Community Network Committee Has Good Turn-Out For Meeting

The planning committee of the Bovina Community Network hosted a community meeting on Tuesday, October 30, in the school administration building. The discussion was focused on the implementation of the new community project that is funded through a \$525,000 grant from the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund Board.

Terry Ann Dukes of Abilene led the presentation and invited the participants to identify needs, problems, and resources related to improving the community. The 32 citizens that attended the session contributed many ideas that will provide the framework for the implementation plan to be presented to the TIF Board in February.

The needs and problems

discussed by the community included: software, continuing education, cross-cultural involvement, geographical distance from educational and health services, workforce development, after school computer access for children, economic opportunities, information on small business start-up, computer instruction for senior citizens, high speed Internet access, public health, public information on the web, and GED programs.

The existing resources listed by the community included: technological knowledge among the citizens, county extension agents, fire department, emergency medical services, senior citizens organization, churches, school, farming and agriculture, clinic building, and the abundance of young people.

The planning committee met with Dukes on Wednesday to analyze the information from the Tuesday meeting and start the development of the implementation plan. The meeting was centered on the development of vision and mission statements, governance approaches, managerial structure, collaborative agreements, project services, goals and objectives, and project timelines.

Members of the planning committee will travel to Taos on November 5 and 6 to visit the La Plaza Community Network. The La Plaza network is recognized as one of the top organizations in the country and has received multiple awards and recognitions. The director of La Plaza, Judith Pepper, and her staff will present information regarding an overview of the network, training classes, inception and development of health projects, and web design training initiatives. The visit will also include a tour of the Taos YFC computer lab and the Taos Pueblo public access computer site. Interested individuals may visit the La Plaza web site at www.laplaza.org.

Community members are encouraged to continue to participate in the Bovina project by attending future meetings and frequently visiting the web site at www.bovinanet.org. The meeting schedule will be posted on the calendar on the web site.

BHS Band Competes In Odessa

The Bovina High School Band traveled to Odessa Saturday to compete at the Area "A" UIL Marching Contest. The band was one of thirteen A bands competing for the honor to advance on to the State Marching Contest.

The bands selected to advance in competition at Waco November 5 were Sudan, Smyer and Whiteface High Schools.

"The Bovina band performed very well and received many compliments from the judges. Many parents, administrators and school board members were at the contest," said Bill Shelly, band director.

Bovina's band, which consists of 53 students in grades eight through twelve, placed seventh in the competition.

Shelly, who has been at BHS for nine years, says this is the first time anyone can remember a Bovina band competing in the Area contest.

The 2001 BHS band king and queen will be crowned during half-time ceremonies this Friday during the Bovina vs. Springlake game. Everyone is invited to come out and see the band perform during half-time.

The Search For Music To "GBA"



MY SEARCH FOR the music to "God Bless America" turned out to be a week-long effort and involved help from several local folks, but we finally succeeded.

Our daughter Laura, who home-schools our two little granddaughters in Lubbock, starts their school every morning with the Pledge of Allegiance and a patriotic song. She had called on Sunday to say that she wasn't having any luck finding the sheet music to "God Bless America" and she also wanted to play it for their Sunday School class which she teaches at Bacon Heights Baptist.

"No problem!" says Momma Carol. "I can find it for you." So I promptly began to search through the piano bench. No luck! I felt pretty certain that Eva Miller would have it, but hated to bother her because Roy had fallen that week and I knew she'd be having to look after him.

Monday morning I went to the Library, since Darla and Brenda are always so helpful with my many projects. They hunted through the shelves, but couldn't find it. Okay, check the internet. You could find the words to the song and even listen to the music on several websites, but no written music for playing it on piano. I thought it would surely be in a hymn book somewhere, but a trip to the Methodist Church turned up no music.

Next, I left word with local music teachers Sherie Taylor and Cathy Youree, asking if they had the music and would they call me back. Finally on Friday, Darla called from the Library and said they had just located it and had made a copy for me. Success at last! I hurried down to the library in order to get it into the mail to Laura right away.

There was a little blurb at the top of the sheet of music that explained how the song came about. Words and music to "God Bless America" were written by Irving Berlin in 1918 during World War I when Berlin put together his first Army show entitled "Yip, Yip, Yaphank." But he had cut the song from the show rather than risk being accused of "flagwaving." Good grief! People were worried about being politically correct even back that long ago!

Then twenty years later, in 1938, he was asked to work up a song for an Armistice Day program. He dug down and came up with his old "God Bless America" song, did a little bit of re-work on it, and got Kate Smith to sing it. The song was a huge hit from the first time it was performed. In fact, some folks say that if ever it was decided to change our national anthem by popular vote, the winner by a landslide would be "God Bless America." Irving Berlin refused to cash in on his own patriotism and the popularity of this new song, so he assigned all royalties from the song to go to the Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts of America.

This explains why the song is not in any church hymnal. It was first written as a show tune, so it was inappropriate for it to be placed in a book of hymns.

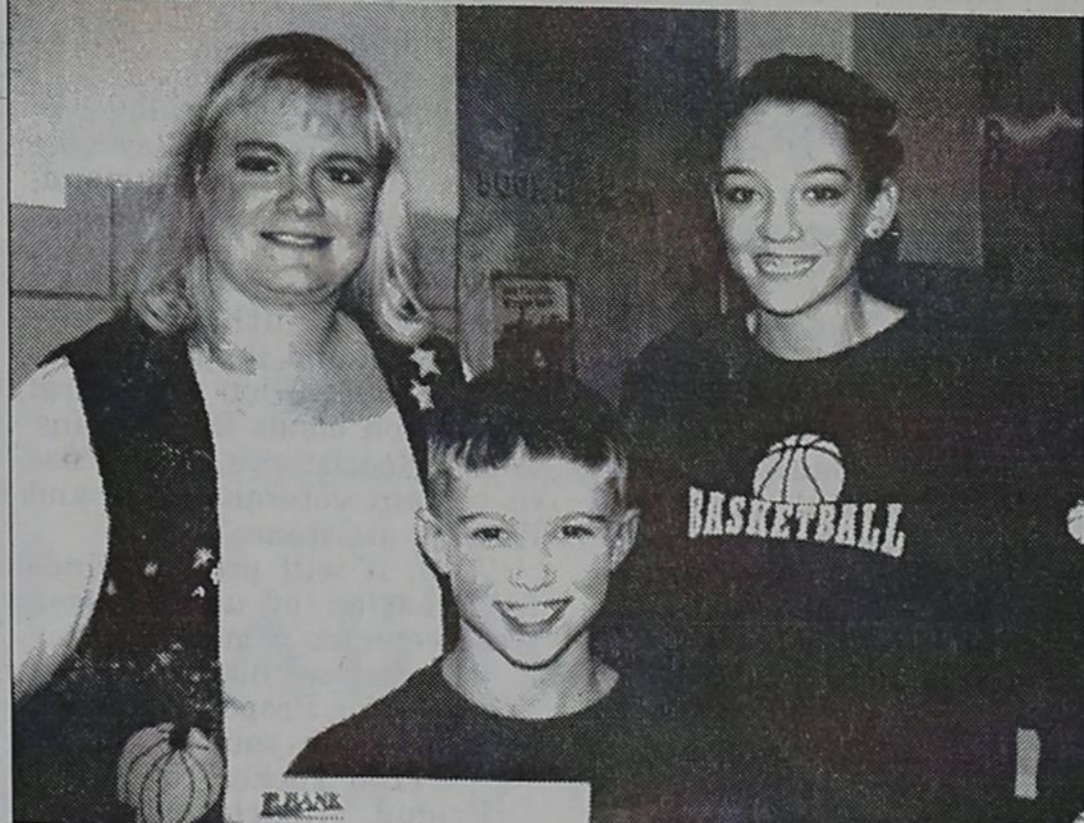
Constitutional Election Tues.

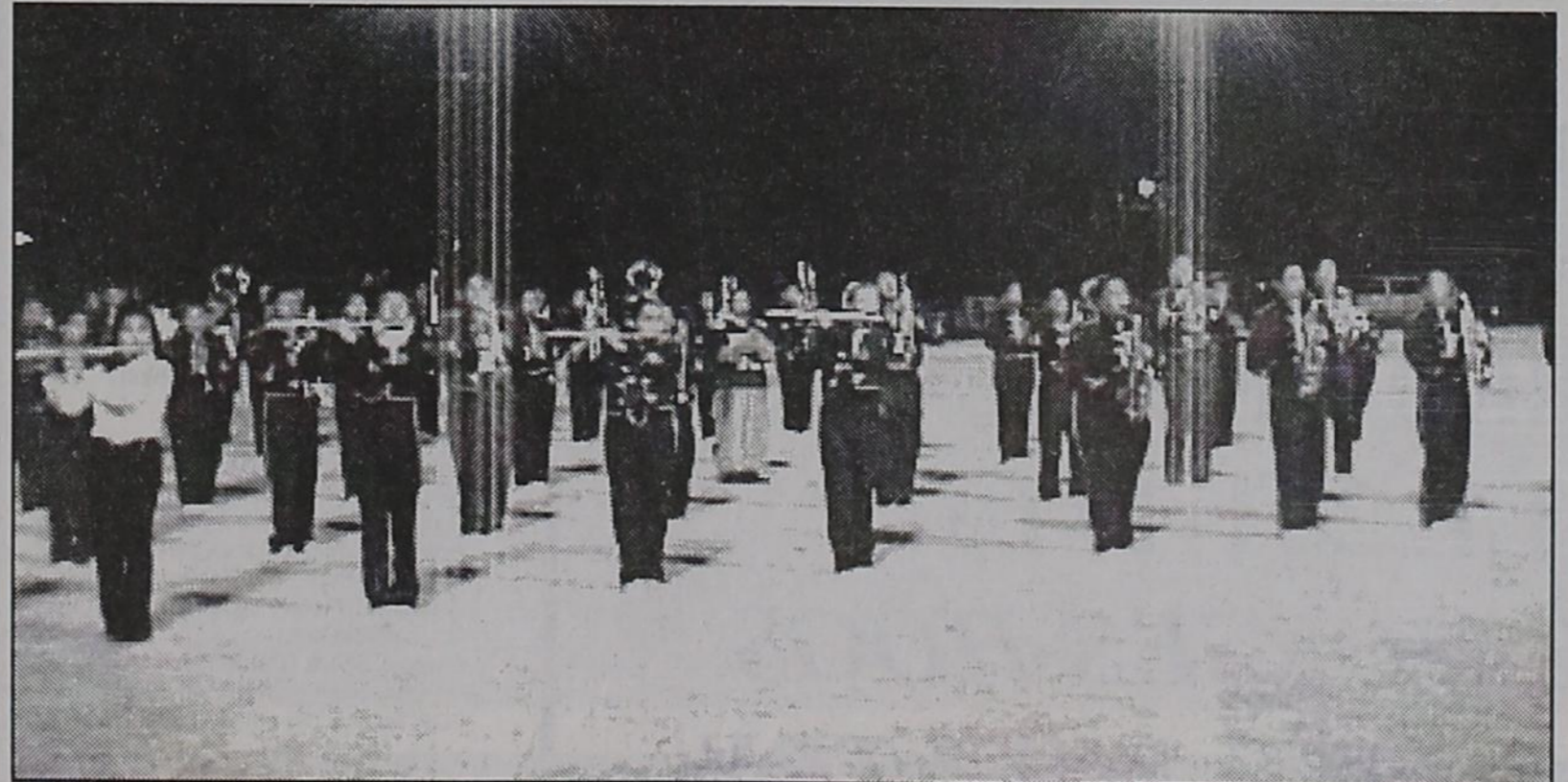
St. Ann's Annual Turkey Dinner Will Be Sunday

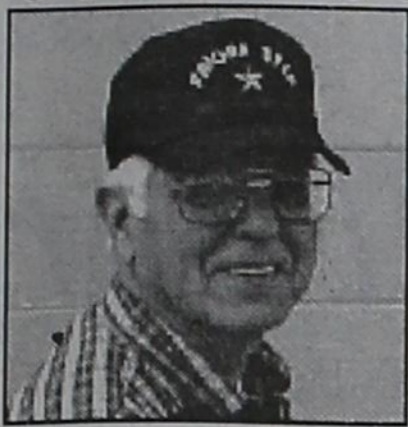
Serving time is 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. Donations will be \$6 for adults and \$3 for

Immunization Clinics Are Set For Nov.

The workshop is offered free of charge and is open to members of the community as well as families served by BSA Hospice.

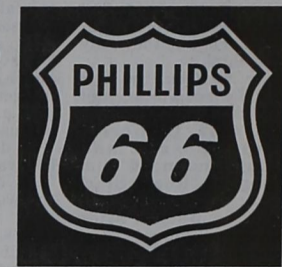

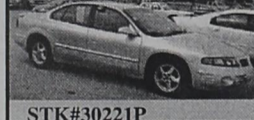

Melba Burleson Is Back Home In Friona Enjoying Life Again

If you ask Melba Burleson "How are you doing?" she'll probably tell you that she is doing a lot better now than she was before she quit using artificial sweeteners.

Melba lost her husband of 57 years, T.I. Burleson, on the fourth of July 2000. Shortly after he passed away, Melba began noticing that she was losing her balance and felt wobbly much of the time, but not really dizzy. She started walking with a shuffling gait to keep from falling, and had a hard time remembering things.

She took a few minor tumbles in her home, but had a serious fall outside on her carport while bending down to pick up some leaves and trash. Her muscles had just stopped working and she simply could not get up. She lay on the carport for quite some time, looking around for someone to come help and noticed that none of her neighbors were at home.

About the time school let out at High School, just a block away from the Burleson home, some youngsters walked by the house on their way home. Melba called out to them saying "I've fallen and can't get up." Since there had been an amusing commercial just like that on TV, the kids thought she was joking around with them. So they smiled at her, gave a little laugh, waved and walked on by.

She then called out a little louder and said "I really do need some help here." The youngsters became quite concerned, ran over to help her up and got her into the house. They would have called 911, but Melba said she was doing better and thought she'd be okay.

Melba's daughter, Kay Burleson Cash, who lives in Salt Lake City, Utah had just lost her father to a mysterious illness and wasn't about to let the same thing happen to her mother. Actually, T. I. Burleson had

died from homochromatosis which is a genetic disorder where the body lacks the ability to throw off excess iron and it slowly destroys the organs and joints. Unfortunately his problem was discovered only after he had already lost liver function and had only a few days left to live.

Kay was determined not to lose her mother too. So Melba and Kay started on a round of medical testing in an effort to find out what was causing this lack of balance, loss of muscle and loss of brain function. Was it an equilibrium problem, an inner ear problem, perhaps an eye problem, something neurological, or maybe her heart? Did she perhaps have a light stroke?

Melba does have a mild form of diabetes that she is able to control with pills, but that did not seem to be the basis for all of this. After MRIs, CAT scans and lots of other tests, there was still not a definite diagnosis. So Kay got on the internet and starting trying to find something that made sense.

Kay says she finally turned over the right rock on the internet at www.presidiotex.com/92symptoms/ which led to several other web pages which gave a list of 92 symptoms associated with aspartame poisoning. Aspartame is the main ingredient in most artificial sweeteners, diet sodas, and about 9,000 other products which are currently on grocery store shelves. Of course, Melba had gone to using artificial sweeteners because of her diabetes.

They discovered that aspartame poisoning is now being closely linked to "Desert Storm Syndrome." In 1995, the CBS program "Sixty Minutes" did a program on the problems suffered by soldiers who had served in Desert Storm. Some of their symptoms were loss of memory, headaches, chronic fatigue, joint pain, confusion,

loss of equilibrium, shortness of breath, insomnia, vertigo, and on and on.

There was a theory that Saddam Hussein had released some unknown poison into the air. But it was also noted that soda pop companies had sent free diet drinks to the Gulf because of a scarcity of water there, and the soldiers guzzled the diet drinks all day long. The drinks sat on pallets for up to eight weeks in the searing 120 degree Arabian sun.

Aspartame, the sweetener in nearly all diet drinks, is composed of aspartic acid, phenylalanine and methyl ester which converts into methanol or wood alcohol. In the body, the wood alcohol converts to formaldehyde. The phenylalanine breaks down into DKP which is a brain tumor agent.

So it seems that when the diet drinks were heated from sitting out in the sun, they became similar to the legendary rot-gut moonshine home brew of years gone by. The diet drinks became even more poisonous to the health of our soldiers.

Of course, 77 year old Melba Burleson did not serve in Desert Storm, but she did consume a lot of diet drinks and she did store her unopened drinks in an un-airconditioned garage. In July of this year, Kay convinced her mom to quit using anything that contained artificial sweeteners, and aspartame in particular. Within three days Melba said her sensation of falling had gone away.

It has been three months now, and Melba is walking better and doing physical therapy to regain the use of her atrophied muscles. She uses her walker only at times when she'll be on her feet for quite awhile, such as while shopping.

She is glad to be driving again, but says her neighbors were just wonderful to help her out and to take her places while she was incapacitated. She particularly mentioned how sweet and helpful Joe and Billie Tongate had been to her. She is still slowly improving over time, but doesn't really know yet if she has suffered any permanent damage that cannot be improved. Kay believes that since

aspartame destroys brain function, it is also dangerous for young children and may contribute to ADD, hyperactivity and learning disabilities. She says this additive is accepted by everyone, including doctors, because it has FDA approval, but she urges anyone who has undiagnosable symptoms to check this web page on the internet: www.dorway.com. She also points out that people have nothing to lose by just taking a 60-day self test; simply by getting off sweeteners and diet drinks for that amount of time to see if it make a difference in your health problems.

"There are strong conflicting views about aspartame," Kay noted, "so you will have to do your own research, become informed, and make up your own mind about it."

Kay is an FHS graduate of 1963. She and her husband Ray Don Cash, as well as their son Clay are all Texas Tech grads. Kay taught school for awhile after getting her degree. She and Don now live in Salt Lake City, Utah, where he is Chairman and CEO of the Questar Fortune 500 corporation which is headquartered there in SLC.

He is currently living in Owensburg, Kentucky where he serves as Compliance Manager, dealing with state and federal regulations for Western Kentucky Gas, a subsidiary of Atmos Energy which is headquartered in Dallas. Melba Burleson is currently back to enjoying each day quite a bit more than she was just a few months ago. Everyone hopes she continues to improve and get her life back to normal very soon.

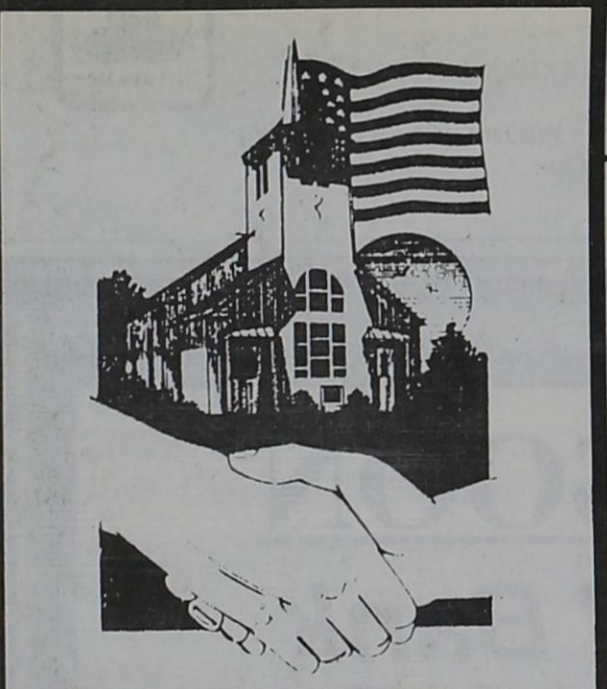
