



Lattimore, Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals, now deceas-ed, but that in this race he rec-ognized Alexander was the best qualified man for the Supreme Court.

"Judicial greatness is not in-herited. It is only achieved through laborious work, and James P. Alexander has attained his outstanding place in judicial circles through long years of diligent effort. The people should not confuse Judge Alexander's opponent with Justice O. S. Lattimore," he declared. "That great man has long since passed to his just reward." In McLennan County in the

Official Canvass Gives O'Daniel Majority of 101,981 Over Field

Official tabulations by the state democratio executive committee meeting in Austin last Saturday showed that Governor W. Lee O'Daniel was renominated by a majority of 101,-981 votes over seven opponents. The official canvass gave him 645,546 out of 1,189,311 votes cast in the governor's race. Ernest O. Thompson was runner-up with 256,934.

O'Daniel's total vote was 54.3 per cent of the total. When the Texas Election bureau announced its last total during the week after the election, O'Daniel's vote was given as 607,614, which was 53.7 per cent of the total vote accounted for at that time.

In the 1938 primary O'Daniel received 573,166 votes, or 31,477 more than 12 opponents. Thompson had 231.630 in the final compilation of the 1938 vote.

The official vote for governor was announced by the state committee after their canvass Saturday as follows:

W. Lee O'Daniel, 645,646; Harry Hines, 119,121; Jerry Sadler, 61,318; Miriam A. Ferguson, 100,578; R. P. Condron, 2,003; Albert L. Derden, 88; Ernest O. Thompson, 256,934; Arlon B. Cyclone Davis, 3,623.

Olin Culberson led the field of nineteen candidates for the railroad commission to go into a run-off with Pierce Brooks. Culberson received 214,174 votes; Brooks 211,681 and the other seventeen 620,411. Although the race had the greatest number of candidates, the total vote in it was lighter than in several others with a total of 1,046,266, of which Culberson and Brooks together polled 425,855.

In the only other second primary run-off race, for chief justice of the supreme court, the first primary leader was H. S. Lattimore, with 371,452 votes. Judge James P. Alexander polled 319,765. Four other candidates received a total of 319,-456 votes. There were 1,010,673 cast for the six in the race.

Recruiting in Marine Corps Smashes Record

Smashing all records for peacetime recruiting in the U.S. Marine Corps since the World War, the Texas district, with headquarters at ing district recruiting station for the nation with a total of 240 men enlisted during the month of July. The Dallas office also has the distinction of enlisting 40 men in one day,

which was done on Friday, July 26. The response of the American youth in Texas to the call for voluntary enlistments, has been gratifying and it is expected that the marine corps will soon reach its authorized strength, which will bring the total number of men to 34,000. This

figure represents an actual doubling of the personnel of the marines, as the total number remained around 17,000 for a number of years since the World War.

When the new strength is achieved it is proposed to organize several defense battalions, mainly to augment the fleet marine forces on the east or west coasts or at locations which may best serve the military needs of the nation.

The Fleet Marine force comprises virtually all military units, including rifle, engineer, chemical, signal, tank, motor transport and the necessary service companies. New defense battalions will be capable of an allround defense short of a major fleet effort, it is said, and will add considerable strength to the original force.

For years the Fleet Marine force, a special division within the corps, has been taking part in maneuvers with the navy. Islands in the Caribbean or the Pacific furnished the practice grounds for the establishing of advanced bases, and gave the sea



soldiers some excellent training in landing and other exercises. Marine Corps Recruiting stations in Texas are located in Dallas, Austin,
