PRECINCT 2 GETS TWELVE MILES OF ROAD GRAVELING

School Bus Route to Be Graveled About 8 Miles; Allotment to Commissioner Canon Includes Trent Work Also.

Confirmation of a project providing for graveling 12 miles of reads in precinct No. 2 was received by telegram late Wednesday afternoon from Austin, County Commissioner A. J. Cannon advised The Mail Thursday morning.

"But it will be ten or fiteen days," he stated, 'before work can begin on projects covered, as the road machinery is being used elsewhere just at this

time." "Only those who were on the relief rolls prior to November 16 can be used on this work, according to present instructions," he said. It is hoped, however, that this regulation will be revised at an early date.

Of the proposed 12 miles of graveling, eight miles are on the school bus route from the Tom Spears' place to the intersection with the gravel road at the IXL school house and four miles are allotted to work at and

around Trent. With the additional allotments this week of 15,000 men at one time and 10,000 men later, the number of workers on CWA projects in Texas is now 216,000 men, who have been or will be taken from the direct relief rolls and placed on wages averaging \$12.00 per work week of 30 hours.
