





Mrs. Ferguson Again To Run for Governor "If Voters Want Me"

Austin, Mar. 28 .- Former Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, in a formal statement announced Saturday that she would be a candidate for governor if enough persons asked her to make the race and called on voters to send a postal card saying they would support her at the primary that she might determine with some degree of certainty as to how the voters feel about her election. Mrs. Ferguson's statement was titled "If I Should Run for Governor," and she outlined her platform, proposing four cardinal points: First, unqualified support of President Roosevelt for a third term; second, a gross receipts tax of 11/2 per cent to pay social security obligations; third, economies in state government by reducing appropriations \$25,000,000, and, fourth, removing discrimination against persons who have reached 45 years of age while yet burdened with the expense of raising their families.

Mrs. Ferguson herself would be seeking a third term, she says in her statement, and because of the past and the future she thinks Texas unhesitatingly should vote for Roosevelt again.

Final Report 1939 Crop Shows 11,812,281 Bales

Washington, Mar. 28 .- The census bureau announced in its final ginning report of the 1939-40 season that the 1939 cotton crop totaled 11,812,281 equivalent 500-pound bales of lint cotton. The agriculture department estimated 11,792,000 bales for the crop last December.

This year's final figures compare with 11,944,,028 bales in the 1938 crop and 18,945,028 bales in the 1937 crop, which was a record.








