Farmers Explain Plight To ABC-Television News Team

SOME BOVINA RESIDENTS are finding their football interests drawn away from the local team this season, but it's not necessarily a conflict of interests.

Richard Horn, 17, a senior halfback for the Borger Bulldogs, is the grandson of Gene and Genevie Ezell and Mina Horn.

Young Horn is getting a taste of American football this year for the first time. He had previously played in Japan, where his parents, Rev. and Mrs. Dick Horn, were missionaries.

So far, Richard has found that the ' fundamentals of football are the same here as they were in Japan. In A number of Bovina area farmers this week told a national news reporter about the plight of farm prices versus cost of producing the 1977 crop, and the impending bad financial plight that growers across the area are facing.

Charles Murphy of ABC-TV News, backed up by a three-man camera crew, talked with a room full of area farmers for more than an hour here Tuesday at the Community Room of First State Bank.

In general, the farmers explained that production costs have doubled in most instances during the past two or three years, while commodity prices are barely one-half of their level of 1973-74. ★ ★ ★ ★ ★ Murphy told the Bovina Blade reporter there was no way of knowing when the segment filmed by the ABC-TV crew would be used by the network.

"We would hope it would be soon, but we have no way of knowing for sure," he said.

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Asked how long they could continue if prices stayed at the present level, the farmers, virtually to a man, replied--

"This is it. We could be out of busines after this year. You work for 20-30 years to accumulate something, and then you could lose it in Besides the low market prices, those interviewed told of how their 1977 production had suffered, due to a hot, dry summer, and in the case of vegetable farmers, rain at the wrong time. One farmer said the corn yield would be from 10 to 25 per cent below his yield for 1976.

Added together, the lower yields, higher production costs, and low market prices do not paint a rosy

picture for the farmers, bankers and virtually everyone living on the High Plains.

"This won't affect just Bovina. It will affect cities like Lubbock and Amarillo, too. They depend upon agriculture for the backbone of their economy, just like we do here," one



Borger's season opening game against Lubbock, Horn ran 54 yards for a touchdown. He went on to score three TDs, and for his performance was named class AAA player of the week by the Amarillo Daily News.

This past week, Horn did not score, but gained 146 yards rushing as Borger outscored Snyder, 21-14. Borger is quite a drive from

Bovina and that presents a problem for the local relatives in watching Horn play. They get a break this Friday, however, as the Bulldogs play the Hereford Whitefaces at Hereford.

Coach E.C. Jenkins is probably wishing that the Horns could have re-located in Bovina. That would have been a big shot in the arm for the Mustangs.

JERRY TIDWELL of Littlefield was writing last week about reading a sports report in an English newspaper, concerning rugby. Tidwell quoted the unlikely piece like this:

Mary Hernandez Has 14; Wins First

With a perfect 14-point score, Mary Hernandez captured the first week's championship of the annual Bovina Businesses Football Contest.


Mrs. Hernandez won the weekly first prize of \$7.50. Ken Horn, with a score of 13, took \$5.00 and Emmett Tabor, with 12 right and a 33-0 choice of Bovina over Happy, garnered third place, with the tie-breaker determining the winner.

Tim Garner had 10 points and a 24-0 prediction for Bovina and Jim Noyes collected 11 points and also predicted a Bovina shutout, at 35-0. Neither figured in the tie-breaker.

Before resorting to the tie-breaker, Tabor had tied at 12 correct with Carol Ware, Patsy Sherrill, Pat Read, Mike Nabers, Jacque Nabers, Johnny Martinez, Manuel Hernandez, Jr. and Hugh Rogers.

Horn missed only one, choosing Palo Duro over Hereford.

of the farmers remarked.

Prentice Mills, office manager of the Parmer County ASCS, also stopped in on the meeting, and quoted some figures which graphically illustrate the farmer's financial plight.

Mills said he had talked to several dozen farmers, and it appeared that production costs per acre for growing corn would run from \$160 to \$217.

"If a farmer could average 7,000 pounds per acre, and this may be hard to do, and providing he could get \$3.50 per hundred, which he hasn't been offered yet, this would gross him \$245 per acre.

"By the time you deduct one-third of the earnings either to a landlord or to the owner if he's the farmer, there's just no way you can come out on this type of setup.

One of the farmers pointed out that it was the custom to plow farmland following harvest to get it ready for the next crop year, but that one cannot see much plowing started as yet.

"They are just having to wait and see what is going to happen. At this point, we just don't know about next year," he said.

Also interviewed by the news team was banker Jack Kassahn. The crew then visited the farm of Jerry McClaran, where footage was taken showing harvest operations.

It is thought the appearance of the ABC-TV representatives was a result of local WIFE members, who were responsible for a national columnist, Paul Harvey, making comments alluding to the plight of the area farmers.

So, the great High Plains of Texas, breadbasket of the nation, is facing a crisis. Whether or not it is able to weather the tide, only time will tell.

Council Tables SPS Rate Request

After approving the previous minutes and authorizing the city secretary to pay the bills, Bovina's City Council, Thursday night, gave approval for the local Fire Department to establish and maintain a backup emergency ambulance unit.

The department had requested the city to allow it to renovate and equip a Chevrolet panel truck (the chief's car) to be used under strictly limited conditions. This is to be done at the department's expense.

Under the program, the vehicle will not be used at any time for regular service and it will be necessary that residents continue to call the regular Friona telephone number when an ambulance is needed and do not call the Bovina Fire Department.

The ambulance will have to meet certain state requirements before it can be put into service.

This ambulance assistance will be utilized only in cases of extreme emergency. Example: A bad accident where equipment sent from Friona is not adequate for the seriousness of the situation and the department is asked for assistance.

All individuals manning the ambulance will have passed a multi-media first aid test and issued a certificate by the American Red Cross. All lapsed certificates must

be brought up to date. The department will train more members in the near future.

Eugene Griffin, Southwestern Public Service Co. representative in Bovina, presented the council a company petition looking to increase the rate paid by the city for electrical services. These include units such as city hall, roping arena, water pumping and the ball park.

Southwestern's presentation included a statement that the rate to the city is "unduly discriminatory" citing the fact that it is the cheapest rate per kilowatt hour paid by any city in the company's jurisdiction and stating, further, the proposed five-year contract is unusual, as a rate increase to most towns is achieved in one step.

The contract, if culminated, will see an increase above the present rates, as follows: first year, 10.3 per cent; second year, 8.07; third year, 7.36; fourth year, 6.86 and, fifth year, 6.18 per cent. Even under this schedule, it was pointed out, the cost to Bovina will not be in line with other towns until the beginning of the fifth year of the contract.

The council voted to postpone decision, pending further study.


In the matter of a request by City Marshal Gary Gillespie for a salary increase, the council took no action.



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



The Gulf Coast area of Texas has potential for growing a \$2 billion cotton crop with the use of newly developed varieties, according to Dr. Luther Bird, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. He based his projection on a crop of 5.5 million acres, lint yields of 700 lbs. per acre, a price of 50c .per pound. Dr. Bird stressed that the new MAR varieties allow farmers to reduce iriputs, such as insecticides, fungicides and fertilizer . . . the threat of disease, insect problems and environmental extremes. The new MAR varieties usually outyield conventional varieties. Most MAR varieties mature 2-4 weeks earlier than current varieties. The research station's effort now is to breed plants to control boll weevils and bollworms. He also said drilling the new cotton varieties in two rows on a 40-inch bed can substantially boost yields. County Young Farmers Get Area 1 Award

The Happy Cowboys lost six fumbles Friday night which helped the Mustangs tromp all over them by a socre of 50-0.

Statistics in the game did not reflect a lopsided score as Bovina gained 50 more total yards than Happy. But the difference came with an aggressive and hard hitting defensive which shut out the Cowboy threat.

The Mustangs received the opening kickoff and drove 58 yards for the first score, with Ruben Salazar diving in from the one. Ronnie Cary kicked the PAT and with 6:33 in the first quarter the Mustangs had started their slaughter, 7-0.

Eddie Garcia stopped the first Happy drive by recovering a fumble on the Happy 15 yard line. Five plays later Gerald Shelby went in from the one and Cary added the PAT. The next Happy possession ended on their own 20 when David Murphy recovered a mishandled ball. Then four plays later Murphy ran in from the nine for a score.

Happy couldn't do anything right and quarterback Tim Moudy tossed a pass into the hands of another waiting Mustang on the 15 yard line. A penalty against Happy moved the ball to the 4, and Doug Roming danced in from the one yard line two plays later. Murphy caught a Cary pass for the PAT and when the first quarter ended Bovina led, 29-0.

On Happy's next possession Murphy again covered a fumble and the Mustangs had it again on the 29. With 4:21 left in the first half Cary sneaked in from the 4, and made the score 37-0, after Salazar ran in the PAT.

Shelby took a pitchout and rounded left end four yards for another Bovina touchdown. The PAT failed and the Mustangs led 44-0.

When the Cowboys got the ball back they netted minus six yards, then Murphy, Pat Ware and Garcia sacked the punter on the 10 yard line, giving Bovina the ball at that point. Bovina fumbled back to Happy on the 2 yard line. But on the next play David Steelman covered a Happy fumble inside paydirt and Bovina had their 50-0 score.

With 45 seconds left in the game Cary again crossed the goal line but lost the handle, and Happy recovered for a setback and got the ball out on the 20.

Leading rusher in the game was Roming with 63 yards in 14 carries and one TD. Shelby was close behind with 57 yards in 13 carries and two TDs. Cary rushed five times for 23 yards and a TD, and Salazar went six yards in seven attempts and a TD.

Murphy carried the ball once for nine yards and a touchdown, while Richard Villarreal went 13 yards in just two carries. Thad Rains carried seven times for ten yards.

Bovina hit on five of nine passes for 39 yards and lost two fumbles. They had 151 rushing yards, and 190 total. Happy caught three of five passes for 51 yards and had one intercepted. The Cowboys lost six fumbles.


Bovina was penalized eight times for 65 yards, and Happy eight times for 69 yards.

We think the trip was both interesting and helpful and we're happy to have the opportunity to see



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
