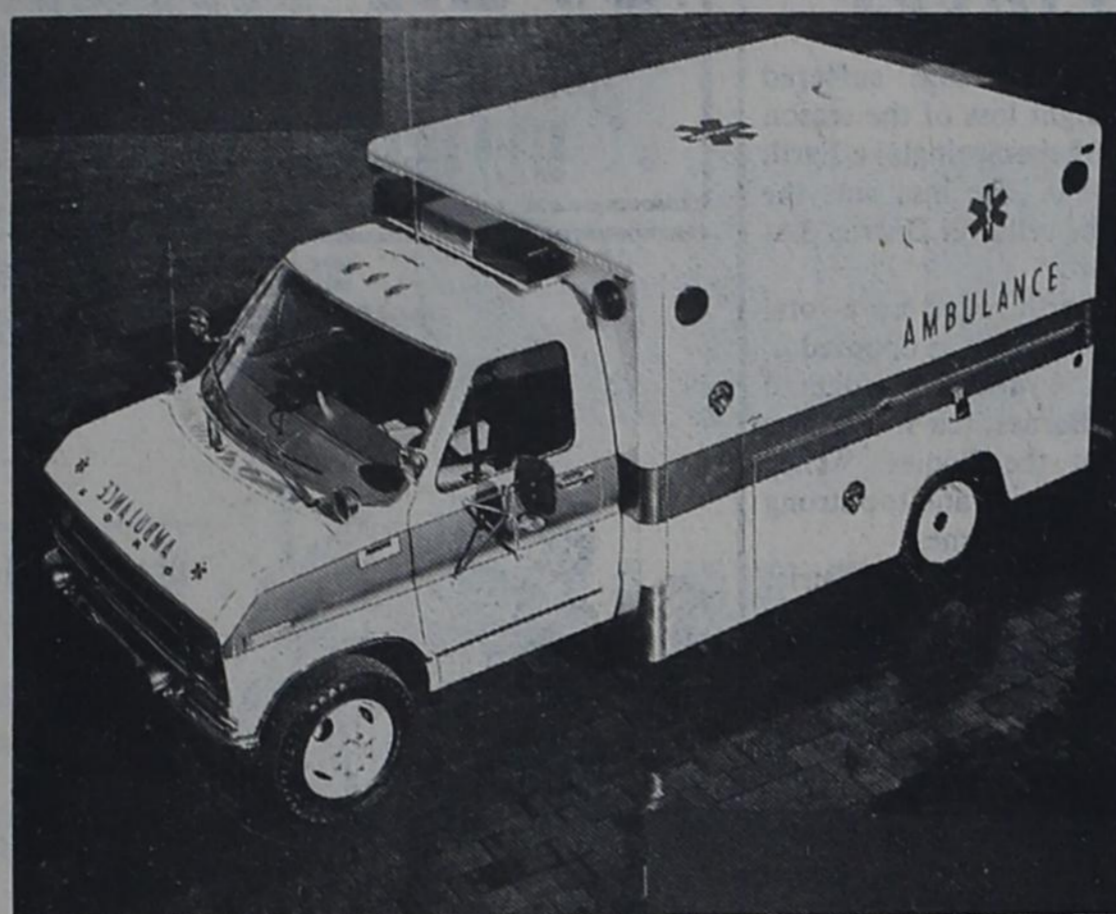

City Council Okays Ambulance Purchase

At Thursday night's meeting of the City Council, plans for a new Bovina Ambulance were finalized. The council gave their permission for the ambulance service to advertise for bids on a new vehicle. These bids will be opened on November 29 and the new ambulance should be in service some time in the early part of December.

The vehicle the council approved ordering will permit transportation and treatment of up to four patients at one time. It should be a lot more comfortable for those who need transporting to a hospital than the old ambulance. It will also make possible much more efficient treatment in the ambulance than the old one.

Since this ambulance will cost the city over \$20,000, donations will be needed to help with the expenses. Many businesses and citizens have already contributed, but all other donations will cut down on the amount and duration of payments. Members of the service will also be picking up corn, so any farmer can contact the city office if they have corn to be picked up.

As soon as the ambulance arrives and is accredited and registered by the state, it will be on display. Everyone in the area is invited to come by and

see what an advance this is in transporting the sick and injured.

Service Is Set Sunday

The annual Thanksgiving Service for Bovina will be held on November 18 at 6:30 p.m. at the United Methodist Church. The Rev. Jerry Rockwell of the First Baptist Church will be preaching and will be assisted by Zeferino Villarreal of St. Ann's Catholic Church; Frank Soto of the Baptist Mission, and the host pastor, Dick Richards.

Music is being planned by the United Methodist Church under the direction of Mrs. Kregg Wilson and with help from other churches. The offering taken that night will go to the Ministerial Association's Benevolence fund to help the needy during the coming year. This offering is only taken during the Thanksgiving Service.

There will be a time of fellowship after the service in the Fellowship Hall of the United Methodist Church. This will be a time of visiting and sharing with others in the community.

Fortenberry Resigns As County Judge

County Judge Paul Fortenberry, who had three years remaining on a new four-year term of office, tendered his resignation this week to the Commissioners' Court, effective December 31, 1979.

The move was an unexpected one on behalf of the court, who will have the responsibility of appointing a person to serve as judge for 1980. Those interested in the position may file and run in the 1980 elections for the remaining two years (1981-82) of Fortenberry's term.

"I fully intended to fill out the term when I was elected in 1978, but decided on this course lately," Fortenberry said. He indicated that the decision had nothing to do with the commissioner's court, calling his reasons "strictly personal."

"Paul was the perfect man for the job. He was easy to get along with, and he knew his business. The commissioners were stunned at his decision, but at the same time, if he can go and do some things, we understand and wish him well," stated Commissioner Jack Patterson.

"It was just as much a surprise to us as it has been to everyone else. We're going to have a big job finding someone to fill Paul's shoes," stated Commissioner Ernest Osborn of Friona.

"I'm concerned about it, and I intend to be prayerful about the situation. We will appreciate the help and concern of everyone in resolving the situation," Patterson added.

Fortenberry presented the following statement concerning his decision:

"On November 9, 1979, I submitted my resignation as County Judge of Parmer County to the Commissioners Court of Parmer County, effective December 31, 1979.

"This was not an easy decision to make, as there is still three years to go on my present term. I fully intended, when I ran the last time, to complete this term. However, I now feel that I should retire at the end of this year. This decision was not made in haste; rather, I have been considering it for some three or four months.

Vote Total Very Low

Only 95 voters cast ballots in Bovina last Tuesday in the constitutional amendment election. Countywide, the turnout was 401 of the county's 4,519 registered voters.

On the first proposal, which was to change the term of office for notaries public, was defeated in Bovina, 69-26, and although it failed countywide, it led in state voting.

The second proposition, which was to allow legislative review of the state agency rule-making process, failed here, 64-31. The measure also failed to pass statewide.

The third proposal, to establish a guaranteed loan program for the purchase of farm and ranch land was passed here, 63-30, and it also passed statewide.

Turkey Raffle Benefits Band

The Bovina High School Mustang Band and Band Boosters are sponsoring a Thanksgiving turkey raffle to benefit the band in raising funds for the spring trip.

High School band members will be selling \$1.00 tickets to be used in the drawings. Two drawings will be held at noon on Tuesday, November 20. The winner of each drawing will receive a large turkey, purchased from the Bovina Supermarket.

Community support of the band in this project is greatly appreciated.

"My reasons are strictly personal, and my health is okay except for the usual problems that go along with being 62 years of age. There are a few things Movelda and I would like to do, including enjoying our grandsons, while we have the abilities and time.

"I wish to publicly thank the people of Parmer County for the confidence they placed in me in 1974, and again in 1978. They gave me an opportunity to enter a field which was new to me, and was a great challenge to me. There is a great deal of difference in the grain business and County government, but I have enjoyed it. I am still very much interested in the grain business, as that is where I spent most of my adult life.

"However, being County Judge has given me an opportunity to study and enter into fields that have been very interesting and rewarding. I have made many Judgements while in office, and I assure you that each one was what I believed to be right and just at the time. I have taken full responsibility for each decision. There have been times when I became a bit discouraged, when it appeared that action taken was not appreciated or respected; then when someone responds in an affirmative way, I realized it was all worthwhile. It would be nice to be able to help

everyone who needs help. Of course, that is impossible.

"I must give special thanks to those good friends of my home area, who have stood by me and my family in times of tragedy, as well as times of happiness and accomplishment. They are special friends to me, and I will always treasure their friendship. Their confidence in me lifted me up when I really needed it.

"In closing, I would encourage everyone to become involved in government at all levels. It has reached the point, in the upper levels of government, that the person who pays the bill is given no consideration because most of us are too busy making a living to express our wishes to our representatives.

"Write your representatives often and express your feelings about any subject. For instance; the SALT Agreement, the Panama situation, bussing, inflation, welfare, foreign policy, Cuba, defense, just to name a few. They will answer your letter, and probably inform you further about the subject. This way, we can all be better informed.

"Again, thank you for your confidence and friendship over the years. I will always treasure it."

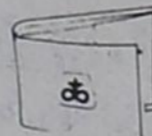

QUESTIONS OFTEN ASKED ABOUT YOUR EYES

Q: I failed the vision portion of my driver's license test. Why am I required to have my eyes examined by an eye doctor?

A: In Texas it is a state law that you must have an eye doctor examine your eyes if you fail the vision screening test given by the Driver's License office.

Q: After my eyes are examined by a licensed eye doctor, does this mean I can get my driver's license?

A: Not necessarily. If eyeglasses will improve your vision enough, the eye doctor will certify this and you must obtain a pair of eyeglasses and wear them while driving. However, in some cases vision can not be improved enough to qualify the driver for a license.

Q: What happens if I can not qualify visually for a license to drive?

A: The eye doctor merely certifies what your vision is, what is causing the problem, and if he thinks it will get better or worse. The Driver's License office makes the final decision as to whether or not you qualify to be licensed or not.

Q: Can any eye doctor make this examination?

A: Any licensed Optometrist or Ophthalmologist can make the examination and complete the necessary forms. Generally speaking, it is best to go back to your family eye doctor for this.

Q: Why is all this necessary, just to get a driver's license?

A: Nearly half of today's drivers have never had an official eye examination of any kind. But all new drivers license applicants in all 50 states now must pass at least some sort of test for visual acuity before being issued a driver's license. Forty-four states examine for color blindness, only 23 states check for depth perception, 15 check field of vision, a few test night vision and none check for glare resistance. Most everyone agrees that the driver who can not see properly is a hazard on the road.

Q: To be a good safe driver, what vision skills are needed?

1. First of all, good distant acuity is a necessity. If you can not see good at a distance, naturally you would pose a hazard on the road.
2. Depth perception is important. This is the ability to correctly judge distances between yourself and other objects--especially those in motion.
3. A normal field of vision is necessary. The ability to see over a wide area without moving either your eyes or your head. This is your peripheral or side vision.
4. Good muscle balance--the ability to use your eyes together and not see double.
5. Night vision and glare resistance are both essential to good driving. This is the ability to see under low illumination (at night) and recover after glare of oncoming headlights.

PRAYER: Father, make us more loving that we may reflect Your image in which we were created. For Your sake. Amen.

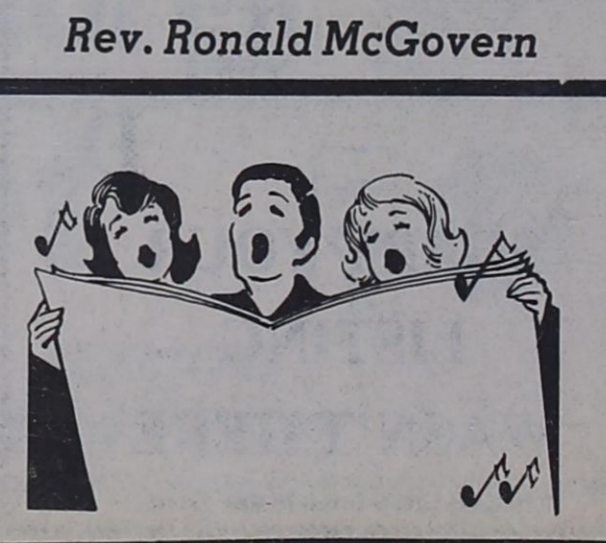
