


As the health care specialists in schools, nurses contribute to the health of the entire school community and promote staff

Fillies Top Farwell On Last-Second Shot

Bovina High School's Fillies scored their first district win of the 1993 season in dramatic fashion in their district home-opener here last Friday against Farwell.

Sally Noriega's shot at the buzzer found the basket, and brought the Bovina girls a hardfought 69-68 win over their rivals, in a game that was close from start to finish.

NORIEGA STARTS HOT Miss Noriega got the game off to a good start, hitting a three-point basket in the first quarter, and adding two more from two-point range, as Bovina came up a point short of the Lady Steers, 14-13, at the buzzer.

Teresa Stone began to warm up her shooting eye in the second quarter. She made a two-point basket, then two bonus baskets, and was two for two at the free throw line. Nancy Vargas got in on the act, with a pair of baskets, and turned one of those into a threepoint play, fouled in the act of shooting.

This sent the Fillies and own to keep the Fillies close. Farwell to the intermission tied up at 33-all.

Scoring slacked off a bit in the third quarter, although Misses

Stone and Noriega each connected on three-point baskets, and Miss Vargas hit four of seven from the free-throw line. That enabled Bovina to take a 49-46 lead into the final period.

Baskets by Alicia Smith (35) and Becky Donaldson (33) of the visitors helped their team take over the lead, although Miss Vargas answered with seven points of her

Farwell grabbed the lead at 68-67, but Bovina had the ball with one last chance. Miss Noriega made the shot count, beating the buzzer

with her goal, and the Fillies had made their season record 8-10 and 1-1 in district.

The Farwell girls came into the contest with a 12-6 season record and 1-0 in district.

Miss Stone led all scorers with 20 points, and Misses Noriega and Vargas scored 16 apiece.

Kim Kirkpatrick and Miss Vargas led in rebounds with ten each, while Ione Molinar and Teresa Stone had nine each. Miss Noriega led in assists with four, and Misses Molinar and Stone each had three steals.

Each team lost starters due to fouls, as Misses Vargas, Christina Noriega and Kirkpatrick left the game for Bovina. Miss Donaldson and Jill Actkinson were disqualified on fouls for Farwell.

Bovina hit 17 of 31 from the free throw line, 54.8 per cent, while Farwell hit nine of 20, only 45 per cent.

Being forgiving is essential to Of all the traits that should maintaining healthy relationships. None of us can afford to collect resentments or accumulate harsh feelings.

Forgiveness is necessary for The new arrival weighed eight struggling with feelings of hate, many reasons. Not the least of these is that Christ, our Lord, has commanded that we forgive. This in itself ought to make us want to be forgiving of others. Jesus taught us to pray, "And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors" (Matthew 6:12).

Another reason to be forgiving is for our own well-being. Grudges can be devastating to our own health, affecting the physical functions of our bodies.

Negative feelings of hate, resentment, and anger may cause one's blood-pressure to escalate, one's digestion to be poor, and one's nerves to become taunt. But forgiveness brings peace of heart and mind helping us to relax and rest properly.

Perhaps the most important reason to forgive is reconciliation: the restoring of a valuable relationship.

Dr. Morris Ashcraft, my theology professor in seminary, points this out in his book, The Forgiveness of Sins. "Forgiving another is an act of creation." He goes on to show how forgiveness creates a new situation by removing guilt and restoring hope.

Forgiveness, thus, becomes a holy act of redemption as it heals hurt feelings, binds bitter wounds,





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46th Annual Junior Livestock

The 46th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held January 29-30 and February 1 at the Community Center-Showbarn in

Judging will be held on Saturday, as in recent years, with the premium auction sale on

Weigh-in and classification for pigs will be held from 1-5 p.m. on Friday, January 29. Sheep will be weighed and classified from 7-9 a.m. Saturday, January 30.

The steer show will kick off the judging on Saturday at 9 a.m., followed by heifers. The lamb show begins at 11 a.m., and barrows will be judged beginning at 2 p.m.

Judges for the county show will be Bert Williams, steers and heifers; Jamie Osborn, barrows; John Kearney, lambs, and Jess Holloway, showmanship.

Exhibitors of grand champion animals in the 1992 show were Shane Roberts of Farwell, barrow; Monty Schueler of Friona, lambs; Lori Bradshaw of Lazbuddie, steers, and Jarah Redwine of Lazbuddie.

Roberts gave his school its first barrow title in ten years, since Danna Ralston won it in 1982. It was just the sixth barrow title for a Farwell showman in the 45-year history of the show.

Although Lazbuddie showmen have dominated the barrow and sheep divisions down through the years, it was only the seventh steer title for an LHS exhibitor in county show history.

Showmanship winners in 1992 were: barrows--Holly Engelking, Lazbuddie, senior, and Greg Salyer, Friona, junior; lambs--Shana Foster, Lazbuddie, junior, and Cody Simmons, Friona, senior; beef division--Mandy Magby, Lazbuddie, junior, and Clint Hurst, Lazbuddie,

Roberts' barrow was a crossbreed, which made the eighth time for a crossbred animal to win the county title. Hampshire breeds hold a wide lead in the overall history of the show with 16 titles. Durocs and crosses have won eight times

apiece; Polands have been tapped six times, Chester Whites four and Yorkshire once.

Miss Bradshaw's winning steer in 1992 was an exotic cross. It was the 14th time for an exotic cross to win the county steer title.

Stock show boosters and buyers are urged to attend the premium auction sale on Monday, February 1 at 6:45 p.m. The animals placing in the upper portion of each class will be eligible for the sale.





Laney also recommended additional reforms: requiring the Calendars Committee to conduct its business publicly; requiring every bill referred to Calendars to be acted upon within a certain time period; and establishing a 12-hour layout requirement for bill substitutes to give members time to read major revisions to bills before voting on

Laney said he will give House members several days to study the changes before he schedules a debate and vote on them.

Laney also will appoint an ethics advisor to help him and the House understand and follow state ethics law and produce an ethics manual as a reference for legislators and their staff members.

4-H, FFA Youth Need Community Support

Christmas is over, the tree is put up and it's time to go back to work and to school. That can mean only one thing for 4-H and FFA members--stock show time.

Not everyone in these organizations has an animal project, but many do, and this is their time to shine. For months now, they've been raising a pig, lamb, rabbit or steer. The stock show is a measure of how well they did.

But in the stock show and youth business, the name of the game is not supposed to be how good you do, but how well you play the game. In other words, how much does a youngster learn from having the project and entering a competition?

Both 4-H and FFA teach the skills in animal care. They learn about rations, grooming, health care and exercise with their projects.

But the youngsters learn much more than hands-on skills. They pick up leadership skills and gain self-esteem. They learn how to handle monetary transactions through the buying and selling of their animal.

And when it's all said and done, it's only natural for them to want to have a blue ribbon to say they are winners. But the blue ribbon isn't necessary to make them a winner. They're all richer for the experience. It's an experience worth repeating. Those who don't carry home the big trophy and aren't declared the big winner might have a hard time

At the end of most stock shows is a premium sale. Of course, the grand champion animals sell for large amounts and sometimes people question if this is teaching the youngsters anything.

No one is trying to say the animal is worth those large premiums paid. That money is like a reward. It's for a job well done. And, the person or persons paying the high premium use the opportunity to do a little advertising as well as say, "I believe in our youth.'

The ones who aren't awarded the grand prizes, however, need community support, also. The many people who come back year after year know why they give money to be used in the auctions. But for those who haven't been, your support is needed for those individuals who did not carry away

It's not to reward them for raising a poor animal, but to give them a second chance. A chance to try again, to work harder and learn more. There are few who would argue against investing in the education of our youth. After all, they will be the leaders of tomorrow.
