THE REAL ISSUE.

Editor, The Mail: For some time we have been followmembers to the supreme court and Saturday at the county agent's office. have become fully convinced that logic and common sense reasoning have one hand of the effect it will have on conservation program. certain interests if it is accomplished will be damned if we don't."

Now let's look at the matter as it really is and see exactly what the bone in setting forth their real reasons to approval by the state group. for opposing it as the president does in his reasons for wanting it, the question would soon be settled.

Just what then is the real issue before the people?

No one informed on political subjects believes that this addition to the court would have the direful effects of rendering that body impotent in the future, as is charged. Such arguments are made for the purpose of confusing and confounding the real issue and for the further purpose of weakening the faith in the adminis-

ration of the less informed. The real issue is the New Deal proram. The opposition fear that Rooseelt will succeed in getting laws that, in accord with his platform pledges, will force a more equitable distribution of the wealth of the nation. They know, however, that if the supreme court can be kept intact, he can't accomplish his purpose.

In the dark days of 1932, when the whole country was in a state of bankruptcy and we were all, rich and poor, rying aloud for a Moses to lead us out of the wilderness, had it then been found necessary to change the complexion of the court in order to give as relief, who among us would have raised his voice? But now that the wolf has been driven from our doors, many find themselves affected by the hypnotic influence of the sirens of big business, aided and abetted by the die-hard republicans, until they are made to believe the gods would utterly destroy our democratic government and place us under a Hitler, if we should be guilty of thus desecrating the sanctity of the supreme court.

Yea! They would have you believe that if such an awful catastrophe should happen that six additional sember-robed, solemn-faced figures should so defile the temple of justice by intruding into its most holy of holies, the veil would be rent and the sun would hide his face in shame, and out from the Stygian darkness would appear some hideous monster clothed with omnipotent authority, proclaiming with a voice of thunder, "I am monarch of all I survey."

We are not attempting to belittle the dignity of the court nor minimize its importance by the above parody. We are only attempting to illustrate the "hokum" that is being handed out, by inference at least, by those who use it for want of better argument against the New Deal program.

We recognize the court as an indispensable branch of our government, but just one branch. It is entitled to the same consideration and respect as the other branches of our government -no more, no less.

We assume the prerogative to criticize, cuss and condemn members of both the other branches of government A man can't think the way he should, and relegate them to oblivion and elect new members to fill their places. That, however, is only the game of politics. No sacrilege there. But "mum" is the word with reference to the court and death only has the right to change its numbers, we are told.

But why all this subterfuge? Why not confess that the New Deal program for a more equitable distribution of wealth is the real bone of conten-

On that issue the people spoke in no uncertain voice last November. Our democracy is supposed to be a government of the people, for the people and by the people.
