### THE MERKEL MAIL Daring New Drama,

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#### MERKEL'S UNEXCELLED SCHOOL SYSTEM.

When Supt. R. A. Burgess handed diplomas to fifty proud Seniors last Friday night, it was the fifteenth occasion in which he had had the privilege of making such awards. It was in 1919 that he first became head of the Merkel schools, having served continuously in that capacity since, with the exception of three years, 1925 to 1927, inclusive, when he was superintendent of the Childress schools. Previously he had served two years as principal of the High school here, So his connection with the Merkel school, which terminated this June, actually

covers 17 years. A glimpse of the changes in these years reveals that in 1919 the gradruating class numbered 9; in 1937, 50. Enrollment for 1919-20 was 549; for 1936-37, 824. From five units of affiliation in 1919, the close of the 1936-37 session brought the announcement that with credits of one and one-half units granted for vocational agriculture and one unit for home economics the local schools now boast 26 1-2 credits, and next year another one and one-half credits should be granted for the second year of vocational agricul-

Merkel's modern school plant of towlay consists of a 14-room High School building, a 15-room Grammar school with auditorium and a new auditorium-gymnasium capable of seating 1,200 persons and containing a basketball court 80x52 feet.

The High School in the year just sclosed had 141 students from 16 surrounding districts, drawing students from all parts of Merkel's trade terri-
