Oil Refining Provides Livelihood for Some 33,000 Texas Families

Dallas, Feb. 27.-Nearly 135,000 Texans get their entire living from oil refining, a statewide survey just ompleted by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas association shows.

The oil refining branch of the state's petroleum industry furnishes jobs for 33,000 Texas workers, including office employees, with payrolls of \$50,000,000 a year. Counting four persons to a family, a total of 132,000 Texans obtain their livelihood from oil refining alone, the survey







Two oil tests in the Stith area remained shut in Wednesday because of weather conditions and muddy roads of the past few days.

The Harry Hines et al No. 1 A. M. Wimberley had to shut down because trucks for cementing casing could not get to the location. The test struck oil last week, bailing at the rate of about 50 barrels daily, and was to underream casing for cementing at 2,215 feet.

Danciger Oil & Refineries Inc. No. 2 Kelso had cemented casing above a showing of oil in the Gunsight lime at 2.668 feet, after recovering about three bailers an hour.

A prospective new pay section for the east side of the old Noodle Creek field was found last week-end in the Humble Oil & Refining company No. 1 Huddleston, west offset to Humble's recent flush producer on the Sears estate.

The new productive zone was tentatively classed as the Hope sand. No. 1 Huddleston took two feet of the sand, filled with oil and began heading, but operators decided to cement casing past the pay section and drill shead for the Swastika, found in the Sears test at 3,010-20 feet. The Hope was drilled at 2,705-07 feet in the No. 1 Huddleston.

To School Districts

Austin, Feb. 27 .- A bill authorizing additional state financial aid to school districts which have had a material influx of children because of some Tuesday when Governor O'Daniel affixed his signature.

Under the law, a new scholastic occupied and owned by the Farmers census of the district will be taken a while Friday afternoon. State bank, now in liquidation, which between now and March 15. The district would be entitled to \$22.50 year. He has added a complete line of state aid for each child of school age disclosed by the new count, provided that large a sum was needed to meet the additional expenses.


