Wildlife Habitats Needed

If you like to improve wildlife habitat, some of the best improve habitat, some of the best improve-

ments that could benefit the ments that could benefit the lake
areas, would be to plant food plots areas, would be to plant food plots
around the outer areas. This could include milo, millet, corn or native grasses.
From a wildlife standpoint, the greatest benefits would be in the
development of nesting and broodrearing habitat for pheasants, quail, rabbits and a wide variety of nongame wildlife species.
The nesting period for most wildlife in the area is the period
from April through August. These are the critical times and spraying, mowing or other disturbances should be kept to an absolute minimum. At this time, the Parmer County S.W.C.D. has availForest Service. These are for quail, pheasants, deer, turkey or squirrel.
The wildlife packets contain 25 seedlings each of four species. You can also order seed-lings separately to pla.
