BIVINS: The formulas used by Medicare and Medicaid are the biggest culprits. Other areas also need to be explored, such as tort
reform. The Supreme Court reform. The Supreme Cour
overturned a law passed by the state senate that put a cap on pain and suffering, where hospitals are involved. I'll sponsor a constitutional amendment to turn that around. Hospitals can't afford
liability insurance. Hospitals also have trouble affording Workmen's Compensation Insurance, which also is a problem with other businesses. I would try to get that changed. PHILLIPS: The first thing is to equal. This goes for other financia issues as well. Those living in Amarillo feel we're city residents, but in many cases we get the same
treatment as the rural areas do. If it was just West Texas that wa discriminated against, we'd have an insurmountable problem, bu you see the same thing in East
Texas and in far West Texas. We Texas and in far West Texas. We
