CONGRESSMAN KENT HANCE had some interesting comments at his "Town Hall" meeting in Friona last Saturday on the situation concerning the hostages in Iran.

We wish more county residents could have heard Hance. We think he is off to a good start in representing our district in Washington.

Hance says that occasionally you hear the statement, "Why don't we just give the Shah back to them?"

"You just can't do that. If we do, we open ourselves up to blackmail from every terrorist group in the world. This would cause us severe problems from now on," Hance explained.

Hance reviewed the history of Iran, explaining to the group that the Shah and his father before him had been supported by the United States for the past 25 years, and that the Shah had been a consistent, strong supporter of the U.S. for all of that

"During the six-day war, he was the only leader in the Middle East who did not threaten to cut off our supply of oil. In recent years, he also was the only one not to 'jab' us on oil prices," Hance pointed out.

"The fact is, he was our friend for 25 years, and you just don't turn your back on your friends that quickly," he continued.

The Congressman stated that in his opinion the United States has to continue to harbor the Shah until such time as arrangements can be made for him to go to another

"Mexico threw us a real curve (when they announced that the Shah's visa would not be renewed). This was something we were definitely not expecting. Now we have to work something out which will be suitable to the Shah, the United States and the other countries," Hance said.

Possibly alluding to President Carter's ultimatum which was issued on Monday, Hance said he believed the fact that the religious holidays are coming to a close in Iran might indicate that something could be worked out within the next ten days.

President Carter Monday announced that if the hostages were not released within ten days, the U.S. would begin serious bids to overthrow the Khomeini government.

"If the people of Iran have a complaint against the Shah, they can go to the world court and file suit against him, to recover their money, if in fact he took any illegally," Hance stated.

"There is only one issue involved in the matter, and that is that 50 people are being held illegally, immorally and unethically; and it is against all types of law, domestic and international. To make a lot of talk about anything else is to divert attention from the main issue," Hance said.

The congressman said he had been proud of the way Congress had stood together, basically, during the crisis. He was critical of Senator Ted Kennedy's remarks concerning the Shah, saying they were completely out of line.

"When you have a national crisis, you have to unite behind your leader. Now, we may disagree considerably when we have closed-door sessions, but when we walk out those doors, we have to act as a team," Hance remarked.

The Congressman said that there was the possibility that one thing good had come out of the situation in Iran. "For the first time in 30 years, there is unification in America. I think we'll see a tougher foreign policy, and an increase in defense spending. This may work out to be a blessing in disguise, especially if we get the hostages out unharmed," he concluded.

Porter V. Roberts Is Named County Judge

Porter V. Roberts of Friona was appointed Monday as acting County Judge by the County Commissioners, and will replace Judge Paul Fortenberry beginning January 1.

Roberts said it also was his intention to file for the final two years of Fortenberry's term, to be filled by the 1980 election. The appointment is to run until the next general election is held.

Roberts was one of three formal applicants for the position. The other two were Elsie Jo Buchanan and Gil Patsche.

"Either one of the other applicants would have done a fine job, I am sure, but since I was fortunate enough to have been appointed, I will do my best," Roberts said Monday.

assessor-collector for the Friona Independent School District, and has been employed by Cook Oil Co. in Friona the past two and one-half



Work Set In County For 1980

Bids for the improvement of various sections of highways in Bailey, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock and Parmer Counties are expected to be received during December by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The work will consist of seal coating the roadways with an application of asphalt and rock to promote waterproofing and help maintain roadway strength.

Lubbock District Engineer George C. Wall said seal coating will be applied to portions of the following highways: Bailey County, FM 1731 and FM 1760; Floyd County, SH 207; Hale County, FM 179 and FM 400; Hockley County, US 84; Lubbock County, FM 40 and Loop 289; and Parmer County, FM 1731.

The completed seal coat projects will provide a better riding and skid resistant surface for motorists. William M. Pope of Lubbock is the department's engineer in charge of the work.

A spokesman for McFarland said that it was planned to go to at least 9500 feet on the well, and that the last 2,000 feet would be the critical stages as far as discovering oil was concerned.


It is the first wildcat oil exploration project in the area in quite some time. The drilling is being done by American Petrofina, and is styled "J.G. McFarland No. 1," featuring Baker and Taylor Drilling Co., Rig No. 9. It is located 141/2 miles north of Bovina, just across the county line in Deaf Smith County.

According to the drilling pace, the project should reach its scheduled depth within another week or ten days.

The company considers the project a "closed hole," which means that it does not put out any official information as to findings.

SCD Urges Completion Of Form

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District, along with the Soil Conservation Service, would like to encourage all farmers and ranchers in Parmer County to fill out a questionnaire they will be receiving.

From mid-November to early January, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field

All of the estimates published by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service are based on the data provided by Texas farmers and ranchers, County Extension Agents, ASCS offices, and many others in agriculture. This cooperation provides the necessary data which, in turn, returned to farmers and ranchers and others in the form of accurate estimates, which are so essential in making the wisest production and marketing decisions.

Each farmer or rancher receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin. Individual reports are confidential and used only for state and county estimates.


Rural women said untapped labor force

COLLEGE STATION -Rural women, roughly onethird of the female population, represent the greatest untapped labor force in America today, a study by a Texas A&M University sociologist shows.

While the resource is great, few women participate in jobs outside the home even though many farm incomes are operating at or below the poverty level. Why don't they partici-

"You've got to have the opportunity first," explains the researcher, Dr. Elizabeth Maret. "There are just fewer job opportunities for women in rural areas and the jobs are relatively low paying."

Ms. Maret stresses that rural women represent a tremendous reserve of potential and, given the opportunities, could become a viable part of America's supply of labor.

Carefully pour hot relish into hot jars, leaving 1/4-inch head space. Wipe jar rims clean, place lid on and screw band down evenly and firmly. Process 15 minutes in boiling water bath. Yield: about five 8 ounce jars.


Oldest known bale is on display

COLLEGE STATION - An ancient bale of Mississippi cotton, the oldest bale known to exist, is now on permanent display at Texas A&M University-

The old cotton raised by slave labor in 1859 was originally baled by hand with heavy iron bands. In 1955 it was re-pressed and enclosed in a glass case as a museum piece. Cotton experts at Texas A&M

say the old fiber is as strong as when it was pressed in the 1860s. Cotton is very durable when baled and will remain in top condition for a long time. they note.

The relic was exhibited at the St. Louis World's Fair in 1904 and in the New Orleans Cotton Exchange in 1945. Prior to the World's Fair, the tattered bale was on exhibit at Memphis in 1890 and in Chicago in 1893.





Bovina had just a one-point lead, Consolation 37-36, going into the final quarter, but some good, tough defense paid off in the final frame.






