

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

The Merkel vocational agriculture boys are getting their projects lined up for the coming year. So far there have been ten boys that have selected and brought in and placed on feed calves that will be used.

Sam Swann, local breeder of Polled Hereford cattle, has sold three calves to Waymon Adcock, Ralph Russell and Clyde Deavers, respectively. Mr. Swann says that he is very much interested in the vocational agriculture work and has shown his appreciation of the work by selling these calves to Harrell, Dillard Dunn, Victor Joyner, the boys at just a little more than half of the present market price.

Other boys that have selected calves are: Glen Robertson, 1 calf, breeder, Bill Brown; Francis Harris, 2 calves, breeder, Bill Brown; Clyde Sears, 1 cali, breeder, Sears herd; Mark Malone, 2 calves, Harrison Malone, 2 calves, breeders, Malone brothers; Morris Clack, breeder, Nim Teaff; Morris Wozencraft, 1 calf, breeder, Douglass brothers, and a few other boys may feed calves, depending on

the feed crop. Other projects that will be carried by vocational boys are: poultry, including capons, laying hens, baby chicks and broilers, swine, both breeding animals and fattening animals, lambs, milk cows, cotton, milo and other field crops.


