(Continued from Page One) ooking Noodle Creek valley, and the founding of the town of Noodle, at the crossing of two trails, later known as Cross Roads.

These founders of the Noodle community were soon followed by other pioneer spirits, and the Noodle country took its place among the leaders in the development of Central West Texas.

It is a far cry from this one teacher school of 1891 to the Consolidated High school of 1941-just fifty years have passed, but this school is now one of the leading rural schools in West Texas.

In celebration of this Half Century of Progress, Noodle folks are having great home coming. Many of the pioneers have passed on, but their children have remained to prosper in the land they love, or they moved on to other conquests. Many of them later moved to the Plains country and are now substantial citizens of that new world; others scattered throughout the Southwest and are engaged in various lines of business, but they are coming for a day, for another drink from Noodle creek, a glimpse of the old swimming hole, a handshake of a friend, or just a day "back home." Once again they will eat barbecue and drink black coffee, just as the days of yesteryear.

This big celebration will be held at the school building in Noodle, Sunday, May 4-an all-day affair. Arrangements are under the general supervision of O. W. Sosebee, chairman of the school board, and son of a pioneer. "Ode," as he is known throughout West Texas, attended his first school with the opening of Noodle in 1891, and he has stayed on and likes it. Other members of the school board are C. D. Swope, A. D. McCain, C. N. Hatfield, E. V. Satterwhite, J. K. Blair and C. E. Morgan.

The school board is being assisted by the faculty headed by Supt. E. E. Read, and by a general community committee headed by W. J. Bicknell. Nothing is being left undong, the spirit of the West is living still in the Noodle country.

The day's program will start at 10 o'clock and entertainment has been provided throughout the day. Dinner will be served on the grounds at noon; if the weather is unfavorable, it will be served inside the school house.

Introduction of old timers is to follow a talk on "Folks We Have Known" by Judge James P. Stinson of Abilene, and a number of early settlers will take part in the pro-
