Thousands Attend Community Celebration

in our opinion. There's always room for improvement, but Bull Town Days 1971 can be marked down as another successful community celebration.

One drawback of this year's BTD was the cancellation of the Quarter Horse show, which was scheduled for Saturday.

The VEE scare and quarantine of a few weeks ago indirectly caused the show to be called off by the Quarter Horse Association headquarters.

We, along with a big bunch of Quarter Horse enthusiasts, didn't understand this.

Horses which have been vaccinated and their owners can so prove have been permitted to travel anywhere for several days now and we don't understand why a horse show on August 21 shouldn't have been permitted to go on as scheduled. We weren't in direct contact with the association people as were the leaders of the show here. However, it seemed from the second hand information we were getting that the association people didn't try to give any logical reasons. They just said the first post-quarantine horse show would be no earlier than August 28 and that Bovina could arrange for a new date for its show after that time if that's what it wanted to do.

Yeah, we can understand that, but we don't understand why. This direct information came about after a couple of weeks of "nothing definite or official, but maybe" information from the association office. Thus, there was no time to notify the Quarter Horse exhibitors the show had been cancelled, which it was some

42 last year's enrollment on opening day, which was 590. In 1969, opening day enrollment was 561 and in 1968, the total was 610 on the first day of

This year's total, broken down, shows 17 in kindergarten, two in special education, 309 in grades one through five, 155 in grades six, seven and eight, and 166 in grades nine through

Eighth Annual **Event Success**

Bovina's eighth annual community-wide celebration, Bull Town Days, was staged here Thursday, Friday and Saturday as thousands of people turned out for the three-day celebration which featured activities for all age groups. The celebration was considered another great success by promoters as well as by those attending.

New events were added to this year's celebration --with all of them being termed "successful," including carnival booths, the Grand Ole Opry show, and the cutting horse contest.

A crowd, estimated at over 3,000, packed Main Street Friday night for the free barbecue which traditionally attracts more people than any other single function. The meal, which featured barbecued boneless chuck beef, also included pinto beans, pickle and onion slices and Bovinagrown cantaloupe. The cantaloupe and onion slices were provided by Gateway Produce Company of Bovina, Remainder of the meal was paid for by donations from businesses and individuals and from income from other BTD activities.

The only disappointment in the 1971 celebration was the cancellation of the 11th annual Bovina Roping Club-sponsored Quarter Horse Show.

Show officials were not notified of the cancellation until late Thursday evening by officials of the American Quarter Horse Association in Amarillo, The VEE quarantine was lifted, but according to AQHA officials, there wasn't enough time to get press releases out for the show to be held Saturday as planned.



The prolonged cool, rainy spell will have some important effects on cotton the remainder of the season. First, vegetative

ting to the lower parts of the plant will cause many young bolls to shed and slow down the development of bolls which have set near the bottom of the plant.

Excessive shedding squares and young bolls can also be expected after a prolonged, cloudy period. Shedding of small bolls usually occurs 3 to 10 days after white bloom, but the com-pletion of the shedding process is slowed by low temperature and may not be too evident until the temperature rises again. Bolls that are 10 days or older will seldom shed. Rapid vegetative growth usual-

A boll set from a white bloom

The mocronaire of fiber from late set bolls will be low and recent cool weather has likely reduced the mocronaire of fiber in the earlier set crop. No doubt, the overall micro-naire of the crop can be ex-pected to be lower than usual. Very little effect on staple length is expected. Wet, cloudy weather would tend to increase fiber length slightly while lower temperatures would likely reduce length. Thus, two opposite effects on fiber length have been in operation. It is unlikely that fiber strength has been

ing before frost.

or top growth will take place at the expense of fruit development. The thick canopy of leaves that prevents sunlight getly follows excessive fruit shed.

Producers can expect to see an increase in the wilt diseases since weather conditions have been ideal for infection to develop during the last two weeks. Symptoms will become more evident as warmer weather returns and plants are subject to greater moisture stress.

in late August will require 60 to 70 days to open depending on temperature. Thus, bolls being set now will not reach maturity before November 1. Lower than normal temperatures would lengthen the boll period and bolls set after this date would be more subject to severe damage by first freeze.

With a normal or higher temperature and normal freeze date, much of our cotton has an opportunity to make good yields of acceptable quality fi-

ber. Producers should consider herbicides for layby weed control rather than mechanical cultivation. Frequently, root pruning from tillage increases fruit shed and wilt disease. So in view of our present situation, this year's crop will demand our best management during the short time remain-



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



A well-chosen lamp can combat glare, extreme contrast, shadows and inadequate lighting. Glare can be eliminated by having a shade with white lining that covers the light bulb from any viewing angle. A good shade should also throw some light upward as well as down over the study area.

Placing the light source about 15 inches above the desk top can soften shadows. Put the lamp on the left side for a right-handed person and the other way around for left hand-

LEGAL NOTICES

-- LEGAL NOTICE --All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be rerecorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971. Producers will be given a sixmonth period (August 30, 1971 through February 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "firstcome" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be rerecorded every 10 years, Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations indicate.

The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the long-

est shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that

number of brands and/or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and rerecording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or rerecorded as provided by the new law.

The County Clerk of each county shall have this act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of 30 days. The act shall be published on the effective date, August 30, 1971, and thereafter for 30

It is the obligation of the County Clerk to assure that no more than one brand of a kind be recorded on the same location on the animal in each county. Therefore, no two people in a county may record the same brand in the same location. It is also the responsibility of the County Clerk to make certain that in recording any brand for a person, that the part of the animal on which the brand is to be placed be designated. Failure to do so is punishable by a fineable offense of not less than \$10 or more than

\$50 (Article 1486 P.C.) The law applies to all counties in the state of Texas and shall take precedence over any special statutes heretofore applying to individual counties pertaining to recording and rerecording of brands.




