Furnishing Christmas Tree Typifies True Spirit Of The Season

If any of you have been in the First State Bank lately, you must have noticed the beautiful eleven foot Christmas tree in the bank's lobby.

Well, despite popular belief, it did not just grow there. It was a gift from a generous Bovina man, who cut the tree off his land in northern New Mexico

Billy Whitecotton, who has a portion of land on a place between Mora and Eagle's Nest, New Mexico, cut the tree 300 yards behind his cabin up there, and dragged it down the mountain to get it to his pickup, after which, he hauled the tree 225 miles, back to Bovina just so the bank's customers could admire its beauty.

And, who says the Christmas spirit s dead?

Not only did Whitecotton perform this act of generosity this year, but has done this same thing for the past three years.

The Bovina bank is the only business in Bovina with a Whitecotton-cut tree.

"I make sure when I cut a tree that it is not in an area all to itself. I go where the trees are in need of thinning and then select a straight tree which is full and would look good as a Christmas tree," explained Whitecotton.

Billy said the trees usually do better if they are thinned out and he feels that his cutting of one or two for a worthy cause won't do a lot of damage. The supermarket also purchases trees from around the Mora area to bring back to Bovina to sell to its customers. These are hauled back by the store's owner.

The bank's tree is a spruce and the tree was brought back to Bovina December 4 and the bank employees and their families had a tree decorating party in the bank December 13, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Approximately six families were involved in the decoration of the tree including the Randy Thomas family, the Jack Kassahns, the Steve Sherrill family, the Burry Thatcher family, Lori Richards and the Billy J. Charles family.

After the tree was decorated, the children in these families were presented with gifts and they opened these to the delight of all to see.

One ironic thing about the entire tree situation, is that Billy Whitecotton admitted that his family had an artificial tree in their home instead of a beautiful real one, like the one he brought back to the bank.


Whitecotton said to get a tree the size of the one in the bank, it would take about 12-14 years to grow in that height range.

Anita Guest Believes In Variety As The Spice Of Life

There are people in this world who will spend a lifetime and never have known, done and seen the things that Anita Guest has. For her, variety is, indeed, the spice of her life.

Born in Magnolia, Arkansas, she and her twin, Eddie, were the youngest of their family. Her oldest brother (now living in Little Rock), Charles, and second oldest brother, Kenneth, were always around to make life more interesting.

As life turned out, however, Anita would be separated from her twin time and time again, as she traveled over the country with her Air Force husband, and then Eddie was taken prisoner of war in Viet Nam for six

But, her early years were spent in the Ozarks, and she graduated from Little Rock Senior High School (which is now the Little Rock Central High, the forerunner of integration several years ago).

After high school, Anita spent the next seventeen years, off and on, raising a family, going to college and finally getting a degree in aviation and meteorology.

She married Jim Guest in November 1969.

Anita mothered four children: Steve, 24, who is a student at Lamar University, studying communications and planning to go into politics; Ginger (Virginia), 22, who is married to Bobby Bowman and is the mother of one four year old son, Alexander. They reside in Fort Collins, Colorado.

And, then there are the twins: Kenneth and Keith, 20. Both graduated from Bovina High School, and are currently living in Amarillo. Kenneth is married to the former Gerri Ramsey of Clovis and they both attend Amarillo College, and Keith is single and is attending TSTI in Amarillo.

In between the time of raising a family, going to college, and taking care of the daily matters of living, Anita Guest acquired several interesting hobbies. In fact, everything she does is interesting, mainly because of her outlook on tackling hard things.

"Anyone can do anything they want to. When they say, 'I can't,' I tell them that can't never tried."

"Don't be afraid of making a mistake, because everybody makes mistakes," she commented.

Anita has done various things from knitting and crocheting, to being a

She is also an expert woodworker and enjoys dabbling in poetry.

Actually, she is quite a good writer and has written many things which have been published in magazines.

She once did an article on "How To Marry 40331 and Survive"--a satirical piece on living with a pilot, using Jim's call letters in part of the title. This piece appeared in an aviation magazine.

Anita became a pilot in her own right in January 1971, and has her private license and could go on and get her Instrument Flight Rule license, but says she doubts if she will ever do this.

"If I can't see there (where she is going) then I shouldn't be there." quips Anita.

An IFR license is the one attained when a person can guide an aircraft by using only the instrument panel for assistance, instead of actually being able to see where they are headed. This requires more skill than it does for a person to have a private pilot's license.

Anita said of this situation, "There are old pilots and there are bold pilots...but there are not old, bold pilots."

Her husband, Jim, is a pilot with an agricultural chemical spraying firm, and he also has his specialization in aviation mechanics and is a licensed aircraft inspector, which takes up a lot of time.

Mrs. Guest is a humorous lady, who has a funny anecdote for just about every instance. She confesses, however, that she has always had a good sense of fun and has just plain never taken herself seriously.

"There was a time when Kenny had a leg broken in three places and another time when Ginger contracted polio...but there was never a time when I couldn't handle things confronting me," states Anita. "I go numb when bad things happen."

In her personal life, the worst thing to happen to Anita Guest was in 1973 when she was told she had Addison's

This is a disease of the Adrenalin gland which keeps the gland from secreting adrenalin into the body.

"When they (the doctors) first told me I had this, I didn't believe them," said Anita. "Then, I began to wonder, 'Why me?' But later, I thought, 'Why not me?' It is never as bad later as it seems at first."

The condition is currently under control with medication, but there is no cure for this disease.

But, Anita learned to adjust to her condition, just as she adjusted to others in her lifetime.

"When the kids were little, we were not living close to my parents, and were in the Air Force, and I had to handle all the care of the kids alone. There were many nights I never went to sleep and some days that I never had time to rest until they went to sleep for a nap in the afternoon, but you learn to adjust. Before I knew it the kids were in their twenties and I was wondering where the time went. I

always enjoyed the kids, though."

Anita said there were times she wondered if she had done the right things as a parent. "At times I was very unsure of myself. But the kids turned out well despite all I did," she

But, now the kids are gone, and Anita has time to herself. Some of her time is spent playing with her newest toys...woodworking equipment.

The Guests own a radial arm saw, a table saw, drill press, wood lathe, band saw, joiner-plainer and a

With this much equipment with which to work, any carpenter would be delighted to work with the Guests.

The most challenging project Anita and Jim have undertaken with the woodworking tools is a secretary desk, which adorns the Guest den. "The mitered corners were the hardest thing on the secretary," admits Anita.

Also one of her hobbies is reading. Anita says she spends 2-3 hours daily indulging herself with a good book. Her favorites are historical novels, and especially those dealing with the Tudorian era in England.

Anita said she had always loved to read and that this possibly came from the fact that her mother read to her alot when she was growing up.

But, perhaps Anita's most uncanny ability comes in her talents as a poet.

She began her writing career in the newspaper, as a columnist with the Southern Mediator's Journal, a small paper in Little Rock, and she wrote a column which dealt with the then racially-explosive issue of integration. Anita professed backing, at that time, of the Civil Rights movement, and she said her column was devoted to these issues. But, she ordinarily prefers to write poetry, which might deal with something she has seen or done during the day.

As an example of her writing ability, I asked her for a copy of one of her poems and she gave us this one which is untitled. Here it is: "This was a day I stole from time...

Time that has stolen so much from

Oh! I was brazen, I plotted my crime Snatching the day, I made off free; What's more, I squandered it, every second

On beautiful, tinselly furbelows I walked down a country lane that beckoned-

I talked to a cow and some thieving

The Calendar has a blank space now The day is gone, just taken and spent; Let time go question the crows and

I can't repay and I won't repent."

Anita said she wanted to be a writer when she was a child, and planned to write the "Great American Novel" and a poetry book.

But, she also said that there are times when she writes that she must have solitude...with no one to bother

In her early years, Anita was taught to be sensitive to others, and these beliefs have been brought out in her

"There are some things I don't want people to read, which I have written. There are times you have to write things down that you feel inside, and I don't care to share that part of me with others," Anita said, pondering the situation.

Anita also believes that everyone has to stand for something. She was raised in the Catholic Church but converted to the Baptist Church when she and Jim married.

"If you don't know what you believe in and don't stand for something, then you'll probably fall for anything," said Anita.

In a life so filled with variety, Anita recalled giving birth to the twins as her most unforgettable experience, but also added that marrying Jim was also pretty exceptional also.

"Jim is very supportive of me. No matter what I do, he is on my side and he'll understand my ideas behind something," Anita commented.

There is no question around the Guest home about who is the queen of the home, as Anita Guest is the woman who makes her home a haven of a variety of interests and ideas.

And, while we live in a world of common things, Anita Guest makes us realize it is alright to be uncommon.

Troy Martin in The Canyon News: I think that sadder than death in the afternoon has been the passing of the locally owned newspapers in the larger cities of the country.

I think newspapering was at its best and the community was best served in the 1930s and '40s when Gene Howe ran The Amarillo Globe-News and the Whittenburg family had the wellheeled and saucy little Times.

The people who ran them were residents and really cared about Amarillo and the Panhandle.

Howe also owned the Avalanche-Journal in Lubbock but he was close enough to be vitally interested in what went on on Broadway in that South Plains Town.

The people who filled key positions on both Amarillo papers were longtime residents.

Of course any business has to make a profit but at various times I worked for both Howe and the Whittenburgs and I know they majored on a good

A recent issue of Editor & Publisher revealed that more than 1,000 of the nation's daily newspapers are owned by chains.

The Murdoch chain is an international outfit that might find it easy and sometimes even convenient to view with scant concern not only vital community interests but vital national interests as well.

I can only hope that the Morris and Hearst chains are as interested in the Panhandle and South Plains as they are in fattening their bank accounts in Atlanta, Augusta, Ga., and New York City.

These two corporate giants control the three most important dailies in

Morris of Augusta owns both the Amarillo and Lubbock papers and Hearst of New York publishes The Plainview Herald.

Has W.S. Morris ever stood on a dusty turnrow and talked to a Panhandle or South Plains farmer? Have any of the Hearsts ever watched the life-giving, clear water flow in ever diminishing quantities from a Hale County irrigation well?

If they haven't, they don't know much about our area and can't be too well prepared to serve it.

It's a far cry from the days when Gene Howe traveled the length and breadth of the land in which his papers had domain gathering tidbits that made him one of the most read, best loved columnists in the state--

The Tactless Texan, better known as Old Tack, the spinner of Panhandle tales and homespun philosophy.



Re-Drawing Precinct Lines Is Underway

The Parmer County Commissioners are being faced in the near future with a proposed redistricting plan which will divide the county in disporportionate areas, including splitting the cities of Friona and Bovina.

Beginning January 1, the voters of the county may see their districts being drawn up into new precincts, and with the possibility of having a new commissioner serving them.

Although the proposal has not yet been approved by the Commissioners Court, the commissioners are already seeing problems it might well present.

"Bovina will be losing their commissioner completely if this proposal goes through," commented commissioner Jack Patterson at a recent County Commissioners meeting.


"I just can't see why the county must be so equally proportioned," was a comment from Raymond McGehee, who will take nearly twice as many miles of road over for maintenance after the redistricting is concluded.

The commissioners can reject the proposed re-alignment, but this will only give them 90 days in which to find an acceptable solution.

The redistricting is being done to comply with federal law, and the Supreme Court's ruling, calling for "one man, one vote," which requires political subdivisions to be equally divided according to population.

"They were wanting our redistricting plan approved by January 1, so that voters may be placed in the proper precincts by the tax assessor-collector. However, as many questions as we have on the proposal, I don't see a way in the world we'll have anything approved by then," said County Judge Porter Roberts.

Under the present precinct lines, Precinct 1 (Friona's precinct) contains virtually half of the county's population. Precinct 4 (Lazbuddie) contains less than 1,000. The redistricting attempt has used an * * * * * *

"average figure" of 2,700 residents per proposed precinct.

Under the proposal, precinct one (Ernest Anthony) would run from Deaf Smith County line down Highway 214 to Friona and take in the eastern portion of Friona. Then it would run from 214 south to Hub and then east to the Castro County line.

Precinct two (Jack Patterson) would run from 2290 into Bovina but he would not get any of Bovina, as his district would then run east on State Highway 86 to Hub and then north into Friona taking in the western portion of Friona only. Then it would run west on 214 to the Deaf Smith County line.

Precinct three (Archie Tarter) would run from the New Mexico state line to the Bailey County line west and south and then would take in Highway 2290 into Bovina, which would divide the city with McGehee, then it would go down 1731 to the Bailey County line south.

McGehee will see his precinct expand as precinct four would run from the Castro County line west on Highway 86 to Bovina and split Bovina, going from there south on 1731 to Bailey County, taking in Oklahoma Lane. McGehee will have about 1/3 of the entire county's roads to maintain.

The commissioner of precinct one will serve 2865 persons. Precinct two will serve 2736. Precinct three will serve 2763 and precinct four will serve 2647, if the proposal is accepted.

A small portion of Bovina and Friona is to be recounted, to make sure that the same number of persons are still living there as was projected in the redistricting proposal by the attorneys. If the count is the same, the redistricting plan will fit the population division, according to Judge Roberts.



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Rene Kuper Shares Favorite

Lebanese Recipes For Holidays

By JANET WILKE

Bet there are not too many of you who have ever even tasted stuffed grape leaves, much less baklawva.

Well, Rene Kuper is an expert on Lebanese cooking and she has agreed to share some of the most delectible recipes with us.

A native of Tyre, Lebanon, although being born in Jerusalem, Rene is the oldest of 13 children, and she is a traditional Lebanese cook who holds to the old traditions. But, even so, she admits that she adds America foods, too, like Jello, to her family get-togethers.

Lebanese cooking is a healthful way of eating, as the Lebanese do not use much grease, and they consume only lean beef and lamb as well as using a great many grains in their cooking, such as ground or cracked wheat.

Rene shared several recipes with us, and among those are Stuffed Grape Leaves, Kibbeh, Tabouleh, Little Meat Pies and Baklawva.

Tabouleh, or salad, is a mixture of several items which can be easily

TABOULEH

Take 1 cup fine ground wheat and soak this for about 20 minutes in 11/2

Then take 2 good sized bunches of fresh parsley, chopped and stemmed, and 2 bunches of fresh green onions, chopped, add 1 medium sized spring of fresh mint or dried mint, crushed.

Add 1 tablespoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper and the juice of 1/2 lemon. Slice 2 medium tomatoes, and add to this salad oil and 1/2 teaspoon allspice. Cucumbers may be added

Mix all the vegetable ingredients together. Drain wheat in collander prior to serving. then take out wheat and rub in palms

Mix in wheat, with all other 1 pound ground meat (round) ingredients, as well as oil and allspice. Can garnish with tomatoes, radishes or green pepper rings. Serves several

TURKEY AND STUFFINGS

This is a different kind of stuffing 1/2 teaspoon pepper and it might be well worth trying. 3/4 cup pre-cooked rice (but should be together. Make pastry: only half done)

Pepper and salt to taste

1/2 pound ground meat, partially cooked

Cook together meat and rice mixture with pepper and salt until partially done.

the rice will expand when cooked. Brush turkey with lemon juice and drizzle melted butter over it. Cook as usual. Make sure rice is done.

STUFFED GRAPE LEAVES

1 pound jar of grape leaves 1 pound ground lean beef 11/2 cups cooked rice

11/2 teaspoons salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper

1 tablespoon Crisco Mix all together with hands, knead

until thoroughly mixed.

Wash grape leaves very well in hot water to remove sour taste. These will come in brine water and they must be well rinsed. Cut stems off leaves and roll out flat.

Add teaspoon of the mixture in the leaves and fold the outer edges carefully first, then begin rolling the leaves from the bottom to the tip of the leaves. Place in pan and add chicken broth to cook these in. Cook this one hour at medium heat on the stove top, not in the oven. Open after awhile to check the doneness of the

LITTLE MEAT PIES

Medium onion, chopped 1 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon parsley flakes 2 tablespoons pinon nuts (optional, hard to find)

Saute all above ingredients

1/2 cup shortening 1½ cups flour

½ teaspoon salt 1/4 cup cold water

Combine and knead until smooth, make pastry as for pie as usual. Cut in circles with biscuit cutter. Place Stuff mixture into turkey lightly, as meat filling in circle by teaspoonfuls and seal the outside of the pastry by folding over and crimping the edges. Brush with milk. Bake for 15 minutes at 425 degrees, or until golden brown.

Rene said that one of the favorite beverages in Lebanon is plain, old lemonade, but not from a mix. The kind that comes from real lemon juice, water and sugar.

Another beverage favorite is the following:

ANIS CINNAMON TEA

1 cup water

1 teaspoon aniseed 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

1 tablespoon lemon 1 tablespoon honey

Few slivers of blanched almonds Combine all the above ingredients,

except for almonds, in pan and bring to a boil, lower heat and simmer five minutes. Strain and serve with almonds.

This recipe is a delightful crispy dessert which will become a tradition with your family.

BAKLAVA

Filo dough pastry leaves-1 lb. box Squeeze lemon juice over leaves 2 cups finely chopped pecans or walnuts

1 pound unsalted sweet butter

2 tablespoons sugar

11/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

11/2 teaspoons ground cloves 1 tablespoon Rosewater

Mix all together and set aside: Syrup, make and set aside

2 cups sugar 1 cup water Combine water and sugar and let it come to a boil, and add juice of 1/2 lemon the moment the boiling stops. Take the mixture off the fire at the

boiling point and add Rosewater also. Melt the butter but be careful not to scorch it. Spread a 9x13 inch pan with butter and fold in eight layers of filo dough, brushing each layer with melted butter.

Sprinkle stuffing over the eighth layer, then top that with four more layers of filo buttering each leaf, then repeat with the stuffing, and four more layers until all filo and stuffing are used. Use 4-6 sheets of filo on top layer.

Carefully before baking, cut 6 cross cuts in the layers with a sharp knife. Then make adjacent cuts at an angle so the shapes will be of little diamonds.

Bake at 300 degrees for one hour. The top will be golden brown but be careful not to let it burn.

Pour either cool syrup on hot Baklava or hot syrup on cooled Baklava, after baking. Be sure it is one or the other, as the syrup will crystalize if you pour cold on cold.

Slowly pour on the syrup as it has a tendency to boil over the pan when

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1981 Football Season Recalled By Coach

"We've turned a lot of corner this year," was the comment of head coach Paul Topliff about his 1981

"We've had some continuity, and were able to get two winning seasons back to back. This has not happened in Bovina since 1964-65."

In praising his players, Coach Topliff said he was especially proud of the attitude of his players, throughout the entire year.

"I was pleased with the attitude of all of these gentlemen, and I think they now see the difference the weight program has made in Bovina athletics. We had no major injuries this season, and I beleive that not only that, but also the success we've had, can be attributed to the weight program."

"All of these kids are truly winners. The entire staff is proud of their efforts in the season, and we are very proud of the people of Bovina. They backed us and proved to everyone that "We Are Bovina!"

When asked how he felt about losing 12 seniors, Topliff said he would miss these 12 men because they, "Would do anything I asked them to."

"Not one of these players...in fact no player on the team...was ever a disicipline problem. Not one ever missed a practice purposely and unexcused. It is the type of player and people that has made Bovina football known throughout Texas. And, a lot of the credit goes to the fans, but even more goest to the players, themselves. This shows that we have a community of winners."

Coach Topliff also pointed out that none of this progress could have been possible had it not been of the administrators and board members who were in the wings backing him. "These two groups are two very important groups in supporiting the Mustangs."

"I also want to make a point about the fact that none of the coaches are disappointed about the year. There are possibly some people in town who think we were let down because we did not win district, but we were very proud of all of our players, fans, and supporters. We were glad to see the continuity."

Faced with a rebuilding program next year, Coach Topliff predicts that Bovina will be in the role of a spoiler.

"We will have some very skilled personnel coming back, but we will have a lot of holes to fill, as well," commented the coach. He cited the offensive line as being young next year, but said, "Don't think we can't make believers out of people because we will fool a lot of folks.

The Mustangs will be looking at 15 upcoming sophomores, and 10-12 upcoming freshmen.

"Our future is bright with programs which can produce this many players coming in every year," noted Topliff.

"If our attitude can remain as it was this year, next year we will succeed.'

Looking back over the past year, Topliff reviewed some key points about the Mustangs.

"Our kids never gave up this year. The acquistion of this type of attitude is important. We've had possibly the finest offense in the South Plains. Defense will be a priority for next year and will get a large share of my attention."

In mentioning players who did exceptionally well, several players' names came up.

played "Charlie Trimble consistently for us, as did Tad Mayfield, who is an outstanding leader. Marty McCowan played very well, and the entire defensive secondary did just a super job...Joe Pat Wright, Jon Riddle, Ricky Shepherd, and Richard Shepherd."

But there are bright stars shining in the Mustang stall next year with returnees such as Mark Clayton, "He has all of the physical attributes to be a good lineman"; Jose Gomez, "May move him to fullback or offensive guars, he has a lot of potential"; Richard Shepherd, "One of the best running backs I have ever coached"; and Martin Contreras, "Tremendous potential, needs to acquire leadership abilities."

These four lettermen will aid in the Mustangs role as a team who has something to prove and can do it.

"Our defense may be stronger than I suspect. With a JV team who was district co-champs, and a junior high team that yielded a 6-2 season, we will have kids who come from a winning tradition, instead of having to make a winning tradition. There is a big difference there."

But the one player who Topliff will remember possibly best is senior

Ricky Shepherd. "In the 13 years I have been a head

coach, I would have to say that Ricky is one of the finest receivers I have ever coached, whether it was in high school or at the college level."

And, about Dale Gilbreath, "Dale is one of the finest quarterbacks I have ever had the pleasure of coaching. If he can continue to do as well next year as he did this year, he will see that all the effort was worth it. Sometimes it takes a little longer for others to see reality, but when everyone realises how good he really is, then he will get his just reward. He is a fine young man, as well as a superb athlete."

In conclusion, Topliff says 1980 wasn't a FLUKE YEAR. "Last year, Bovina decided we would win, and we did. It was not a fluke. It was a made of sheer determination, fortitude and desire. In the 13 years I have been a head coach, I have only had one back to back winning season, and I never won a district championship until the fourth year I had been at a place."

Whether the Mustangs win the district or not, they do have one thing that no one can take away from them...class.

And no amount of district championships can ever be more important.

Coach Topliff and his staff have compiled a statistical record of the Bovina Mustangs for the past football season, and the coaches wanted the Blade to share these records with it's readers.

These figures are broken down into several categories, and by individual efforts as well.

The first player whose record we will examine is Quarterback Dale Gilbreath.

Still only a junior, Gilbreath is expected to come back next year and

be a tough competitor. Game per game, Gilbreath had two carries in the Boys Ranch game for six yards, and he completed 21 passes of 41 attempts with one interception, at 16.8 yards per pass. He had six TD's and a two point conversion. He averaged 56.0 yards on one punt in

the game. In the Sudan game, Gilbreath had four carries for 36 yards and completed 22 passes of 40 attempts, for 270 yards, 55 percent. He threw six TD's and averaged 16.8 yards per pass. His three punts averaged 27.0 yards per punt. He had one interception, and one two point

conversion. Against Happy, Gilbreath rushed for 22 yards on three carries, and completed 12 passes of 21 attempted for 190 yards. He had one interception and averaged 15.8 yards per pass. In punting, he had one for 21.0 yards. He threw three TD's and

one two point conversion. Plains Cowboys threw a wrench in the Mustangs machinery as the Mustangs lost for the first time during the year to Plains.

Gilbreath rushed five times in the game for 33 yards, and he completed 17 passes of 45 attempted for 234 yards and four interceptions for an average of 37.8 percent. He threw three TD's and one two point conversion. He averaged 13.8 yards passing and booted four punts, for an average of 31.0 yards per punt.

In the Lazbuddie game, Gilbreath did no rushing but completed 11 of 22 passes with none intercepted for 204 yards, 50 percent, and he threw five TD's and one two point conversion and averaged 18.5 yards per pass.

Beginning district play, the Mustangs were in good stead with one loss, as they went into the Springlake-Earth game.

Gilbreath rushed five times for no yards, but he had 15 completed passes of 37 attempts with one interception, for 235 yards and two TD's and one two pointer, for an average of 15.7 yards per pass.

He also punted twice for an average of 35 yards.

Against Kress, the Mustangs had their hands full, and lost for the first time in district play.

Gilbreath carried the ball four times for 15 yards and passed 13 completions of 32 attempts with four interceptions, for 235 yards. He threw two TD's for 18.1 yards per

Gilbreath punted three times for 33.0 yards per punt.

Against Vega, the Mustangs were still down from their loss to Kress, and let the Vega bunch slip up and beat them.

Dale Gilbreath rused eight times for 11 yards and one TD. He completed 11 passes of 23 with two interceptions for 174 yards for 47.8 percent. He threw two TD's at 15.8 yards per pass. He had four punts averaging 45.0 yards.

Against Hart, the Bovina team found the winning track, and

Gilbreath had six rushes for 12 yards and completed 11 of 18 pass attempts for 211 yards, 61.1 percent. He threw four TD's for 19.2 yards per pass. Punted once for 37 yards.

In the final game of the season, Farwell was happy to settle for a tied

Gilbreath carried the ball twice for 22 yards and passed 28 times with 13 completions and four interceptions for 169 yards for 46.4 percent.

He threw one TD and passed at 13.0 yards per pass. Two punts in this game averaged 43.5 yards.

In career totals, Gilbreath completed 259 passes of 579 attempts for 4,042 yards, with 47 interceptions for 44.6 percent. He threw 50 TD's, 10 point conversions, with 15.61 yards per pass.

In punting, Gilbreath had 36 for 34.7 yards and in rushing he had 106 carries for 198 yards and rushed for three TD's.

Senior Ricky Shepherd was named Player of the Year in the district, and he added these honors to an already impressive list.

In his split end position, Ricky had 11 receptions against Boys Ranch for 190 yards, which equaled 17.3 yards per carry and three TD's.

Against Sudan, Shepherd made 10 catches for 174 yards for 17.4 yards per carry and one TD.

In the Happy game, Ricky made five catches for 85 yards for 16.4 yards per carry, with three TD's and one two point conversion.

Against Plains, he had seven receptions for 139 yards at 19.9 yards per carry, and against Lazbuddie, Shepherd made seven catches for 140 yards at 20 yards per carry and three TD's, and one TD rushing.

In the district contests, in the Springlake-Earth game, Shepherd had nine receptions for 182 yards at 20.2 yards per carry and two TD's.

Against Kress Ricky made six catches for 156 yards and averaged 26.0 yards per carry with one TD.

In the Vega game Shepherd had 10 receptions for 157 yards at 15.7 yards per carry with two TD's.

Ricky had five receptions against Hart for 71 yards, 14.2 yards per carry and one TD, and ended the year by catching three passes against Farwell for 61 yards, averaging 20.3 vards per carry.

In his career Ricky Shepherd made 139 receptions for 2,431 yards with 27 TD's, three two point conversions. He averaged 17.50 yards per catch and scored 29 total TD's in passing and rushing.

He was named the fourth all time receiver, fifth highest season total in recpetions, 73, fifth highest individual career receiving yardages with 2,431. In 1981 Ricky was named the third best player in yardage gained, and had caught at least one TD pass in 14 games.

In rushing, he had two carries for seven yards at 3.5 yards per carry and rushed for two TD's.

Senior Edward (Bull) Chisom, when coupled with the talents of Ricky Shepherd was a hard man to

Against Boys Ranch, he had three receptions for 69 yards at 23 yards per catch, for one TD. In the Sudan game, Bull caught five passes for 55 yards at 11 yards per catch for one TD and one two point conversion.

Bull made two receptions for Bovina in the Happy game with an average of 43 yards at 21.5 yards per catch. Against Lazbuddie, Chisom made one reception for four yards and one TD, and against Plains, he had two receptions for 28 yards at 14 yards per catch, and one TD.

In the Springlake-Earth game, Chisom had three receptions for 35 yards at 11.7 yards each.

Chisom had no catches against either Kress or Vega, but came back against Hart and made one reception for five yards and one TD, and against Farwell for one reception for six yards.

In the totals for the year, Edward Chisom made 18 receptions for 245 yards at 13.6 yards per pass and made five TD's and one two point

Jon Riddle served the Mustangs as back-up to Dale Gilbreath at quarterback, as well as playing cornerback.

Against Happy, Riddle had one completion for eight yards. In the Lazbuddie game he completed one pass of three attempts for three yards for 33 percent and one TD on a three yard pass.

In totals, Riddle completed two of four attempts with no interceptions for 11 yards, 67.7 percent and for one Joe Balck added much to the

flanker.

Black made three receptions for 61 yards at 20.3 yards per catch with one

When the Mustangs met Sudan, Black had five receptions for 91 yards at 18.2 yards per catch and four TD's.

Against Happy, Black had four receptions for 43 yards at 14.3 yards per catch, and Plains had their hands full with Black, as he made four receptions for 57 yards, at 14.3 yards per catch, and one TD; and against Lazbuddie he had four receptions with one TD, for an average of 62 yards, 15.5 yards per catch.

Black made four receptions against Springlake-Earth for 33 yards at 8.3 yards per catch and against Kress he made five receptions for 65 yards, at 13 yards per catch and one TD.

In the Vega game, Black made one reception for 17 yards, while in the Hart game he had three receptions for 53 yards at 17.7 yards per catch and one TD. In the Farwell game he had seven receptions for 81 yards at 11.16 yards per catch and two TD's.

Totals showed that Joe had 39 receptions on the year for 563 yards at 14.5 yards per catch with 11 TD's.

Running back Richard Shepherd

had a banner year, making all district as a sophomore and becoming one of Bovina's stalwart runners. In the Boys Ranch game Shepherd

had three receptions for 20 yards, 6.7 per catch, and one TD and one extra point conversion. Against Sudan Richard caught

three passes for 50 yards, 16.6 yards each, and in the Happy game, Richard had two receptions for 30 yards, 15.0 yards each. Against Plains, Shepherd had four

receptions for 35 yards at 8.75 yards each and one TD and one conversion, while against Lazbuddie, Richard caught the ball once for four yards and one TD.

In the first three games in district play Richard did not have any receptions, but came back in the Hart game to catch the ball twice for 68 yards, at 34 yards per catch, which is exceptional, and one TD, and ended his year with the Farwell game, in which he caught the football twice for 19 yards at 9.5 yards each and threw

In Richard's sophomore year, he had 17 catches for 226 yards at 13.3 yards each and caught four TD's and threw for one TD and earned one two pointer. Shepherd also did well in the rushing department, having carried the ball 13 times against Boys Ranch for 118 yards, 9.07 each, and one TD; and then carrying the ball 13 times against Sudan for 64 yards at 4.92

each carry and two TD's. In the Happy game, Shepherd had an unbelievable 21 carries for 310 yards at 14.76 yards per carry, and two TD's, and against Plains he made 15 carries for 93 yards 6.2 yards each carry, and carried the ball 11 times against Lazbuddie for 119 yards at 10.8 yards each time.

Shepherd carried the ball seven times against Springlake-Earth for 119 yards for 17 yards per carry and two TD's, and carried the ball eight times against Kress for 16 yards, 2 yards per carry.

Against Vega, Richard came back and carried the ball 24 times for 97 yards at 4.04 yards each and made 16 carries in the Hart game for 79 yards, 4.94 yards each, and one TD.

In the Farwell game, Richard had 22 carries for 169 yards at 7.64 yards per carry and one TD, while throwing for another.

Totally, Richard had 150 carries on the year, for 1,193 yards at 7.95 yards per carry, with nine TD's and threw for one TD.

Joe Pat Wright, a running back, made one reception against the Roughriders in the first game for 12 yards, then went on to make two receptions against a tough Kress defense for 12 yards total, 6 yards each, and totaled out for the year catching the ball three times for 24 yards at eight yards per catch.

Wright carried the ball one time against Boys Ranch for four yards, and carried the ball three times in the Sudan game, for 56 yards, 18.7 each, while carrying the ball once against Plains for one yard and one TD, and seven times against Lazbuddie for 43 yards at 6.1 yards per carry.

Against Springlake-Earth, Wright made 11 carries for 55 yards at 5 yards per carry, and against Kress, he had one carry for eight yards. In the Vega game he carried the ball two

times for two yards and carried the ball once against Hart for a yard.

Totals this year reflect that Mayfield had 89 carries for 421 yards, at 4.7 yards per carry and two TD's.





Choose Gifts With Eye Safety In Mind

When shopping for children's holiday gifts, beware of those that pose threats to eyes, cautions the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness.

More than 5,000 eye injuries were linked to toys last year, and nearly two-thirds of these accidents were suffered by children under the age of fifteen. BB guns, darts and bows and arrows--"toy weapons"--were responsible for hundreds more injuries.

"Ninety per cent of all eye injuries are preventable," notes Elvin Schofield, President of the Texas

Society. "Safety-conscious adults can protect children from eye damage--or even the loss of an eye--by picking toys and games carefully and by teaching youngsters how to respect toy hazards and their own safety.

"Holiday gifts hopefully will bring children many hours of enjoyment without jeopardizing their wellbeing," Mr. Schofield added. Playthings with projectiles have been proven dangerous to eyes and should be avoided. A U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission survey of hospital emergency rooms indicates that children under 15 were the victims of eye injuries predominantly from slingshots or sling-propelled toys, toy guns and other toy weapons with projectiles,

and gas, air or spring-operated guns.

Eye damage also can result from toys and games with less apparent hazards. Building sets, skateboards and battery-operated toys were a few of those responsibile for eye injuries to children last year, primarily children under 15. In some cases, the child may be too young to handle a toy. Often, too, play gets rough, and youngsters accidentally hurt themselves or playmates.

Most of these eye injuries happen, reports the Society, when children are not supervised. It's very important that parents show their children how to use their gifts properly. Does the child understand how to use the toy? Does he or she take a "harmless" toy and make it dangerous, for example, by pulling rubber tips off darts? Do older children keep their more complicated toys out of reach of younger brothers and sisters? When dangers are explained, does the child acknowledge and avoid them?

Six Weeks Required To Receive Number

Those who intend to work for the first time in the near future should be advised to apply right away for a social security number, as it usually takes about six weeks to get your social security card after your application and necessary documents are received.

The social security law requires that you furnish evidence of age, identity, and U.S. citizenship or lawful admission status when you apply for a social security number. If you are 18 or older, you must apply in person. Documents are subject to verification with the agency that issued them. Please do not submit uncertified photocopies of your documents. We must see either the original documents or a copy certified by the agency which issued it. We will

return any documents you send in. A variety of documents can be submitted as evidence of your age, identity, and citizenship. Examples are: Public or hospital record of birth or religious record of birth or baptism established before age five. If these records cannot be obtained one or more of the following will establish date of birth, or age and your place of birth: drivers license, voter's registration, school record, marriage record, divorce decree, draft card or military ID, U.S. passport, baby's hospital wrist band, newspaper birth announcement, church membership or confirmation record, clinic, doctor or hospital record, insurance policy or other document providing identifying data such as a physical description, photograph or signature.

You'll have this number for the rest of your life, so keep it in a safe place. Apply now, the sooner the better!



Art Classes Make Rounded Education

Kena Arthur's high school art classes have been one of the school's most popular courses over the past year and she credits this to the fact that almost everyone has some artistic ability...it just takes more coaxing in some than it does for others.

Kena took over the job for the first time last year and so far her art classes have thrived.

Before Miss Arthur came, Carolyn Beauchamp was in charge of junior high art classes, but there were no art courses offered in high school.

Miss Arthur teaches four art classes per day and one seventh-eighth grade girls physical education class.

Kena received her degree in physical education and art from West Texas State University, after her graduation from Ralls High School.

She said in high school she never

show them just how simple art really is. "It is really not as difficult as it looks," she commented.

There are approximately twenty junior high students in her junior high classes and there are about eighteen high school students who are taking the course.

The classes consist of various art forms, including sketching, charcoals, various crafts, wool paintings (which are unique, to say the least), pastels, soap carvings, water color and acrylics.

One of the toughest things to teach young artists is learning to shadow the artwork correctly.

The Bovina schools supply all the art tools and supplies necessary for the work which will be undertaken in the classes and no student must provide these tools.

If a person was to start taking art lessons, what would the basic tools be? According to Miss Arthur, one would just need three things: pencils, erasers and a stump. A stump is a tool which helps in the shading process.

Kena advised us that all artists

should work in pencil drawings first before going into something more detailed like acrylics or oils.

"At least when you goof up with a pencil, you can just erase the mistake. When you're working with oils or some other art type, the mistakes get harder to erase.'

Miss Arthur has several new projects lined up for the new year which will include crafts, hat bands made of feathers and a possible field trip to WTSU to see some of the art exhibits there for the high school

In junior high, new art experiences will include possibly learning to work with water colors, and some crayon etching which leads up to print

Prior to Christmas, the classes in high school participated in doing wool painting, where wool was finely cut and applied to a felt background which already had some type of figure drawn on it. These paintings are very unique and the high school students did an exceptional job on their paintings.

In junior high school, the big event prior to Christmas was the bulletin board decoration contests, as the winners were exempted from final

When asked if she felt a person needed to be "artistically inclined" to be a good artist, Kena Arthur thought about this question, and then replied, "No, I don't think anyone has to be artistically inclined in order to be a

good artist. In fact, I feel that all of us have some artistic ability. It's just harder for some to find out they have it than it is for others." Miss Arthur also said she thought that a desire to work with art was one of the most important prerequisites for being an artist. "You acquire the ability as you improve," she said.



Forest Service Gives Advice On Christmas Trees

With Thanksgiving over, there may be many of you who will soon want to think about purchasing a Christmas

With tree prices the way they are, and with a limited selection at times, the U.S. Forest Service passed along these tips on what to look for when buying a tree.

Most often, Christmas trees will be of the evergreen variety and there are several species of evergreen from which to choose.

The most common choices for trees are Balsam Fir, Douglas Fir, Eastern Red Cedar, Scotch Pine and White

The Balsam Fir has short, flat dark green needles, usually rounded at the tips. The needles are arranged feather-like on grayish, finely haired twigs. Each tiny twig grows at right angles to each branch, resembling crosses, which might be why this is such a popular tree at Christmas.

The rounded buds are coated with a waxy pitch.

When cones are present, they are attached upright to the branch and are 2-3 inches in length and are purple and often resinous.

The bark of the Balsam Fir is gray or brown, thin, and quite smooth, often with many resin blisters.

A popular tree is the Douglas Fir, which has needles that are attached around the twig instead of in the feather-like arrangement of the Balsam Fir.

Douglas Fir needles are shortstalked, soft and are dark yellowgreen or blue-green.

The Douglas Fir has reddish brown buds that narrow to tips that are sharp pointed.

The cones are easily identified for

they hang downward with long threetoothed leaf-like bracts sticking out beyond the tips of the thin, rounded cone scales. The cones are light brown in color and are from 2-4

The tree bark is reddish brown. The Eastern Red Cedar is distinguishable by its extremely dark

green (blue-green) scale like leaves. However the leading shoots bear needle-like leaves almost half an inch long and the leafy twigs are rounded or four angled and slender.

Like its western cousin, the Juniper, the Red Cedar bears a berrylike fruit. The small round berries are dark blue and the bark of the tree is reddish brown and fibrous.

Scotch Pines are a favorite, and these trees have longer needles which grow in clusters of two and are dark green color. Their length ranges from 11/2 to 21/2 inches.

Scotch Pines can be made to look very bushy, which is a desirable characteristic of Christmas trees. This variety seems to hold its needles longer than most others.

Cones come between two and five inches long and the top of the scales are flat with a slender prickle on

The bark should be scaly and bright orange-red, but may be darker in older trees.

White Pines are the silvery bluegreen trees so often seen at Christmas and their needles are soft and pliable to touch.

The pine needles of the Eastern White Pine are 21/2 to five inches in length and are grouped in clusters of five or so. The needles of the Western White Pine are shorter and stouter.

The Eastern White Pine had long

stalked yellow-brown cones with thin round scales. The cones of the Western variety are very similar but

The thin bark of the tree is grayish to dark green.

When selecting a tree, most people will want a tree which gently tapers and is healthy and well-trimmed.

Trees have to meet US grading requirements and those are as follows: fresh-with pliable needles that are firmly attached to the branches; clean-at least moderately free of moss, lichen, vines and other foreign matter; healthy-fresh, natural appearance for that particular species: well-trimmed-free of all barren branches below the first whorl and smoothly cut at the butt.

In addition to those requirements the US Forest Service classifies each tree in one of the following classes: US Premium-not less than medium density, normal taper and all four faces free from any type of damage; US No. 1 or US Choice-not less than medium density, normal taper and three damage-free sides; US No. 2 or Standard: light or better density, candlestick, normal or flaring taper and at least two sides damage-free.

Few rules apply when trying to select a tree, but here are a few tips from the US Forest Service:

Determine where in your home you will display your tree. With this in mind, you will be able to select the proper height, and decide whether all faces (sides) of the tree must be

You should select a tree that is right height for the space you have chosen. Cutting a large portion off the end will alter the taper.

Freshness is an important key when choosing a tree. The needles should be resilient, but not brittle. Run your fingers down each branch, the needles should adhere to each twig.

Shake or bounce the tree on the ground lightly to see that the needles are firmly attached. If only a few drop off, the tree is fresh and with proper care it should retain its freshness throughout the holidays.

The limbs should be strong enough to hold ornaments and strings of electrical lights and the tree should have a strong fragrance and green color for the species.

Check the tree for cleanness and freshness, health and trimming, as it should display the best quality for that particular species.

Once a tree is purchased a few reminders apply when trying to care for it throughout the holidays.

If a tree is bought several days before it will be set up, cut the butt of the tree about one inch above the original cut to open the pores of the tree. Place the butt of the tree in a container of water and let it absorb

Saw off the tree before mounting it in the house. This will aid in water absorption.


Make sure there is water in the

container which feed the butt of the tree and refill the container daily. Also sprinkling water on the branches before you decorate the tree will retain freshness. Be sure the base of the tree is well supported and that the tree is placed well away from fireplaces, electric heaters and any other heat sources.

Open flames, such as lighted

candles, should never be used on or near a tree. In addition, a tree should never be left with the lights on, as this, too is a fire hazard.

Another tip that is timely to remember is that a tree, after a while inside, tends to become more combustible. Check electric cords for frayed lines or worn spots which could easily ignite the tree.



Conservation Program Out For Public Review

The Secretary of Agriculture has invited the public to comment on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's proposed soil and water conservation program. The Secretary's preferred program features expanded roles for local and state governments and the targeting of USDA dollars and personnel to conserving critical resource problem areas.

People who are interested in the program, or potentially affected by it, are urged to comment. Responses will be accepted through January 15, 1982, and can be mailed to State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service (SCS), P.O. Box 648, Temple, Texas 76503.

Duval Burton, acting district conservationist for SCS at Friona said the Secretary's proposed program would concentrate more USDA assistance in areas where soil erosion and other problems threaten to reduce agricultural productive capacity and to increase agriculture production costs. Basic USDA technical and financial assistance would continue in all areas.

The program would use local and state conservation coordinating boards to identify critical problem areas, set priorities, and develop program for local and state action to solve the problems. These boards would be based on existing organizations--conservation district boards, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committees, extension advisory boards and other

Based on the recommendation from these local and state boards and national priorities, more USDA assistance would be aimed at reducing the most serious soil erosion and related problems.

Burton said the program is the Secreary's proposed response to the

Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA). It is contained in an RCA Program report and a summary leaflet with response form that can be reviewed at the local SCS or Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation


