JAMES V. ALLRED, TOM HUNTER, NEIGHBORS, ARE **GUBERNATORIAL RIVALS**

McDonald Third in Primary Race; McCraw and Woodward In Run-Off for Attorney General, Former Has Slight Lead.

Taking the lead on the early returns Saturday night, James V. Allred, Texas' attorney general, and Tom Hunter, Wichita Fails attorney, who ran third in the governor's race two years ago and "did not stop running," the field in the six-man race for the state's chief office, with Charles C. to 162. McDonald, another Wichita Falls man, holding third place.


