TELEPHONE MEN STILL WORKING TO REPAIR ICE-**WRECKED LINES**

Telephone men, still at work repairing damage from the \$1,500,000 sleet which swept from the Iowa border to the Gulf in January, can remember no worse ice storm. Yet they found, as they set about

replacing 26,000 poles and 18,000 miles of wire leveled by the blast, that this year's disaster actually did less damage than the smaller 1924 ice storm. The reasons: First-Most telephone poles to-
