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FOLLOWS HUSBAND MSMURRY BAND AND GIRLS DRUM CORPS IN CONCERT HERE SUCCESSFUL IN IN DEATH LESS THAN A MONTH

Mrs. J. E. Costephens, One of Taylor County's Earliest Settlers, Claimed by Death at 12:30 Wednesday.

This community was sadly shocked when the news spread of the death of Mrs. Mary C. Costephens, 72, at 12:30 Wednesday. She was stricken at two o'clock Wednesday morning and her daughter, Mrs. G. H. Johnson, and her son, Roy Costephens, of Sweetwater, both hurried to be at her bedside just as soon as they were informed of her illness.

Death overtook Mrs. Costephens less than a month after the loss of her husband, J. E. Costephens, her life partner for more than a half century and one of Taylor county's earliest pioneers. He was one of those who voted in the election in 1878 to organize this county. Mr. Costephens died on March 8.

Funeral services, held at the Methodist church at 10:30 Thursday morning, were conducted by Rev. P. H. Gates, the family pastor, and Dr. W. M. Murrell, presiding elder of the Abilene district. Interment was in Rose Hill cemetery where a wealth of beautiful flowers covered her last resting place.

Mrs. Costephens, whose maiden name was Mary Caroline Hill, was born Jan. 6, 1862, in Erath county near Stephenville.
