Austin, June 1 .- Only loose ends of the 43rd Texas legislative skein needed to be gathered together Wednesday night before this state's longest unbroken session of a legislature could be ended.

Sine die adjournment had been set for Thursday at noon, the 143rd day of the session.

Only one other legislature ever came near this record for a continuous session-the 13th legislature, which was in session 142 continuous days. The 12th legislature, which ratified the present constitution, was in session 271 days but only intermittently.

"You mean that we ought to do street preaching," a preacher once asked me.

But street preaching is not at all analogous to what Jesus did. The cities in which He worked were both small and leisurely: the market was a gathering place where everybody came at some time -the transfer place for all merchandise and for ideas. Where will you find such a market-place in modern days? A corner of Fifth Avenue? A block on Broadway? Only a tiny fraction of the city's people pass any given point in the down-town district on any given day. A man might stand and preach for years at Fifth Avenue and Thirtieth Street, and only one in a hundred thousand would ever

know that he lived. No; the present day market-place is the newspaper and magazine. Printed columns are the modern thoroughfares; published advertisements are the cross-roads where the sellers and the buyers meet. Any issue of a national magazine is a world's fair, a bazar filled with the products of the world's work. Clothes and clocks and candlesticks; soup and soap and cigarettes; lingeries and limousines—the best of all of them are there, proclaimed by their makers in persuasive tones. That every other voice should be raised in such great market-places, and the voice of Jesus of Nazareth be still—this is a vital omission which He would find a way to correct. > What shall it profit a man if he shall gain the whole world and lose his own soul; or what shall a man give in exchange for his



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


