



> Start in then with the first chapter of Genesis and you are gripped at once. Here is no preface, no argument, only a great declaration:

In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth. And the earth was without form, and void : and darkness was upon the face of the deep. And the Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters. And God said, Let there be light; and there was light.

Viewed only as a piece of good writing that paragraph is superb. What a way to begin a story ! How dignified, how impressive! How swift and sure the movement! How nobly superior to the Greek mythologies, and free from their grossness and puerility!

There is an old anecdote, attributed usually to Charles A. Dana. about a reporter who protested that a certain news story could not be compressed into a column. Dana sent him to the Bible.
