**FARM LEADERS** hoping for at least the one-year emergency farm bill were disappointed this week when the House of Representatives voted down the proposal by a large majority.

The bill did not have the backing it had received in the senate, where Sen. Robert Dole of Missouri managed to get it passed.

Of course, the president having threatened to veto the farm legislation did not help its prospects in the House, since congress never has passed a farm bill over a presidential veto.

It would appear that the Carter Administration is determined to stick by its "cheap food" policy, which in the end may destroy the very base of the nation's food production system.

It will be difficult to get any type of legislation passed that will help the farmers' income situation for the 1978 crop year.

Mrs. Nita Dobbs and her son, Vernon, are among those stricken with botulism poisoning in Clovis over the past weekend.

According to Mrs. Dobbs' father, Vernon Estes of Bovina, his daughter and grandson ate at the Colonial Park Country Club Restaurant on Wednesday evening and were taken ill last Friday. Treated first at Clovis Memorial Hospital, they were flown to Albuquerque on Saturday.

"Our daughter's condition wasn't critical," Estes said, "but our grandson was in critical condition, with quite a bit of paralysis. He is improving, but is still in intensive care. Monday evening was the first time he could swallow since Friday."

Estes had just received word from Albuquerque when he was contacted by The Blade.

Services for Frank Hastings, 96, a 76-year resident of Bovina, were held Monday in the First United Methodist Church with the Rev. James Putnam, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Bovina Cemetery under the direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home of Friona.

Hastings, a native of Wise County, died Saturday in St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo.

He was a retired farmer and rancher and a 61-year member of First United Methodist Church of Bovina. He also was a member of the Farwell Masonic Lodge No. 977, and received his 50-year pin in October 1961, and was a member of the Khiva Shrine Temple at Amarillo.

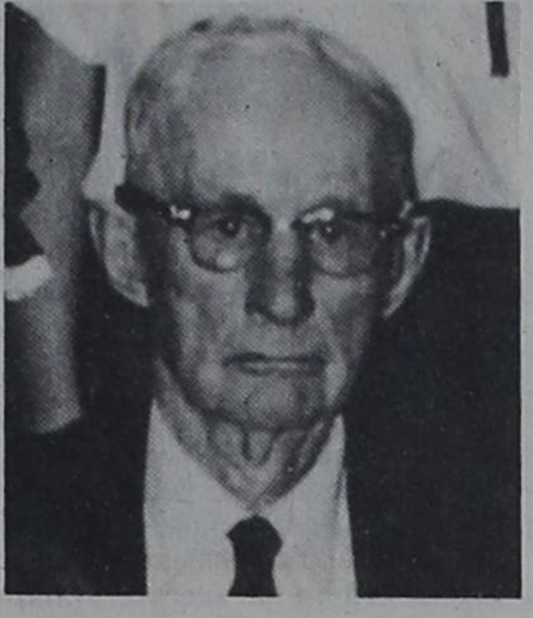
He married Leora Tidenburg May 20, 1915 in Amarillo.

Survivors include his wife Leora; two daughters, Anna Hastings of Plainview and Mrs. Bob Wilson of Bovina; four grandchildren and three great-grandsons.

Palbearers were Durward Bell, Bedford Caldwell, J.T. Hammonds, John Dixon, J.T. Sherrill Jr. and Gene Ezell.

Hastings came to Bovina in 1902, when the town consisted of only a couple of stores, a railroad and acres of cattle pens. This was four years after the Santa Fe Railroad pushed through, and made the young settlement a shipping point for the historic XIT Ranch.

When Parmer County's government was organized, Hastings

became the county's first deputy sheriff, although he had been acting as the community's unofficial lawman prior to that time.

## Fillies Take Aim On Regional Title

Bovina High School's Fillies, unbeaten in all three relay events through seven meets this spring, put their stellar record squarely on the line Friday and Saturday at Odessa, in the Region 1-A track and field meet.

The Fillies qualified virtually an entire team for the regional meet, and will be entered in ten of the 14 track and field events.

Field event competition will begin at 2:30 p.m. Friday at W.T. Barrett Stadium at Odessa College. Finals for the discus, high jump and long jump will be held beginning at 2:30, followed by the triple jump and shot put at 4 p.m.

Running preliminaries begin at 4 p.m. Friday, with the finals set for Saturday at 1 p.m. Also competing will be the girls regional class AAA teams.

"It looks like our big competition will come from Iraan (the District 6-A champion). They have the best qualifying times in the mile relay, 880-yard relay, 440-yard dash and 800-yard dash. And they have a high jumper who has cleared 5-6," said Fillies coach Joel Nelson as he

readied his girls for their toughest assignment of the 1978 season.

In fact, it appeared on paper that the Fillies and the Iraan team might be the ones to fight it out for the team title, since Bovina qualified nine individuals in ten events for the regional meet, while Iraan qualified for seven events. In all, Bovina qualified for 13 entries at regional, including two entries in each of three field events.

The Iraan team will pose a big threat to Bovina keeping its relay teams unbeaten for the season. They have by far the best qualifying time for the mile relay, at 4:05, compared to Bovina's 4:14.

However, Coach Nelson feels that the Fillies really haven't been pushed in recent weeks, to get their time in the event down.

In the 880-yard relay, the Iraan team has turned in a 1:46.9 effort for the season, to Bovina's 1:47.5, indicating a possible close finish in this event.

Bovina's 440-yard relay team has the best qualifying times for the eight districts making up the regional meet. The Fillies have

toured the lap in 50.3. Hamlin's 51.2 is the closest to this mark of the other district winners.

Pat Shepherd, double winner for the Fillies in the shot put and discus at the district meet, has the best qualifying mark in the discus event at 123-8. Her best shot put mark of 40-7 is about a foot behind the District 1-A winner, Linda Shoulders of Sunray.

Sandi Sides' triple jump mark in the district meet, 35-1, is the second best among the class A district winners. However, Nelson says he thinks Miss Sides can top the 36-foot mark. "She hasn't hit her peak yet," the Fillies' coach says.

Denise Read's high jump mark of 5-5, established in the district meet, is just an inch below the best qualifying height at the regional meet.

Mile run times compiled by class A district winners show that Bovina's Kathy Williams has the third best time, about five seconds off the second best time of 5:56. Nelson also feels that this young member of the team, only a

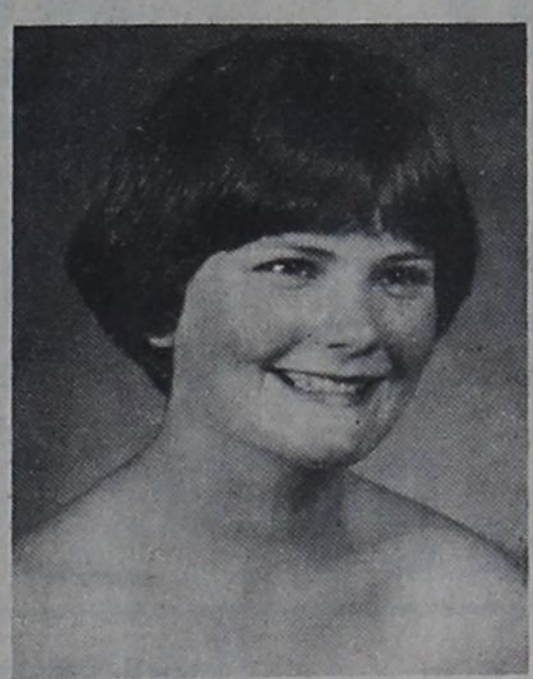
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## Absentee Vote Starts

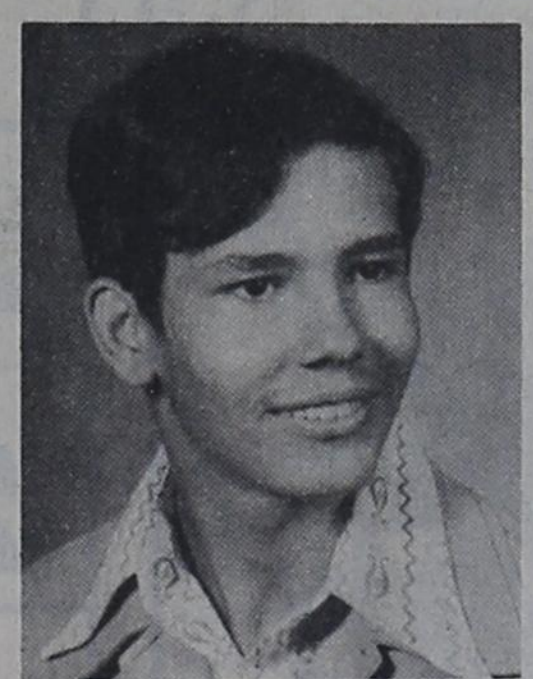
Absentee voting for the May 6 Democratic and Republican primaries began this week at the county clerk's office in Farwell.

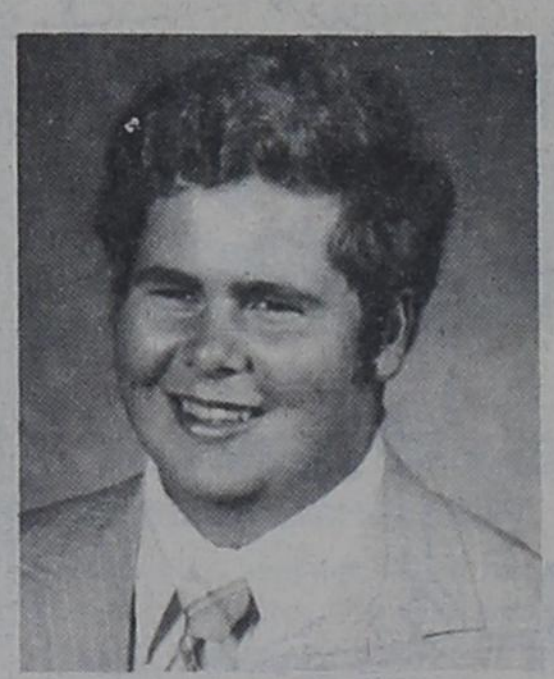

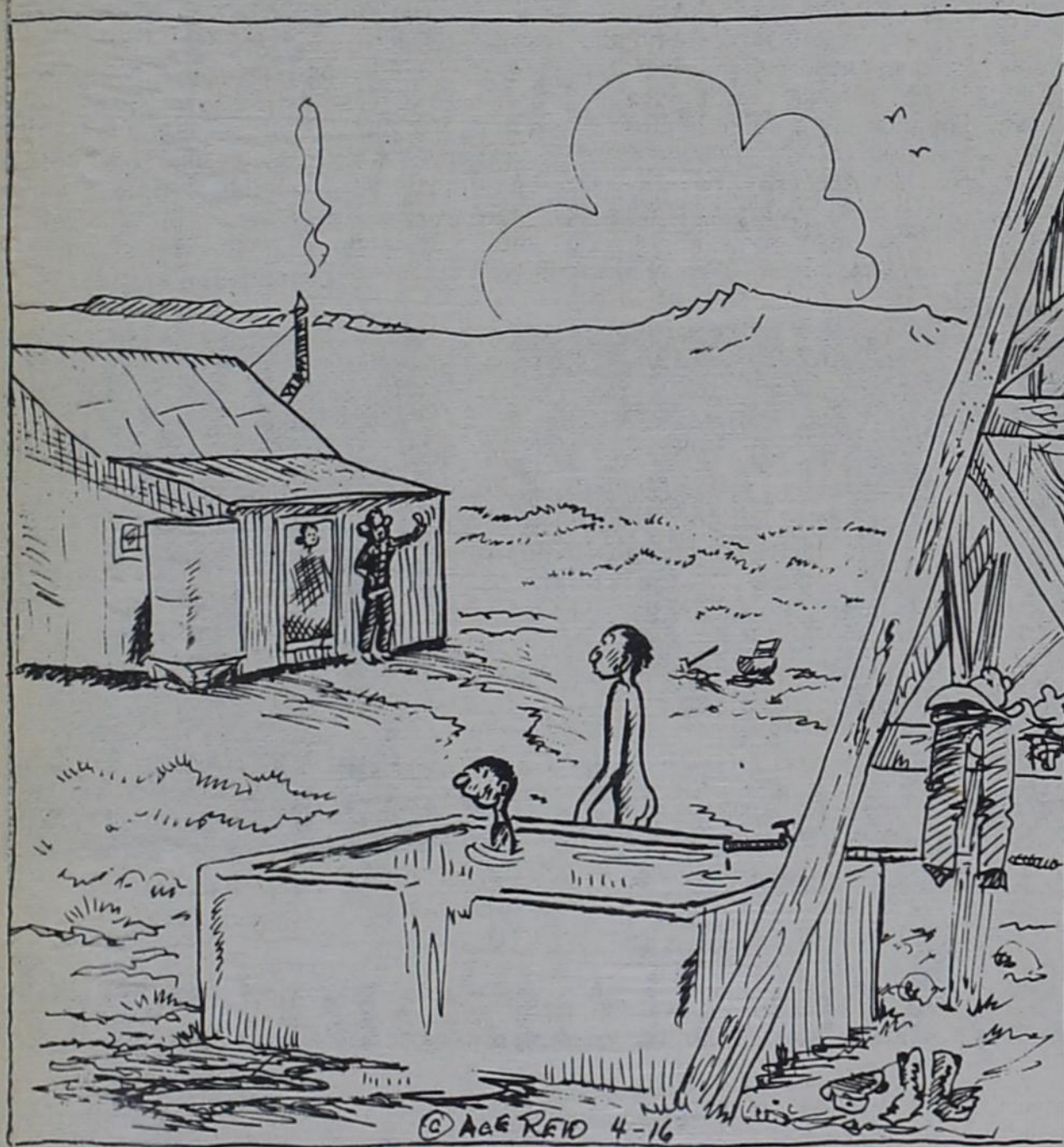

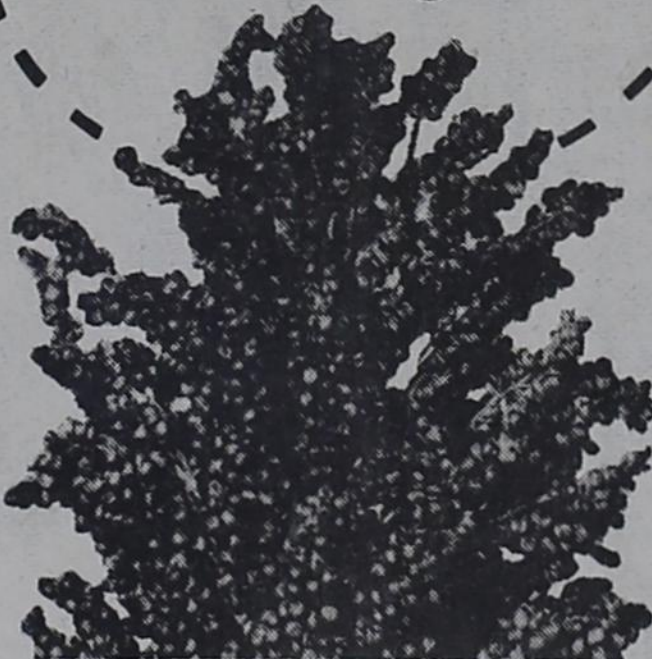

## Officers Named

In a session that began at 8 p.m. and did not adjourn until approximately 3 a.m. the Bovina Independent School District Board of Trustees, last Tuesday, went through its first business meeting following the elections of April 1.

Prior to recognizing new trustees, holdover members of the board accepted the reading of the previous meeting.

Canvassing of election results was taken up and approved. Board president, Edwin Lide, administered the oath of office to Gaylon Rhodes and Herb Howell. They then read and signed the trustee commission.

Reorganization of the board was conducted, with Lide as president; James Clayton, vice president and Keith Garner, recording secretary. Lide and Clayton were returned to the offices they held during the last fiscal year.

Monthly bills and the tax collection report, as presented by Superintendent Larry L. Wilson, were accepted and Wilson noted the total amount of anticipated collections is down as compared to the amount realized through the end of March, 1977.

Seven students have been approved for transfer into the Bovina school system. Applications must be filed with, and approved by, the local board on or before May 1 and then sent to the Texas Education Agency for its approval.

The 1978-79 fiscal year budget was offered to the board by Wilson and the discussion following this was a time-consuming chore. It was finally decided to give the proposed budget further study.

The board then went into a lengthy executive session, as authorized by Texas revised civil statutes, for discussion of personnel matters.

Returning to public meeting, the trustees announced they had accepted two resignations and hired, temporarily, one new teacher.

Resignations accepted were from Glenna Rusciolli, a speech therapist, and Connie Billingsley, a bi-lingual teacher in the first grade.

Confirmed was the appointment of Sharon White, also a bi-lingual teacher in the first grade. Ms. White's tenure runs only for the remainder of the current school year.

The board also took up number of reports from the superintendent before adjourning.

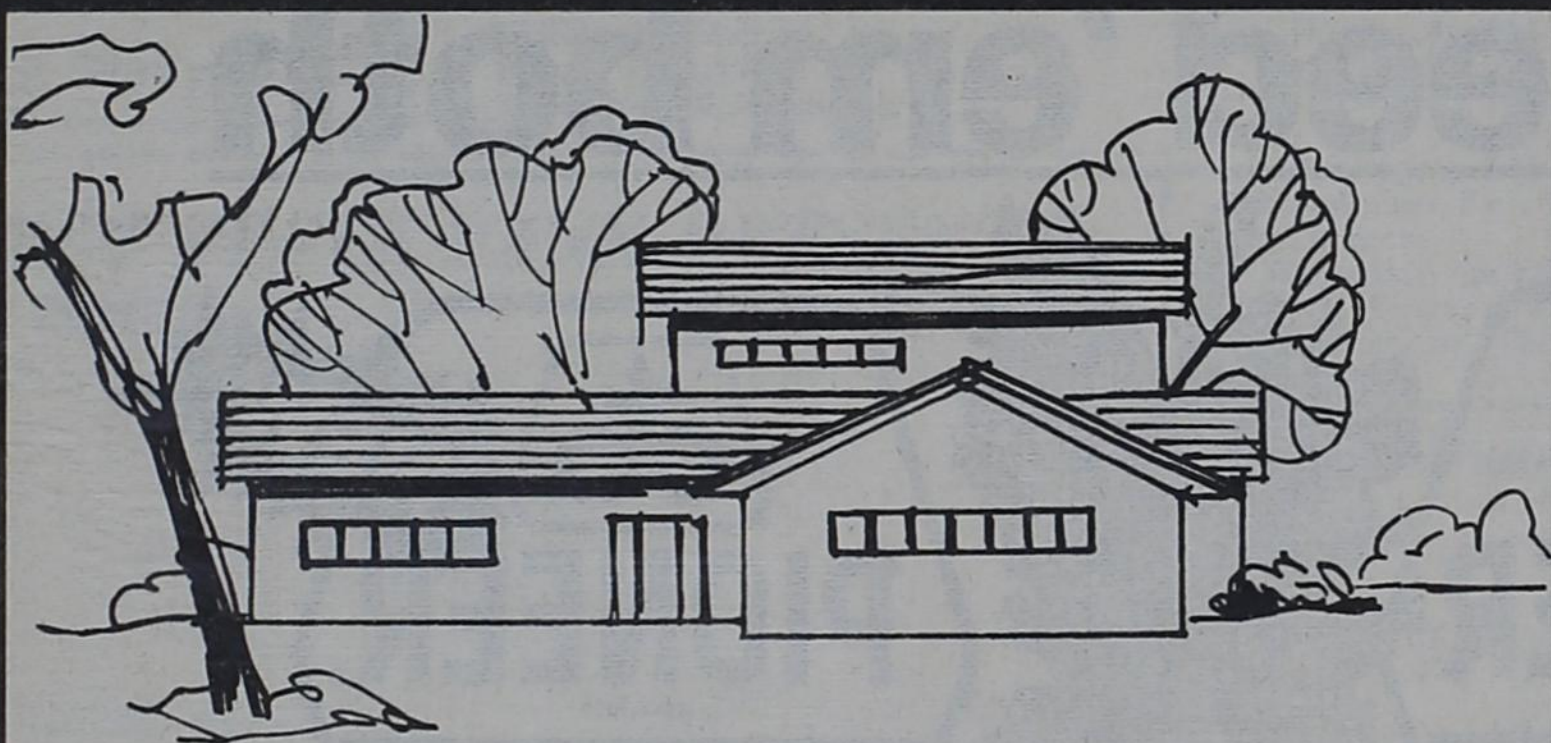

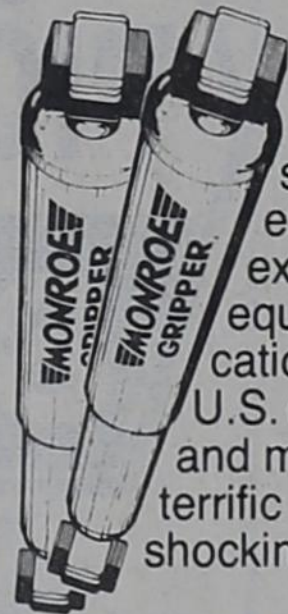

After refreshments were served by Mrs. Dixie Jesko and Mrs. Kuper, Fr. McGovern gave the closing prayer.

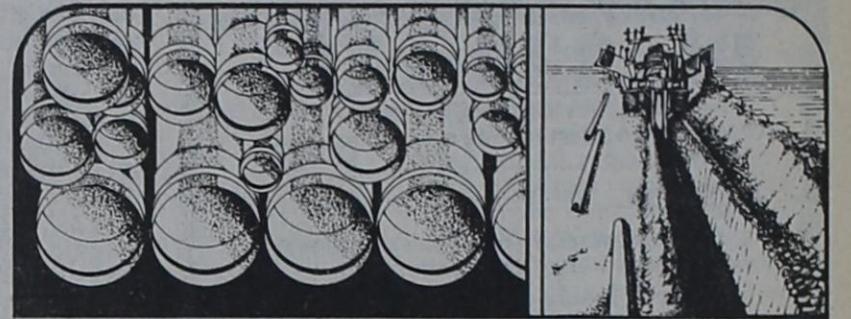

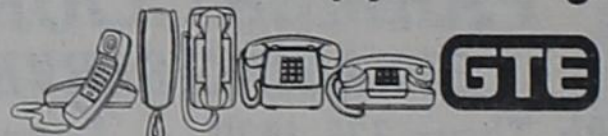

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# Fillies Streak To District 3-A Title

Setting five District 3-A records in the process, Bovina High School's Fillies stormed to the district title on their own track last Saturday, exhibiting great strength and balance while amassing 179 team points for the meet.

The Fillies dominated the field events, winning all five events and setting records in three of them. Bovina placed 1-2 in three of the field events, and were third in another.

Pat Shepherd hurled the discus 128-8 for her best mark of the season and a new district record. Her shot put mark of 36-11, while almost four feet below her top effort of 1978, was still good enough to earn her a double win in the weight events.

Sandi Sides also emerged as a double winner. She got off a record jump of 35-1 in the triple jump, to improve her best mark in that event, and had earlier jumped 15-7½ to win the long jump.

Denise Read out-duelled Vega's Dawn Harwell in an exciting high jump final, to win with another district record jump of 5-5, her best jump of the spring. Miss Harwell had been the previous 3-A record-holder in the event.

Both jumpers went up to 5-2 without incident, but missed at 5-4. Then the bar was lowered to 5-3. Both cleared that height, and then were successful at 5-4. Miss Read cleared the 5-5 height on her second effort, and Miss Harwell narrowly missed.

With a girl from the southern part of the region having cleared 5-6, this event bids to be a good one at the regional meet.

Helping the Fillies "sweep" the field events were second place finishes by Claudia Chisom in the shot put and discus, a second by Belinda Shelby in the long jump and her third in the triple jump. When the meet broke for lunch, Bovina had tallied 83 points in the field events alone.

The Fillies did just what their fans expected in the running events, winning four events and placing second in another.

The sprint relay foursome of Denise Read, Belinda Shelby, Diane Gilbreath and Sandi Sides got the afternoon session off to a rousing start by winning their event in a district record time of 50.3.

The 880-yard relay team, made up of the same four girls mentioned, scored an easy victory of about 30 yards over second place Farwell. Only a less than perfect baton exchange kept this team from setting a new record.

The mile relay was another easy win, as Laura Widner, Denise Read, Sandi Sides and Diane Gilbreath turned in a 4:16.7. Wind which hampered the afternoon finals somewhat kept the team's time from being lower, plus the fact that they were not pushed at all.

In the mile run, freshman Kathy Williams allowed Sherry Booe of Hart to set the pace for the first two laps, but then took control of the event, and won going away in the district record time of 6:04.3.

Another freshman, Fonda Griffin, raced home second in the 220-yard dash in the time of 28.0, to qualify for the regional meet.

Miss Shelby narrowly missed second place in the 100-yard dash, where she was timed at 12.0. She will be the regional alternate in that event as well as the triple jump.

"We did about what I expected us to do. Fonda qualifying in the 220 was sort of a bonus, but I thought we could win the others. The girls did real well," said Coach Joel Nelson following the meet.

freshman, can dip considerably below the six-minute mark if the competition demands.

First and second-place finishers in the regional meet qualify for the girls' state meet two weeks later in Austin. The Fillies and their coach know that in order to keep their chances alive for the state track and field title, they must qualify in as many events as possible, and especially in the relay events, where victories count 20 points.

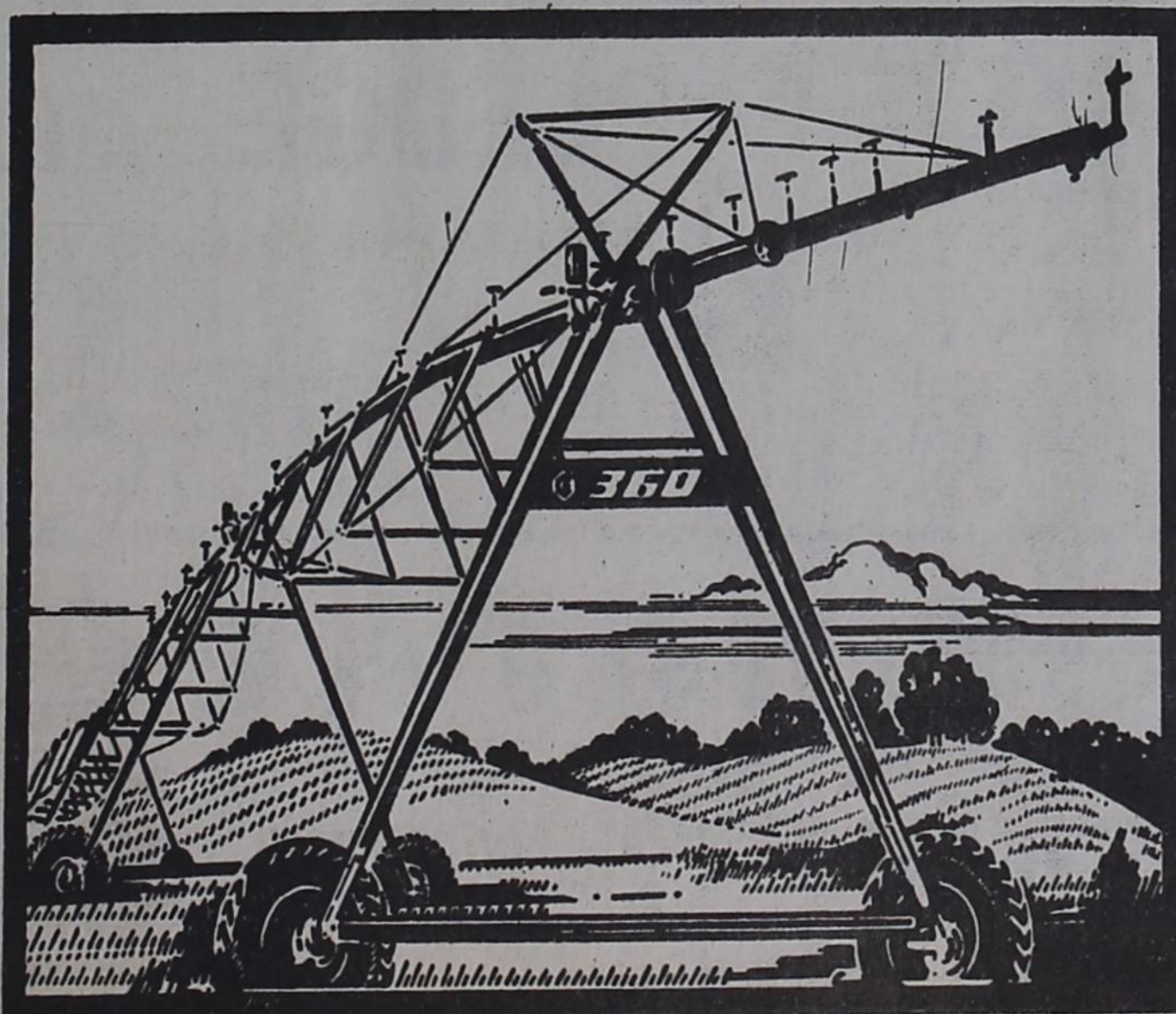
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
