Dot Roach said at their home in town, the rain gauge showed fifty-five hundredths, but their son, Jerry, who farms six miles south-east, received one and two-tenths.

Laura Bartlett said they had about an inch and live five miles north and the McCains received about three-fourths of an inch and they live about three miles northeast.

Bubby Marshall farms eight miles east near Hub and said the high winds and hail did a lot of damage to his corn crop. The high winds damaged Gene Brito's barn at Hub and a big tower was blown down in the area.

The lightning was terrible all around and ball games were called off in Bovina.

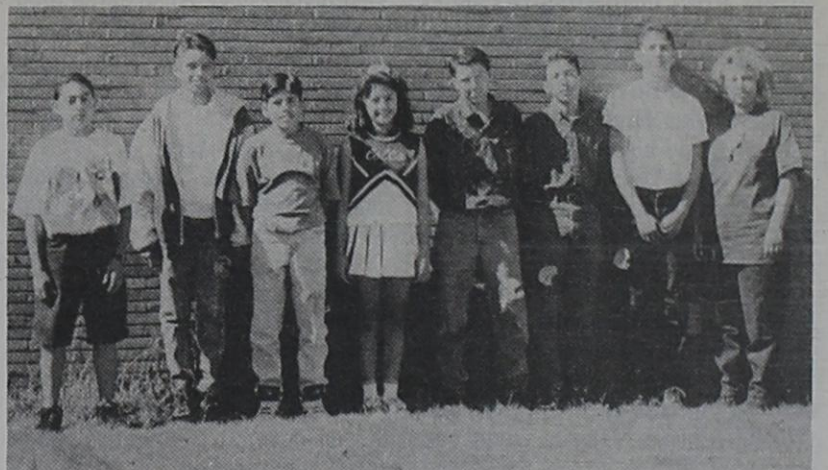
## Enter The Weekly FOOTBALL CONTEST Local 4-H Club Sets Cookout

If you wish to enter the competition, write your forecast of the first killing freeze on a post card and mail it or bring it to the Blade office.

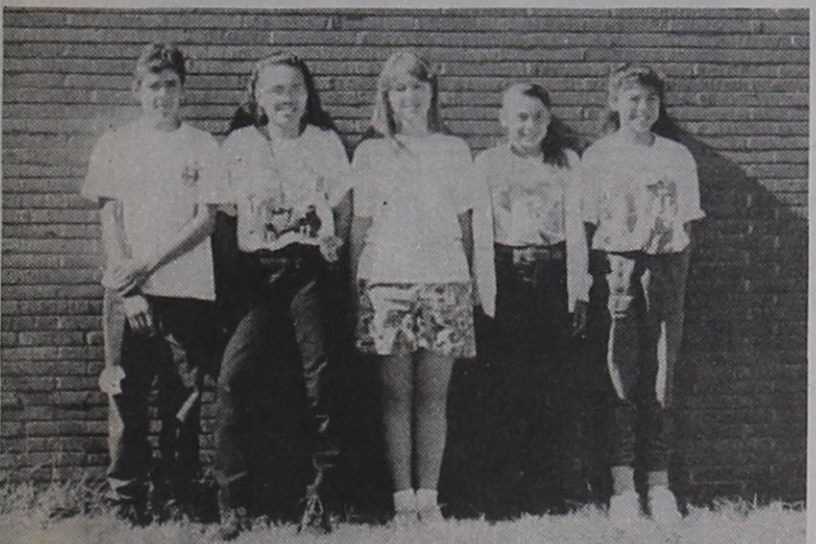
Also, put the date that you enter, your prediction of the date and time of the first freeze.

# Country Cooking Satisfies Appetite

I visited my grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. C.W. Vick, in Breckenridge last week. After all of my low-fat, low-cholesterol broiled chicken breasts, it was nice to have some old-fashioned country cooking for a change.

The first night I was there, we had roast beef with carrots, potatoes and gravy, biscuits, turnip greens and iced tea. The next night, it was fried round steak with mashed potatoes and gravy, potato rolls, cucumber salad and iced tea. For dessert both nights, we had cake and ice cream.

Of course, each morning we had fried or scrambled eggs, bacon and ham, toast with homemade plum jam, coffee and milk.

Needless to say, I haven't ventured over to the scales since I got back home.

These foods, as well as the favorites my mother fixed when I lived at home, are my comfort foods. Although I have developed my own cooking style since I've been cooking for myself, I still return to the foods of my parents and grandparents from time to time.

I tend to use very little fat—especially shortening—and not much sugar in my everyday cooking. But, on one of those gloomy, homesick kind of days, I'm apt to serve up a platter of fried chicken with Apple Surprise for dessert.

By all means, if you're on a special diet, follow the advice of your doctor, but if you can afford to splurge every now and then, try the following recipes for an old-fashioned Texas meal:

**FRIED ROUND STEAK**  
1 large round steak  
Worcestershire sauce, to taste  
Salt and pepper or lemon-pepper seasoning, to taste  
1 cup flour  
Oil for frying

Tenderize the steak and cut into serving-sized pieces. Sprinkle each

piece with Worcestershire sauce and seasonings, and dip into flour. Heat 1 inch oil in a large skillet.

Cook the steak in the oil, turning once, until dark brown and cooked through.

### GRAVY

1 cup flour  
2 cups milk  
Salt and pepper, to taste

Note: if you are making the fried round steak recipe above, you can use any leftover flour for the gravy.

Mix the flour and milk in a glass or bowl. Drain any excess oil from the frying pan. Pour the flour mixture into the pan and cook, stirring, until it is of the desired consistency. Season to taste. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

### MASHED POTATOES

6 to 8 potatoes  
Milk  
1 tablespoon butter or margarine  
Salt and pepper, to taste

Peel the potatoes and cut into quarters. Put the potatoes in a large saucepan and cover with water. Boil until soft. Drain the potatoes and place in a mixing bowl. Add a splash of milk, butter, salt and pepper. Whip with an electric mixer or mash by hand. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

### APPLE SURPRISE

1 can apple pie filling  
1 box yellow or white cake mix  
1 stick (1/2 cup) butter or margarine

Pour the apple pie filling into a well-greased 8-inch or 9-inch square baking pan. Spread the dry cake mix evenly over the pie filling. Cut the stick of butter into thin pats and place the pats on the top of the cake mix. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until the top is golden brown and the mixture is bubbly around the edges.

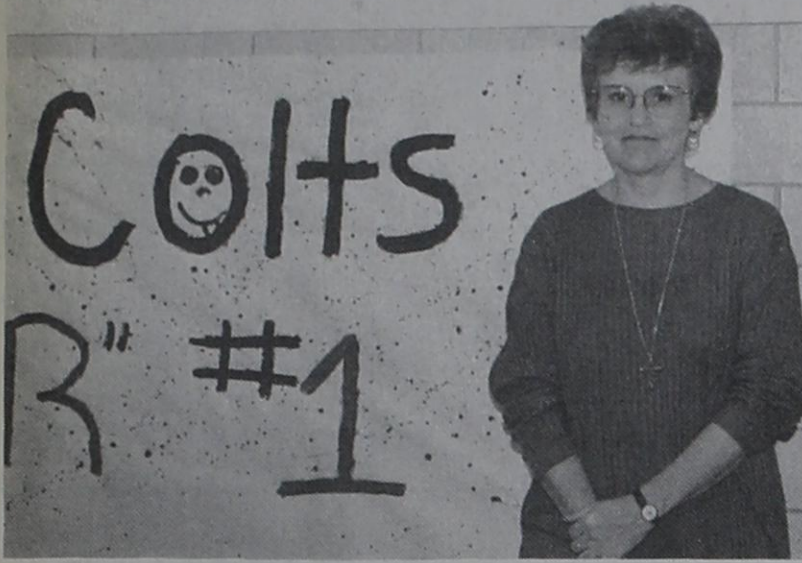

## Save Hot Water Cost Without Switching To Cold Showers

A water heater fueled by propane could save the average Texas family nearly \$200 a year compared to the cost of heating water electrically, while at the same time, benefitting the environment and creating jobs in Texas.

That's the message of the Railroad Commission's new newspaper and radio advertising campaign that kicks off statewide this week. The campaign is part of the Commission's legislative mandate to educate Texans about propane's benefits as an environmentally beneficial alternative fuel.

Commission studies show the initial expense of installing a propane-fueled water heater is no higher than other types, but the return on investment is much faster. According to James E. (Jim) Nugent, chairman, fuel-cost savings recoup the initial purchase price in about two years. "That's about a 50% annual return on investment," Nugent said, "which is considerably more than you get at the bank." Assuming typical delivered costs of 82 cents per gallon for propane, savings over the ten-year life of the water heater could total more than \$2,000, Nugent added.

A major reason for propane's economy is its efficiency compared to other methods of energy production. More than two-thirds of the energy generated by oil- or coal-burning electric utility companies literally goes up in smoke, and is, therefore, lost at the source. Propane, a clean-burning primary fuel, is nearly 2-1/2 times as efficient, delivering 87% of its energy directly to the burner tip.

Propane is widely distributed and readily available throughout Texas. "More than a third of the nation's propane comes from Texas," noted Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers. "Texas has a state-wide propane production and distribution network in place, and the more people take advantage of propane as a domestic and commercial heating fuel, the more jobs that network creates." Nabers added that a new market worth \$65 million a year to the Texas economy would arise if the 60-70% of all propane-heated Texas households that heat water electrically switched over to propane.

Propane technology has also become more efficient in recent years. Today's propane water heater uses one third less fuel than heaters manufactured as recently as five years ago, which contributes to the fuel's economy. Advanced burner design, energy-saving temperature controls and better insulation make the most of every gallon of fuel.

Quick recovery is a primary benefit of propane water heaters. Anyone who has ever run out of hot water in the middle of a shower, especially in cold weather, will appreciate the prospect of having plenty of hot water on tap. In a comparison of the first-hour recovery rates of typical 40-gallon water heaters, the propane model provided nearly twice as much hot water over the same period of time as a comparable electric model.

As part of the Commission's latest educational consumer campaign, look for newspaper ads touting "Pay less per fill up" in 386 weekly newspapers across the state and statewide radio commercials illustrating the economic and environmental benefits of propane water heating. 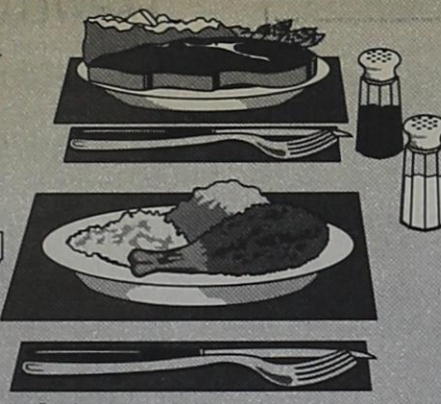

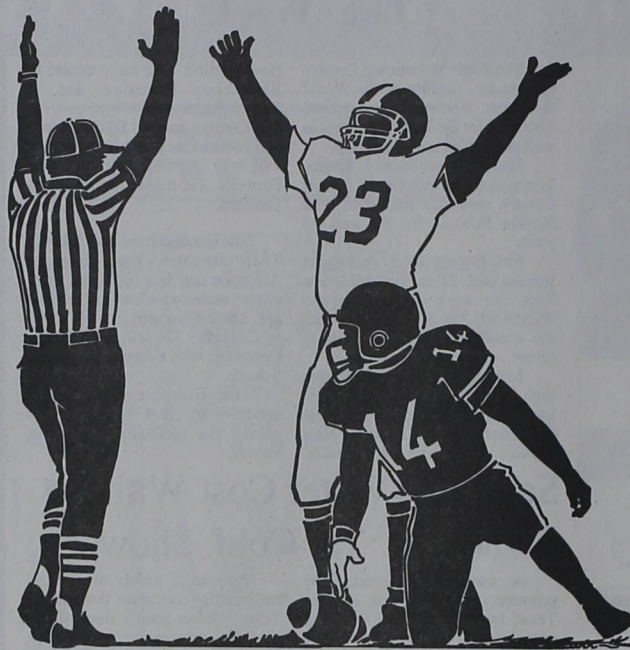

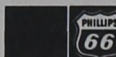
