

NEXT TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 3, will be an important election day for residents of the High Plains of Texas. There are seven proposed amendments to the Texas constitution, but of prime interest to area voters will be proposed amendment number 4, the "Water" amendment.

Although promoters of the amendment promise that the intent of the proposal is not strictly a water import plan for the High Plains, at least the passage of the amendment might provide a basis by which the legislature could work to develop a later import program.

The main benefit seems to be that those of us who live in communities where the water supply has become a problem might benefit from the proposed amendment.

The package has been sponsored by Bill Clayton, our area's

Santa Fe To Close Local Freight Depot

Santa Fe Railroad announced Wednesday that it plans to do away with its freight stations and agents at Friona, Bovina and Hereford in this district, and at seven other Panhandle area cities, in its new regional marketing concept.

Announcement of the plans were made at a noon meeting at Hereford, to which the railroad had invited all of its customers from Hereford to Bovina.

Bob Perry, Amarillo, Santa Fe's assistant general manager, told the group, "It won't be as different as the way you have been operating in the past."

Perry also promised better and expanded service under the new system, which will offer boxcar locating service through ,a computerized system. Customers ordering boxcars will do so by means of a toll-free number, which they can call seven days a week, 24 hours a day, it was noted.

The new system will be implemented "in a minimum of six months, to a year," Perry said. eight hours a day," B.K. Perry, assistant general manager, Amarillo said at the meetings. "They are often unable to provide quick response to requests about rates, car supply or car location. By having direct access to our computer, the new regional freight office will be able to respond to such questions much more quickly.

The Amarillo freight office will be open an expanded number of hours each day, giving our customers easier access by dialing a toll-free number."

"It is understandable there may be initial concern in a community when it first learns the local agent will no longer be physically located there," Perry said. "However, we believe we are going to serve them better and more efficiently under the new system. Technology available to us today makes this a logical, inevitable improvement."

Halloween Coupons Purchased

Bovina chapter of the Young Homemakers of Texas are still selling Halloween coupons for Saturday's big event...the day of Trick or Treat. Coupons can be purchased in booklets of 20 for \$1.00 (five cents each) and are valued at that amount at the various stores who are participating in this project. The stores include The Browsabout, Kirkpatrick's, Bovina Supermarket, Dairy Freeze and First State Bank.

Any remaining coupons which the givers may have left over can be redeemed at the end of the project according to Tammy Willard, YHT president. The Santa Fe official pointed out that the regional marketing system has been in operation successfully for some time in the California area, and also in Kansas for about the past year. "We went through the harvest season this year in Kansas without a single complaint," Perry stated.

Way bills for railroad customers also will be handled differently. "We plan to personally visit each of our customers in the area in the immediate future, and explain our new system, and answer questions," Perry said.

The plan contemplates absorbing the agencies at Friona, Bovina, Hereford, Pampa, Canadian, Kings Mill, Panhandle, Dumas, Etter, Stratford and Kerrick and consolidating their work at the regional office. At the same time, Santa Fe officials announced plans to maintain regional yard offices at Hereford, Pampa, Dumas and Canadian. The regional yard offices will be staffed with personnel to support and assist the regional freight office in train operations and customer services.

Santa Fe officials held meetings October 20 and 21 at Pampa, Dumas and Hereford to explain the new operation to shippers and city officials from the affected communities.

Santa Fe said that it was planned to keep all of the local agents within the system, although they will be relocated at the time their local freight office is closed.

Representatives of grain elevators and feedlots in the county attended Wednesday's announcement meeting, hosted by Santa Fe at a Hereford restaurant.

The year will be rounded out with the final Spring Concert of the year, which has not yet been set.



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Ex-Parmer Officer In Big Arrest

Former Parmer County-based DPS officer Royce Keck was one of the arresting officers late last Saturday when a routine traffic violation stop resulted in an arrest involving one of the FBI's most wanted men.

Amarillo authorities said that Marion Albert Pruett, 32, of Gastonia, N.C., was wanted in Jackson, Miss., for a robbery in which a female hostage was taken. He also was wanted for questioning regarding murders and robberies in seven other states.

Troopers Keck and Gary Davis stopped a car about a mile north of Stratford on U.S. 287, on a speeding violation. When the driver would produce no driver's license, the DPS officers radioed for a computer check, which revealed that Pruett was wanted for various offenses.

Officers found a .38 caliber revolver in the front of the vehicle. A hitchhiker was also in the front seat, and his presence may have prevented Pruett from gaining access to the weapon.

Pruett is named in a capital murder warrant issued last week after a 30year-old female clerk was found shot to death hours after she was abducted October 12 from a convenience store at Fort Smith, Arkansas.

Keck said that while the suspect was attempting to find a title to the vehicle, he observed suspicious objects in the glove compartment, including a shoulder holster, which put the officers on guard, and led to the further investigation.



Arrange apple slices evenly in pie shell. Combine cinnamon and ¹/₂ cup sugar, stir well and sprinkle mixture over apples. Combine flour and remaining sugar, stir well, cut butter into flour mixture with a pastry blender until mixture resembles coarse meal. Sprinkle over apples. Bake at 400 degrees for 40-50 minutes.

Bartlett Is Freeze Champ


Houston Bartlett was the winner of the Bovina Blade's First Freeze Contest, correctly picking the first freeze date of October 23, 1981.



It's almost time for those ghosts and goblins to come out for their annual fling for the year and as Halloween approaches there are some very simple rules I hope that you will remember and remind the kids of when they go out trick-or-treating. One important factor in any night activity is to dress in reflecting clothing. I have not priced the Halloween costumes this year but I imagine they, like all else, are expensive and many children will be

After the routine business of paying the bills and reading and approving the previous month's minutes, the Commissioners heard from Mrs. Grady King and Mrs. Reagan Looney of the Bovina Senior Citizens who were on hand to ask questions about the General Revenue Sharing Funds which the county received to be divided up among the minorities of the county.

The court expressed the opinion that the GRS Fund for this year had already been earmarked for use. Judge Porter Roberts is to check on the status of the funds after they have reported to the government as going for a specific use. Mrs. Patsy Nance from the Parmer County Tax Appraisal District presented a contract for collection of taxes, and was present to answer any questions about the operation of the Tax Appraisal District. After a discussion by Sheriff Bill Morgan, a motion was made by Commissioner Tarter, and seconded by Commissioner Anthony, with unanimous approval that Parmer and Bailey counties cooperate in the leasing of an identification kit from which a composite picture can be made. The cost of the item for each of the two counties would be \$125.00 yearly. A motion was made by Commissioner McGehee, and seconded Commissioner by and unanimously Patterson, approved to pay a boarding care bill for Dora Fields in the amount of \$270.00 which will be reimbursed to the county. Notations were made of a letter received by Roberts about the impending increase in dues to the Texas Association of Counties. After a discussion of Amendment 4 (the water amendment), a motion was made by Commissioner Patterson, and seconded by Anthony, and unanimously approved to adopt the following resolution in favor to the passage of the amendment: "Resolution: Whereas the Commissioners Court of Parmer County agrees that the assurance of an adequate and economical water supply is crucial to the continued growth and prosperity of the high plains; and whereas the State governmental action and support as proposed in the Amendment No. 4 to the Texas State Constitution would, if adopted by the voters, contribute significantly to the fulfillment of that purpose through the creation of a water trust fund from certain of the State's excess revenues; and whereas proposed amendment Number 4 would also establish a loan guarantee program which would allow up to \$500 million of the State's credit to back local water-related issues; and whereas this proposed amendment would create a continuing State fund to finance research, water conservation, water quality, sewage treatment, and flood control projects throughout Texas in cooperation with local governments and water authorities; and whereas the funding for these projects will not require an increase in taxes for the State's citizens; whereas it is an obligation that these projects be directed in a non-discriminatory manner. Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Parmer County Commissioners Court enthusiastically endorses and encourages our voters to support Amendment Number 4 to the Texas State Constitution." A motion was made by Commissioner Tarter, seconded by Anthony, and approved unanimously that the County Treasurer Benna Felts reinvest \$55,000 of right-of-way monies in a Certificate of Deposit for six months and to invest \$10,000 of Permanent Improvement Funds in a CD also for six months.

Seth Ralston, County Extension Agent for Agriculture, reported that five 4-H students from Parmer County took a total of 15 animals to the Texas State Fair at Dallas, and that 13 of the animals made the sale. He also stated that he is about half of the way completed in the purchasing of project animals for the County 4-H'ers.

Laura Jacobs, County Extension Agent for Home Economics, reported that she had held a Student-Leaders Nutrition Training Session with 13 leaders involved. Next month, she will start a Bread Workshop for different groups. The annual Christmas Bazaar will be held November 20 and 21 at the Community Center in Friona. The annual Gold Star Banquet will be held November 23 in Lubbock. A motion was made by McGehee, seconded by Patterson, and approved unanimously that the following soil conservation work be approved and ratified and that the work will be performed as soon as the machinery are in that area and are not in demand for use on county roads: Precinct 1, Jerry Loflin. At 5 p.m. the public hearing on the proposed budget for the 1982 year was held with Bernie Gowens and visitors Sheriff Bill Morgan, County Tax Assessor/Collector Hugh Moseley and his son, David Moseley, present. No one from the public showed up for the hearing. After going over the proposed budget item by item, a motion was made by Tarter, seconded by Anthony and unanimously approved to accept the budget as presented. After discussing these items of interest the County Commissioners adjourned their meeting at 6:40 p.m.

Since there will be an out-of-town ball game, the Jaycees will not open the carnival on Friday night, but it will be in full operation on Saturday, October 31.


