Gunman Opens Fire.

Miami, Fla., Feb. 16 .- A gunman fired a stream of bullets into the party of President-elect Roosevelt Wednesday night wounding Mayor Anton Cermak of Chicago, and four others, but Mr. Roosevelt was unhurt.

A man giving the name of Joe Zingara, of New York, to police was held as the shooter.

Robert H. Gore, Chicago friend of Mr. Roosevelt, quoted the assailant as saying: "I kill all presidents, Kill all

The Chicago mayor was about 20 feet from the automobile of Mr. Roosevelt in Bayfront park and was approaching the machine.

Startled and momentarily stunned by the firing close to his car Roosevelt waved to the crowd and shouted "I am all right" as he was hurriedly driven away through the confusion bearing Cermak to a hospital. The shooting and screams of the victims created momentary pandemonium. Quiet was

quickly restored, however. Mrs. W. F. Cross, Miami, struck the shooter's arm as he let go with the fifth shot and shoved his elbow into city and a policeman overpowered the man and shackled him to a car.






