FDR Signs Draft Bill, Calls 16,500,000 to

Washington, Sept. 19. - President Roosevelt signed the draft act Monday, fixed Oct. 16 as registration day for 16,500,000 young Americans now subject to compulsory military training, and asserted the United States was marshalling its strength to avert the terrible fate of nations whose weakness invited attack.

The new law itself requires that twenty-first anniversary of their birth and have not passed the thirtysixth year must register. A national will be awarded attendance pins. drawing by lot will determine the order in which questionnaires will be mailed to the men. On the basis of the questionnaires, local boards will place the men in various classifications-those available for immediate service, those deferred because of dependents, etc.

Increase In State Tax Would Reduce Output

Any appreciable increase in the state gross production tax on oil would decrease by no less than \$55,would run the cost of producing the 000.00 per year. servative men who are well acquaint- tion." ed with the returns from the "stripper" wells of West-Central Texas, should a 5-cent per barrel increase in the state tax be imposed on the production from these wells, at least 50 per cent of the 8,611 sub-marginal wells of the district would be abandoned and plugged, the report claim-

Such action would not only cause the returns of the territory from these wells to be cut at least in half, but it would also serve as a serious deterrent to many operators in the contemplated drilling of more wells in the area, the survey declared. Other statements made include:

"The sub-marginal wells in West-Central Texas, at their present allowable are producing approximately 533,000 barrels per month. This adds up to an excess of 6,400,000 barrels per year. Approximately that many dollars are realized from the production of these 'stripper' wells.

"Out of this sum, the landowners of the district are being paid \$2,750 .-00 per day in royalty. This aggregates \$800,000.00 per year. Payroll of the 3,500 men employed in looking after these small producers amounts to \$283,0000.00 per month or \$3,400,-000.00 per year. The total of these two items is \$4,200,000.00.

"An increase in the state tax of as much as 5 cents per barrel would, without any doubt, cut this total of royalty and wage disbursements now being paid by the 'stripper' wells in this district in half. On top of that, these small wells are paying taxes to the state, counties and schools amounting to over \$750,000.00 a year. A 5-cent per barrel increase in the gross production tax would in reality cause a decrease in the tax receipts of the state and various local political subdivisions. A 5-cent per Pyorrhea May barrel increase on the total production of the 'stripper' wells would amount to around \$320,000.00.



Review of 47-Years Of Women's Work In **Methodist Church**

"The Passing of the Old and Forming of the New Woman's Work in the Merkel Methodist Church" was most interestingly told by Mrs. H. C.
