Since the Gulf Radio studios on the grounds of the Texas Centennial in Dallas were opened less than two months ago, 759 live talent radio shows have been produced there. These broadcasts include more than a score of programs which were carried all over the United States over the national networks.

They include one international broadcast, which necessitated the crossing of the water five times.

The publicity Texas has received as a result of these broadcasts has become national and international in its scope. Radio magazines and the radio sections of newspapers throughout the country have carried stories about these broadcasts and about the unique radio and public address system installed by the Gulf company at Dallas as its contribution to the celebration of the Centennial year.






