I'm going to add Nancy Reagan to that list since she has made so many tacky talkshow appearances while plugging her book, "My Turn" for which she stole the title of my column.

Now, what can we common grass-roots folks expect from the dawning of the new 90s decade? It is certainly shaping up like good old America is going to end up being colonized by Japan. I understand that Japanese is a very difficult language, so we'd better start teaching it early in those taxpayer-funded day care centers while the kids are very small.

Those of us who live in West Texas already know how to talk through our noses and we can already pronounce the sissysounding names of all those Japanese autos such as Mitsubishi, Isuzu, Nissan, Toyota, Subaru,

But, frankly, I still prefer good old American-sounding cars like Ford, Buick, Olds, Chevy and Dodge, even though a good many parts of these autos are currently being made in other countries. Many of us in the 90s will be riding bicycles instead of driving around in those sissy-sounding cars, so that should help out the country's problem of obesity, as well as curtail any future fuel shortages.

And sleeping on the dirty, drafty floor on those little mats is going to be difficult to get used to. Sounds to me like we may spend most of our winter months with a bad case of Asian flu.

But look on the bright side. Our kids will be smarter and more respectful of their elders. They will be more concerned with scholastic endeavors and less with establishing a tough, macho image. Kite-flying contests may even replace football as the popular interscholastic league sport in the school system.

Perhaps there are some things we could learn from the Japanese. We blame over-crowding in our large cities for poverty, crime and drugs, while Tokyo, the largest city in the world with a population of over 25 million people, has almost no crime. The police of that city spend most of their time unsnarling the city's terrible traffic

Japan's most recent American investments have been in the entertainment industry, acquiring large office buildings, New York City's Rockefeller Center, etc.

However, you might need to know that they are also making inroads into the cattle industry. Between 50 to 100 million dollars have been invested in U.S. cattle ranches, feedlots and packing plants since 1987. Shipments of domestic beef to Japan have risen sharply in the last two years.

At the end of last year, foreigners controlled about 12.5 million acres of this country's privately owned farmland and timberland. Still, that is only about one per cent of the real estate and farmland in the U.S. We have invested far more in other countries than this.

But we need to be on the alert for any future political influence these foreign investors may wield with their new American dollars, lest we someday end up with riceburgers in place of the Big Mac. Sayonara, y'all!



H.B. 82 further provides that the governing body of a taxing unit may by official action continue the taxation of tangible personal property.

Further, the Board of Trustees of the Farwell ISD will consider the reinstatement of the practice of taxing personal vehicles and automobiles.

The Board of Trustees of the Farwell ISD will conduct a public hearing to continue the policy of taxing all tangible personal property on November 27, 1989, at 7:00 p.m. in the Office of the Superintendent, 705 6th Street.

All interested persons are entitled to speak and present evidence for or against the continued taxation of tangible personal property. This notice is published in compliance with the provisions of House Bill 82.







