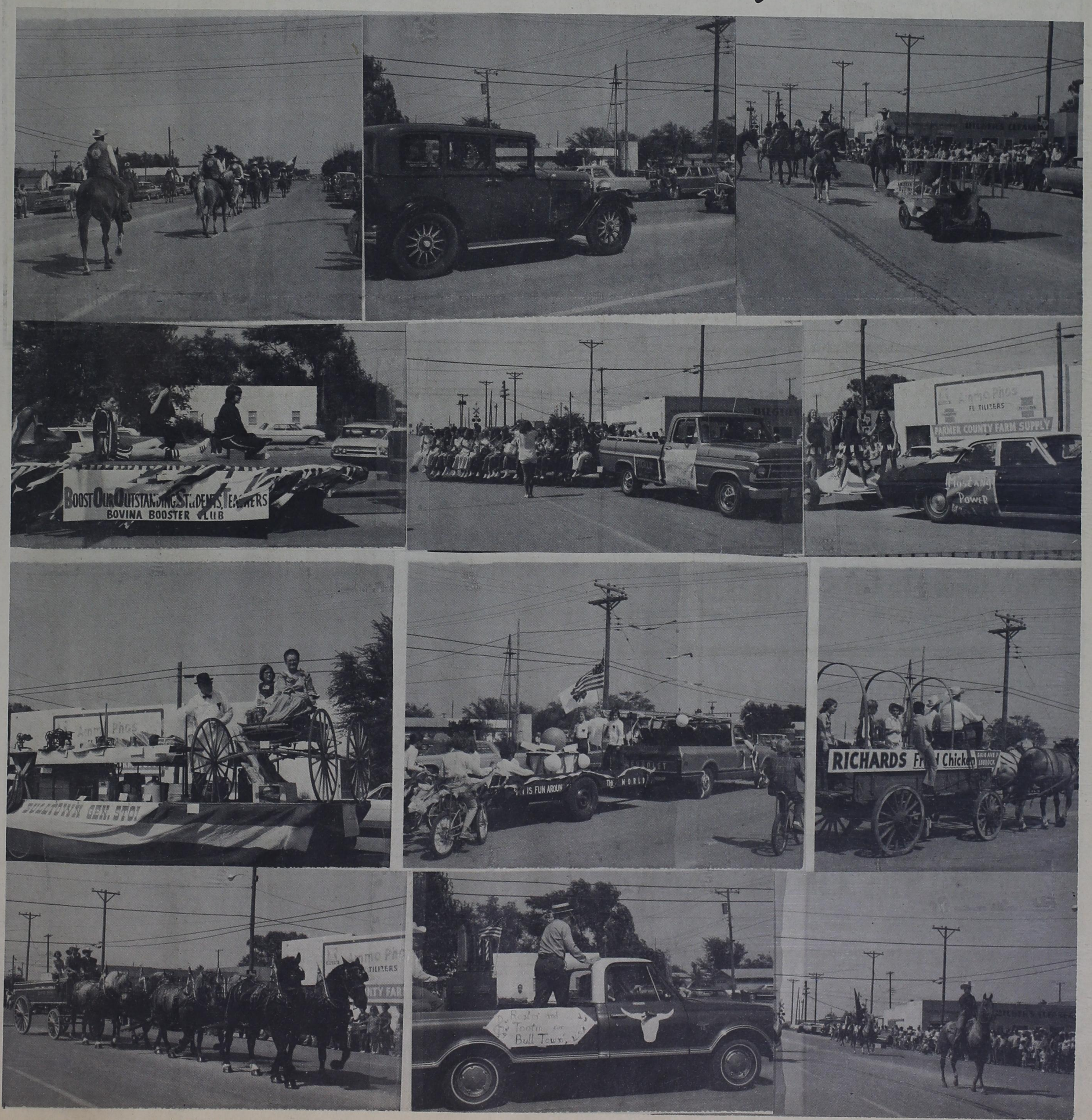

**ELIGIBILITY STANDARDS FOR FREE AND REDUCED PRICE LUNCHES** --- This table indicates the family income limits for children in Bovina Schools in regard to the free and reduced price lunches. School officials have adopted this family size and income scale to assist in determining eligibility. The income brackets are in the second and third columns. Families whose income are within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships may apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the

application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at principals' offices. Applications may be submitted anytime during the year. Under the provisions of the policy, the principal will review the applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the principal, he may request a hearing to appeal the decision. A copy of the policy is on file at the school and may be reviewed by any interested person.

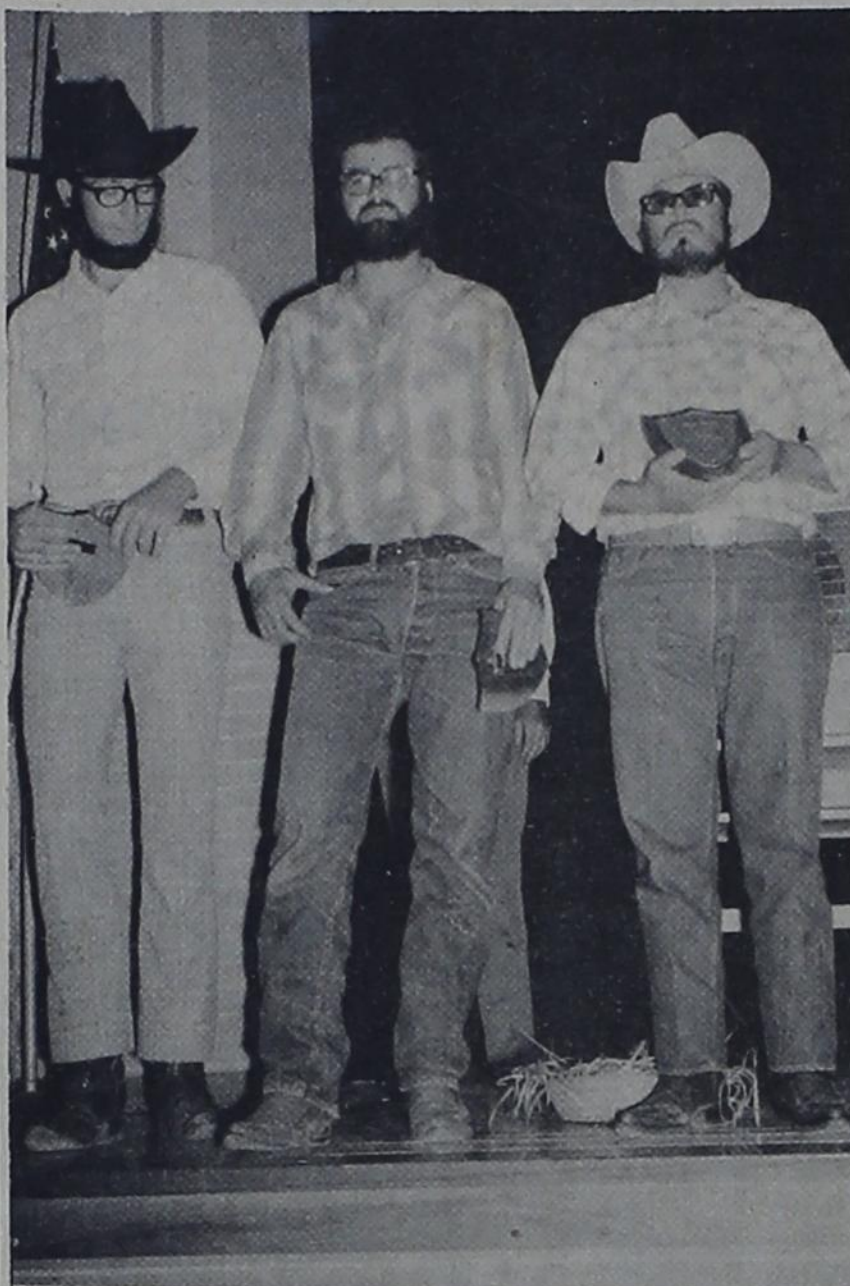

# Areas Receive Rain Sunday

Only a trace of moisture was received here Sunday night during a storm-threatening period. Tornado-like clouds hovered in the area beginning about sundown Sunday.

Moisture totaling an inch and a half was recorded in the Oklahoma Lane Community and lesser amounts were received closer to Bovina.

Farms on Bovina's east side also received moisture, in the neighborhood of half an inch. There were television reports of tornadoes across the Plains and as close as Friona during the cloudy spell, but there was no nearby damage.

Farmers are, for the most part, ready for hot, sunny weather to return to aid in the maturing of the row crops.

At the same time, they are appreciative of the moisture period which has extended from mid-July to the present. Rains which began last month broke a months-long drought which started last fall.

The recent rains have increased the chances of a bumper milo crop considerably. An additional number of acres in production this year over last, due to a change in the government farm program, and a lack of natural moisture were making prospects for a mediocre grain sorghum crop a possibility before the rainfall began. Now the opposite is true.

In spite of the overall need for a drying period, more showers are predicted for this week.

# Set Watermelon Feed

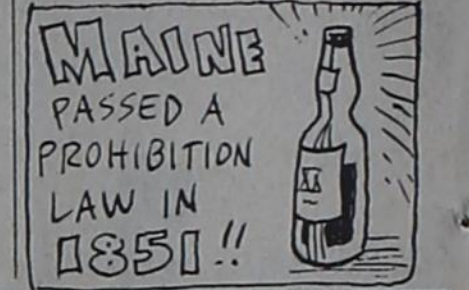
A community watermelon feed, with everyone in the Bovina school district invited, has been slated for Tuesday, Sept. 7, at 8 p.m. at the football field.

The event, which is sponsored annually by members of the board of trustees of the school district, is in honor of new teachers in the school system.

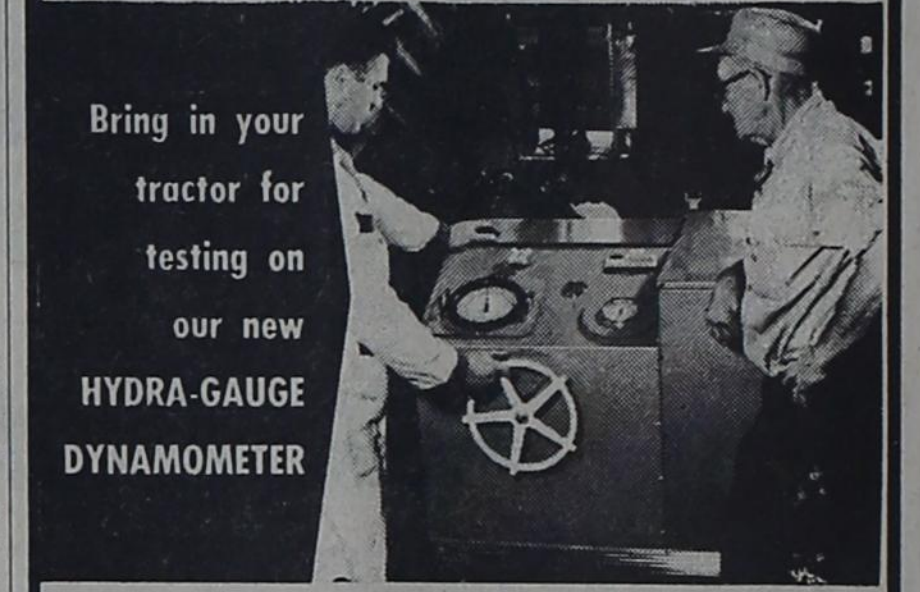
The occasion will be informal with no prepared program and designed for people of the community to get acquainted

The watermelon feed has been held for the past several years shortly after the beginning of school.



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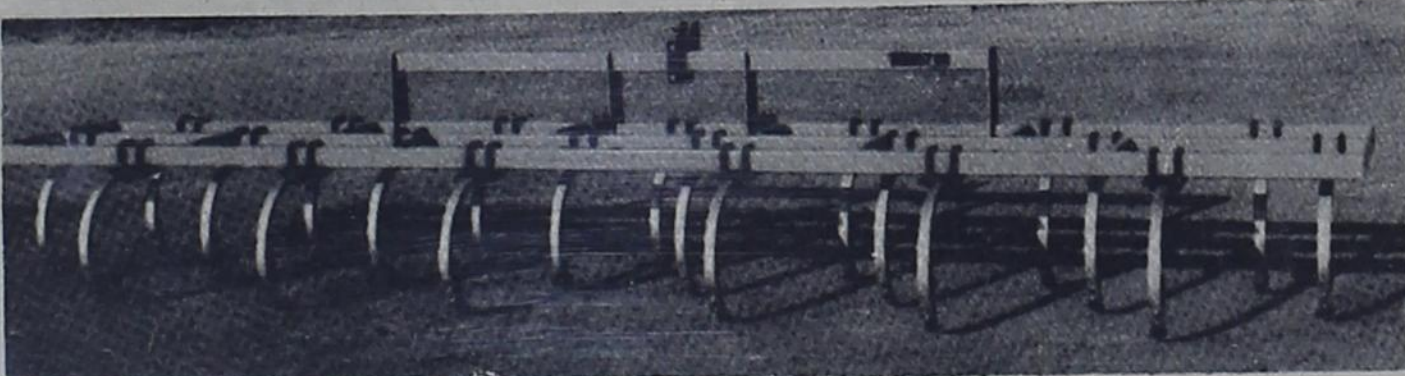
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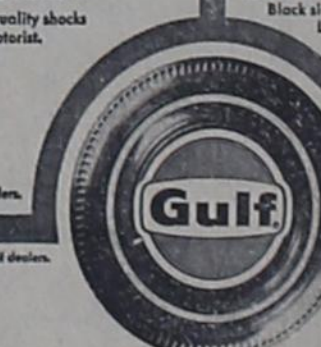
